

TRUCK LOAD ASPHALT BREAKS DOWN BRIDGE

Men Compelled to Use Picks to Release Machine From Solidified Paving Material.

Standing on end in a branch of the mill race of the Eugene Power company, one of the Mathews Transfer company's motor trucks was being slowly dug out of a mass of solidified paving material Tuesday afternoon.

The truck was engaged with others in hauling the top coat of heated asphalt and sand from the mixing plant to the Perry street paving. The work of putting on the asphalt top to that street necessitated crossing the railroad and the property of the power company at the east end of Sixth street, and then going up the east side of the track to Perry street.

C. O. Peterson of the Eugene Excelsior company, who with the Eugene Woolen Mills, owns the mill race, leasing power to the ice plant and the flouring mill, had earlier in the day warned City Engineer Devereaux that the bridge would not stand up under a load of that weight, which he estimated at

11 tons, including the truck. Mr. Devereaux stopped one truck driver, but did not get word to the other in time.

What made the accident more serious is the fact that as soon as the heated asphalt in the truck struck the water it began to become solid and by the time the top of the load was shoveled up onto the road beside the bridge it was necessary to use a pick to release the rest from the box of the truck. A portion of the load slid off the hind end of the truck when it went down and it will require much work to release the rear of the truck bed from the mass of asphalt.

Mr. Peterson stated that the road on which the bridge is located is a private one and is so marked by signs, and therefore the owners are not responsible for any damage done by the breaking of the bridge. On the other hand he stated that so far as he is concerned he thought it unlikely that any claim would be made for damage to the bridge as it was rather old and needed replacing anyway.

The fore wheels of the truck had crossed the bridge which is about 12 feet long, when the heavy weight of the load on the rear wheels caused the bridge to give way. The truck stands on end with its front wheels and engine in the air and the rear end of the truck in the water of the mill race and partially imbedded in the asphalt.

SPRINGFIELD FIRM GETS BIG CONTRACT

Planing Mill Agrees to Get Out One Million Tent Stakes For Federal Government.

The Springfield Planing Mill company, of which H. E. Fitts is president and D. S. Jordan is secretary and treasurer, has accepted a contract from the federal government to furnish 1,000,000 tent pins for the use of the army.

The mill company is asking for bids for hardwood lumber and hardwood logs and is installing a small saw so that it can cut the logs into plank for the purpose of making the stakes.

They expect to begin the actual work of turning out the stakes about the 15th of August and will push the work as rapidly as possible.

BOY IS POISONED BY STRYCHNINE IN EGG

Son of L. C. Ingalls at Pleasant Hill Comes Near Dying From Squirrel Poison.

As a result of putting poison in an egg to kill squirrels the 19-year-old son of L. C. Ingalls, living near Pleasant Hill, had a narrow escape from death Wednesday. The squirrels had been stealing the eggs at the Ingalls home and Mr. Ingalls made a very small hole in the shell of an egg and put a quantity of strychnine in the egg and replaced it in the nest. Mrs. Ingalls gathered the egg with others and cooked it for breakfast Wednesday without noticing that it had been tampered with. The son chanced to get the egg. The first mouthful tasted queerly and he spit it out, but got enough of the poison to make him very sick. A physician was summoned and he was soon on the way to recovery. In the meantime the egg was thrown out and the dog ate it and died from the effects.

MEN IN OFFICERS' CAMP ARE SORTED

Sad Scene Enacted When Those Who Fail to Get Commissions Are Sent Home.

That the final selection at the Presidio when those who were deemed not to have earned commissions were separated from those who were to receive them, was a trying occasion to the young men, appears from a letter recently received in Eugene:

"The camp has just been thinned down to its final proportion. When I came here there were 2600 students, and now there are less than 1,000. The big cut came last Thursday noon, when 68 men were dropped from the muster roll of our battery alone, and discharged. It was one of the most pathetic sights I have ever seen.

"We are all in ranks at 1:30 p. m. When the captain came before us with the fatal list. It had been quite a fight for many to stay in camp and I never saw men's faces more drawn and nervous looking. As the captain called the names, the unfortunate men fell out of the ranks and formed a line on the left of the battery. The men in the ranks twirled their thumbs and bit their lips, while many in the new line had tears in their eyes.

"There was little complaining. The boys who went home were good losers. They clapped us when we came back from drill, and we called them as they marched away. They were certainly a fine bunch and I would not have been ashamed to have gone with them."

Sacramento Party on Its Way To Portland Has Very Heavily Loaded Kissel Kar.
