WINS PROMOTION

Eugene Boy To Have Charge of Seattle Business of Street Car Advertising Company.

Word has been received here of the promotion of Franklin S. Allen, formerly of this city, who is with the American Street Railroad Advertising company. A year and a half ago he went with the advertising company having charge of its business in certain smaller Oregon and Washington cities. Then he was sent to some of the second class cities of California, then to Tacoma, and now he is given charge of the company's business at Seattle. These promotions carry with them a corresponding increase of pay.

SETS RECORD CROP, LAND COST NOTHING

Not only has Frank H. Barlow, who raises 20 miles up the McKenzie, raised what is for this year, record oats and timothy, he has done it on non-irrigated land. Best of all, the land didn't cost him anything. Mr. Barlow, who is making final proof on the homestead on which he lives, brought to the Guard Monday samples of oats 57 inches high and of timothy 56 inches in length. The grain is well-filled. Mr. Barlow has acres of the oats, timothy and clover, beat that last year," he said.

HATHAWAYS ARE BACK FROM EASTERN TRIP

Garage Man Drives Dodge Car 5734 Miles, with Two of Original Tires Still On.

F. M. Hathaway, of the Pacific Auto company, drove into his garage Friday with two of the same tires on his Dodge car which were on when he left Detroit about the middle of June. They had made a mileage of 5734 miles since leaving the factory in the Michigan metropolis. Mr. Hathaway and his mother, Mrs. Lillie Hathaway, left Eugene June 5, going direct by rail to Detroit. There he took a stock Dodge car and drove to Niagara Falls, across the state to Albany and on through to Boston. Leaving that city, they drove down the coast to New York, passing through Providence, R. I., and other points of interest. From Rock Island, Ill., they were fifteen days running time making the trip to Eugene.

Mr. Hathaway stated Monday that they had a most excellent trip, having no engine trouble and very little tire trouble. All four of the tires which were on the car lasted until they reached Oregon. The first one to give out failed them near the Bridal Veil Falls. A second had to be replaced at Albany.

Business conditions are reported by Mr. Hathaway as very good in the east. All factories are running full time and many men, especially those who are working on piece work, are working overtime. There does not, he says, seem to be as much enthusiasm for enlistment as here. All important railroad and wagon bridges and tunnels are guarded by troops.

While in Detroit Mr. Hathaway inspected all the big automobile factories of that city, and found them all busy. He states that there are many miles of paved state highways throughout the entire east which seems much more awake to the need of good roads than the west. The poorest roads struck during the entire trip from Detroit to Boston and back to Eugene were encountered in Oregon. They came from Rock Island, Ill., across Iowa to Sioux City, thence to Aberdeen, S. D., through Miles City, Livingston, to Spokane and thence to Walla Walla, Pendleton, Heppner and The Dalles and home and found most roads good.

They stopped at hotels until they crossed the Mississippi river on their return. Throughout the eastern states, Mr. Hathaway states, there is little camping out done, but as soon as they crossed the Mississippi they encountered many parties camping.

WAR TAX BILL IS FINALLY REVISED

Washington, Aug. 6.—The war tax bill finally revised to meet latest estimates was favorably reported today by the senate finance committee. It proposes to raise \$2,006,070,000 by taxation.

The house bill proposed \$1,807,000,000 in new taxes. No provision for additional bonds to be considered later by the

house are made in the senate bill.

Chairman Simmons plans to call up the revised bill for debate the latter part of the week and hopes for its final enactment by congress early next month.

Most of the new taxes proposed under the revised bill for war expenses of the present fiscal year would come from incomes, war excess profits, liquor and tobacco.

The revised senate bill strikes out the retroactive tax upon last year's incomes, but principally by increasing surtax on the wealthy persons and by doubling the normal tax on corporations proposes to raise \$777,000,000 in addition to the \$330,000,000 now secured

from incomes. It proposes a levy of \$562,000,000 on war profits and extends the tax to individuals in trade or business as well as corporations.

The house tax yield on distilled spirits of \$100,000,000 is raised to \$135,000,000 and that on beer from \$97,500,000 to \$140,000,000 and that on wines from \$8,000,000 to \$21,000,000. A prohibitive tax on further manufacture or importation of distilled beverages also is provided.

The original senate committee provision for an increase of one quarter of one cent a pound in publishers' mailing rates and a five per cent tax upon their net incomes over \$4,000 in lieu of the house

plan for increasing postal rates by a zone system was retained. The house provisions reimposing Spanish war stamp taxes were substantially retained.

The total estimated increase in federal revenue of \$2,006,070,000 proposed under the amended bill was said today by Chairman Simmons and treasury experts to be conservative. Many of those in charge of the revision believe the bill will in actual operation yield many millions more.
