

BRITISH LABOR PARTY VOTES TO AID PEACE MOVE

perialism of autocratic governments, and continues:

"The conference asks the peoples of the several nations, particularly socialist labor comrades of Germany, Austria-Hungary, Bulgaria and Turkey, whether it is not possible for the united action of the working class of the world to bring this monstrous conflict to a summary conclusion conformable to the principles of the international."

After welcoming the formula of no

annexations and indemnities of the council of workmen's and soldiers' delegates the memorandum declares:

"Of all war aims none is so important as that there should henceforth on earth be no more war. Whoever triumphs, the world will have lost unless some effective method of preventing war can be found."

For this, reliance is largely placed on the "complete democratization of Germany and Austria-Hungary which now cannot fail to place themselves in line with other civilized nations, on a frank abandonment of every form of imperialism, on the suppression of secret diplomacy, on the placing of the foreign policy under the control of elected legislatures, on the absolute responsibility of the foreign minister of each country to the legislature, on concerted action for the limitation of armaments and the abolition of profit-making of armament firms."

For Super-National Authority.

It is further declared that the essential condition of a treaty of peace will be the establishment of a "super-national

authority or league of nations adhered to by all present belligerents while every other independent state in the world should be pressed to join."

The scope and constitution of the proposed league are set forth, including machinery for settling international disputes judicially and mediating disputes which are injudicial and the formation of an international legislature wherein every civilized state will be represented.

The memorandum reprobates "the crime against the peace of the world" whereby Alsace and Lorraine were torn from France in 1871 and demands their restoration.

It recognizes the necessity of safe guarding the legitimate interests of Italians in the Adriatic and the Aegean; of a just settlement of the question of Poland and other states where independence has been temporarily destroyed.

For the Jews equal citizen rights are demanded and hope of a free Palestine is expressed together with freeing of Mesopotamia, Armenia and Arabia from

Turkish rule and placed under the government of a league of nations. All dream of an African empire, the booty of any nation should be abandoned, the memorandum asserts, and suggests that all present colonies be transferred to the proposed league of nations.

Food supplies after the war and the prevention of unemployment are dealt with and projects of an economic war after peace are condemned. It calls for a full inquiry into alleged acts of cruelty and violence during the war and calls attention particularly to the destruction of lives and property by the "inhuman and ruthless" submarine war. It proposes a court of claims for such cases with suggestions for restoring devastated areas. The reconstruction of the socialist internationalists, to discuss and deal with all questions of international importance is declared desirable. Finally it is claimed that an agreement of the warring governments is only possible by a free and frank discussion of each other's claims and desires. Such a discussion the socialist and labor men of all countries are urged to demand.

GAINS ARE MADE

On the battlefield directly east of the Belgian town of Ypres, the British completed the capture of the town of Westhoek and secured the remaining positions held by the Germans on the Westhoek ridge, the official statement adds.

"In the course of a successful local attack delivered early this morning east of Ypres our troops completed the capture of the village of Westhoek and secured the remaining positions held by the enemy on the high ground known as Westhoek ridge.

"On the left flank of the battlefield our allies continue to make progress east and north of Bixchoote.

"Our raiding parties entered the enemy's positions yesterday evening on a wide front east of Monchy-le-Preux, blew in his dugouts and did great damage to his defenses. The enemy offered considerable resistance at several points and severe casualties were inflicted on his troops during the period when our troops were still in occupation of the German front system.

"A hostile counter attack was stopped by our machine gun fire. We captured two machine guns and a number of prisoners."

FRENCH MAKE GAINS.

Paris, Aug. 10.—The French forces last night made further progress against the German positions on the Belgian front. The Frenchmen broke into the German lines, occupied several farms to the east of Bixchoote and west of Langwarek, and captured a number of machine guns, according to the official statement given out today by the French war department.

North of St. Quentin the Germans attacked the French positions along a front of nearly a mile in the region of Fayet. The French statement says the assault was repulsed except at the center where German detachments gained a foothold in the French advanced trenches.

In the course of the night the Germans also made violent attacks on the French lines between Pantheon farm and Epine des Chevrengy on the Aisne front. Some German detachments which penetrated the French trenches were either killed or captured after hand-to-hand fighting.

BRITISH RAIDS SUCCEED

Canadian Army Headquarters in France, Aug. 10.—Raiding parties under protection of a heavy barrage fire early Thursday morning on a front of more than two thousand yards penetrated enemy positions in the Cite du Moulin and St. Laurent sectors, returning with prisoners. The troops engaged were from Ontario. Their casualties were slight.

At some points the trenches were found to have been pounded out of all resemblance to defensive positions. Our heavy guns had blown out many dugouts.

EXPLOSION KILLS MANY

London, Aug. 10.—An explosion and fire in a big chemical works in East London last night wrecked the building and killed or injured scores of workers. Thirteen bodies of women so far have been taken from the ruins. A large number of injured have been treated at the police stations and other civil places. Bodies are still being searched for.

Members of American Mission Go To Homes

(By The Associated Press)

Washington, Aug. 10.—Members of the American mission to Russia leave today for their homes, Elihu Root, its head, going to New York. All will return later to aid in the work of Russia's rehabilitation.

Sending of American troops to the eastern front would not in the opinion of all the commissioners except Charles Edward Russell, who suggested the plan, be helpful to Russia. On the contrary they are convinced that it would prove detrimental.

What Russia is most in need of, say the commissioners, is encouragement by the American press and people, particularly as an offset to anti-American propaganda being carried on by Germans in Russia.

SPAIN TO HAVE STRIKE

Madrid, Aug. 10.—After negotiations covering a long period between the railroad employers and employees, the men last night broke off relations with the companies. A strike of the men is expected to begin at 8 o'clock tonight. The government is taking all measures to maintain traffic.

WAGE INCREASE GRANTED

Chicago, Aug. 10.—An increase of from 11 to 15 per cent in wages of 18,000 employees of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railroad shops was announced here today. The advance goes into effect September 1.

STEEL ORDERS DECREASED.

New York, Aug. 10.—The unfilled orders of the United States Steel corporation on July 31 were 10,844,104 tons, according to the monthly report issued today. This is a decrease of 530,123 tons from the orders of June 30.
