FIRE CHIEF'S WIDOW WEDS WILLIAM LORD

Mrs. David Campbell, of Eugene and Portland, Marries Son of Ex-Governor.

Mrs. David Campbell, widow of the late fire chief David Campbell, of Eugene and Portland, who was killed during a spectacular oil tank fire in Portland seven years ago, was married last Thursday at Stevenson, Wash., to William P. Lord, son of the late ex-Governor William P. Lord. They motored from

Portland to Stevenson accompanied by Mrs. W. D. Allard, a sister of Mrs. Campbell, and Dr. Mort, a boyhood friend of Mr. Lord. The fact of their marriage was kept secret for several days, but leaked out Monday, creating more or less of a sensation among their many friends in Portland. Since the death of her first husband, Mrs. Lord has been prominent in charitable and philanthropic work in Portland. David Campbell was chief of the Eugene fire department before going to Portland and won a high reputation as an efficient fire fighter. Mr. and Mrs. Campbell had many friends in Eugene. Mr. and Mrs. Lord will make their home in Portland where he is engaged in the practice of law. He assisted his father in compiling Lord's Oregon laws, the official code of the state.

Body of Mrs. Miller Is Found In Unused Cellar
