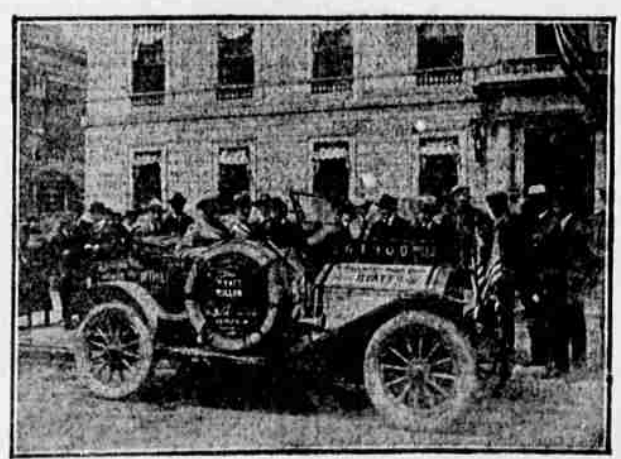
to visit here until the first of September.
