SOLDIERS IN FRANCE WILL CAST BALLOTS

Government to Arrange for Participation in Elections by Men Who Go To Europe.

(By The Associated Press) Washington, Aug. 7.—American citizens in France as members of the expeditionary forces will be privileged to vote at the fall elections, provided their respective states establish the necessary overseas voting machinery.

Provost-Marshal-General Crowder, in a ruling on the subject, holds that there is no bar to any citizen's participation in any election because of his absence from home while on duty with the troops. Following the process used on the Mexican border last year, soldiers at national guard mobilization camps or cantonments of the national army will cast ballots at the coming elections if the states enact the needed legislation.

A ruling by General Crowder directs exemption boards to accept for service all aliens who are willing to waive their immunity claims based on allegiance to another government. In this manner the ranks of the new national army are opened to friendly aliens who wish to volunteer.

COMMISSION VISITS LANE COUNTY ROADS

Public Service Officials and County Court Inspect Railroad Crossings on S. P.

The public service commission of the state of Oregon and the Lane county court went to Goshen and Divide Tuesday to look over the crossing situations near those places. The commission had set this date to look at the Goshen under crossing before the Southern Pacific commenced work on the steel span which is being put in. They will also go to Divide to examine the proposed crossing there and to determine whether or not there is a necessity for an overhead crossing at that point. County Surveyor H. W. The order was issued in a case brought by Mr. Wheeler to cancel a lease held by Steadman on certain lands owned by Wheeler, and to force an accounting for stock placed upon the farm, and of which Steadman was to have half the increase. In his complaint, Wheeler alleges that Mrs. Steadman shot at him and at his son, and that they were driven off the place with a rifle when they sought to examine the stock in question.

Donald H. McGogy Will Teach Manual Training in Eugene High School Coming Year.

The school board met Monday evening and decided to fix September 24 the date of the opening of the schools this fall. This is about one week later than has heretofore been the date. There will be no Easter vacation next year, which will bring the closing on June 7, next year, which is practically the same date as last year.
