HIGHER TYPE OF MANHOOD IS BRITISH AIM

"Use Your Eye and Your Brain" Is Watchword Being Instilled Into Youth to Fit Them For Any Eventuality.

DAY OF SUPERMAN HAS ARRIVED IS NOW BELIEF

Instructor In Three B's — Bullet, Bayonet and Bomb—that World May Be Made Safe for Democracy.

(By The Associated Press) A place in England, July 16, (Mail)—British military authorities are convinced that the day of the superman has arrived and that the part he is to play in ending the war and regenerating the world cannot be overestimated.

A representative of The Associated Press, who was permitted to visit a great training school as the guest of the foreign office obtained an insight to the remarkable change brought about in the British viewpoint during the past three years.

The British not only are putting forth all their energy in further perfecting their fighting forces, but are actually and earnestly devoting themselves to the development of their youth in a manner calculated to fit them for any and all eventualities which may arise in the years to come.

If the Germans cherished the idea of eliminating Britain as a world power, Britain, it is said, far from being beaten, now sees with a clearer vision than ever before and is preparing to turn the scales against her adversary in such a way as they may never again swing back.

New British Watchword "Use your eye and your brain" is the new British watchword which is being instilled into the British youth with all the force at the command of his superiors.

"We are training our men to believe in themselves," said the general commanding the school. "Each must not only feel that he is better equipped physically and mentally than his antagonist, but he must be able to demonstrate it. That is the lesson we have learned from the world war."

As the average Britisher is naturally a sportsman, his games are being made

to play an important part in his training. In shooting, bombing and all the various arts of warfare these are proving invaluable to him.

Unlike the armies of other belligerents, the British are discarding what are termed weapons of frightfulness and instructing their young manhood in the use of what they are pleased to call the "three B's—the bullet, bayonet and the bomb."

"Experience has shown us that the rifle and bayonet are the best defensive weapons with which to arm a man" asserted one official. "If he has the proper physical and mental training and knows how to handle his rifle and his bayonet, he is certainly the match, if not the superior of his adversary."

The message the British would impart to their American allies was summarized as follows:

"Train your young men to be physically and mentally strong; train them to think for themselves—make them supermen, in the modern sense and the world will be made safe for democracy."

COUSIN L. L. RAY IS SERIOUSLY INJURED

Golda Ray Badly Hurt, and Friend Killed When Team Runs Away.

Golda Ray, a cousin of L. L. Ray and a niece of Mrs. Lloyd Pickard, both of Eugene, was seriously injured in a runaway accident near Prineville Friday afternoon. It was thought for a time that she would not live, but Mr. Ray had a long distance message Sunday afternoon stating that she was resting easily and would probably live.

Miss Freda LaFollette, a companion, was killed in a fatal runaway accident on the divide, between Prineville and the Earl sawmill, Friday afternoon, when the rig driven by Mrs. Ida Ray, wife of Ira Ray of Ashwood, in which were Mrs. Ray's daughter, Golda, and Freda, the 12-year-old daughter of Poe LaFollette, of Coulton, a former resident of the Prineville section, overturned.

Freda LaFollette was thrown from the rig and killed almost instantly, and Golda Ray was badly injured, her skull being crushed, as indicated by a superficial examination. Mrs. Ray, who was driving, was also injured, but she was able to ride on horseback 12 miles to the sawmill for assistance.

The cause of the accident, according to Mrs. Ray's version, was that in coming down the hill one of the tugs became unhooked and the horses started kicking and running. She lost control of the team when all of the occupants were thrown out, resulting in the almost instant death of Mrs. Ray's sister and the serious if not fatal injury of her daughter.

The isolation of the place where the accident occurred delayed securing medical assistance for the injured until Saturday morning.

Billy Sunday May Visit Battle Front in France

Hood River, Or., Aug. 13.—In introductory remarks, delivered as prelude to his annual sermon to friends and neighbors yesterday, Rev. Billy Sunday intimated that he might accept an invitation to go to France and talk to the men in the trenches.

"One of the hardest things I have to go up against," he declared, "is that of saying no to invitations from commanding officers of different cantonments to address our soldiers. One of the members of the party of General Joffre, when the French commission was in New York City, visited me and tendered an invitation to go to France and talk to the men. We have been thinking and deliberating over it, and we don't know yet what we will do about it."

Double Rations Allowed Young Married Couples

(By The Associated Press) Berlin, via London, Aug. 13.—The municipal food bureau of Strassburg announces that newly married couples will be entitled to draw double the amount of food indicated on their food cards. This privilege is accorded them for a period of six weeks.

Jose Ynes Salazar Shot To Death on His Ranch

(By The Associated Press) Juarez, Mex., Aug. 13.—Jose Ynes Salazar, a revolutionary leader and former chief of staff to Francisco Villa, was shot and killed at the Nogales ranch, a short distance from Ascension, Thursday, Americans arriving here today from Casas Grandes brought the details of Salazar's death at the hands of a small band of home guards who were organized to protect the Casas Grandes-Ascension district.

FOREST FIRE BURNS MANY CEDAR POLES

Much Property Belonging to Elmer Russell Near Vaughn, Is Destroyed.

Elmer Russell, who was in Eugene Sunday afternoon, reports that a forest fire at Vaughn, about 25 miles west of Eugene on the Willamette Pacific railway, destroyed about \$800 worth of cedar posts and poles belonging to him Friday. He stated that the property destroyed was mostly poles, but there were a large number of posts. The fire was still burning Sunday night, and was working back toward the head of Wildcat creek, but he did not think it was doing much damage.

Twenty-Two Per Cent of Drafted Men Accepted

New York, Aug. 13.—The revised figures of the work of the 189 exemption boards as far as the various districts had reported up to today show that 60,152 men had been examined, of whom

40,887 qualified. Of this number 13,478 or about 22 per cent had been apparently accepted.

The district draft board, of which Charles E. Hughes is chairman, today began hearing exemption claims appealed from local boards. This board will have about 25,000 cases to decide. Mr. Hughes will personally hear the first few cases.

French Handbook Issued For American Soldiers

New York, Aug. 13.—The first edition of 100,000 copies of an English-French handbook which will be supplied to the soldiers going to France was sent to the war department today by the national Security league.

The book, which is of pocket size with a waterproof cover, contains 64 pages devoted to practical questions the soldier probably will want to ask in French.

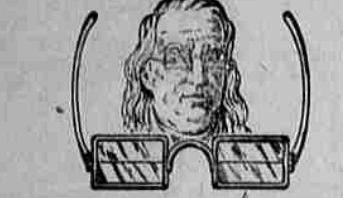
Former President Taft Continues to Improve
