DEMONSTRATIONS TO BE GIVEN NEXT WEEK

Canning And Drying To Be
Taught by Expert From Agri-
cultural College Faculty.

There will be a series of demon-
strations in home canning and drying of
fruits and vegetables held throughout
Lane county, in the interests of the na-
tional food conservation campaign. They
will be conducted by Miss A. Grace
Johnson, of the home economics depart-
ment of the Oregon Agricultural college.
She will demonstrate a small pressure
canner, suitable for home use, and also
a cook stove evaporator.

The demonstration at Eugene will be
in connection with the big get-together
picnic planned by the Eugene chamber
of commerce and the Lane county Po-
mona grange, which is to be held in
Riverview Park, Eugene, Wednesday,
Aug. 22.

The dates of the demonstrations
throughout the county will be as follows:
Monday, Junction City, at the grange
hall.

Tuesday, Springfield, at the Lincoln
high school.

Wednesday, Eugene, at the picnic,
Riverview Park.

Thursday, Cottage Grove, at the high
school.

Friday, Creswell, place to be announ-
ced later.

Saturday, Elmira, place to be an-
nounced later.

These demonstrations will be very
practical and it has been announced that
the outfits will be cheap enough to be
profitable in many homes. The hour will
be 2 o'clock p. m. in each instance.

what channel the proposal will be
conveyed and gives no information from
which an inference might be drawn as
to whether it will come through one of
the allied governments or through a
dignitary of the church.

Officials were unusually explicit in
saying that it could not be discussed un-
til it came officially before the govern-
ment and were emphatic in declaring
that no statement whatever could be
represented as reflecting the official
view.

To Give Proposal Consideration.

If an inference might be drawn from
the undercurrents which were started in
official circles by the report, a trained
observer would venture the opinion that
the proposal is one which would be dis-
cussed in good faith by the allies but
that it does not meet their war aims.

It was indicated that a peace proposal
coming from the Pope—the first actual
proposal of the kind to come from the
vatican—would necessarily have to be
considered carefully and deliberately and
that an answer convincing to the world
would necessarily have to be made.
How far the peace proposal reflects the
close relationship of the vatican with
Austria whose earnest desire for peace
despite German influence is well known,
or how far it reflects the Catholic agita-
tion for peace in Germany no one here
would venture to say. It was recalled,
however, that leading Catholics were
prominent figures in the recent peace
flurry in Germany.

Announcement that the Spanish am-
bassador at Rome had transmitted Pope
Benedict's proposals to the Italian gov-
ernment, and the opinion expressed at
the apostolic delegation here that they
might be delivered to the United States
by a neutral led to the possibility that
the Spanish ambassador here, Juan
Riano, might convey them to the state
department.

The Spanish embassy's only informa-
tion today, it was said there, had been
received from The Associated Press des-
patches.

Embassies Intensely Interested.
Without advice of any kind from their
own governments, the entente embassies
were intensely interested in The Asso-
ciated Press cablegrams from Rome.

Diplomatic practice prevents author-
ized expressions of opinion for publica-
tion but it was apparent at once that the
peace proposal falls on unresponsive ears
so far as the diplomats here are con-
cerned. The entente representatives
without slightest difference of opinion,
declared the proposal originated with
Germany, using Austria as an interme-
diary with the vatican because of the
better standing of that great Catholic
empire with the Pope.

There was no disposition to ascribe
any but the loftiest motives to Pope
Benedict in accepting at their face value
peace proposals emanating from Vienna
but naturally the question was at once
raised as to the proper division of re-
sponsibility between the central powers
and the Pope. It was pointed out that it
is important to know whether the pro-
posal came full-fledged from Vienna or
Berlin or whether the Pope himself
framed them in the light of an under-
standing he may have acquired of the
minimum demands of the central powers.

The entente diplomats agree that the
peace proposals did not come from any
of the allied capitals. So far as Great
Britain is concerned it was said there
has not been any intention of departing
from the outlines disclosed in the public
speeches of Premier Lloyd-George and
Foreign Minister Balfour.

The extreme element among the
French socialists have never contem-
plated anything short of the return to
French sovereignty of Alsace-Lorraine,
while so far as Italy is concerned, it is
said here, that the government would be
overturned by the people if it con-
sented to abate its demand for "Italia
Irredenta" involving the restoration of
the Austrian provinces on the Adriatic
to Italy.

WHOLE OF SPAIN IS UNDER MARTIAL LAW

Madrid, Aug. 14.—The whole of Spain
has been placed under martial law fol-
lowing disorders resulting from the gen-
eral strike which is spreading. This de-
cision was reached at a meeting of the
cabinet which devoted its entire time to
a consideration of the strike. Instruc-
tions were sent to military authorities
who have been given full control. Dis-
turbances which occurred at various
places have been stopped by the mili-
tary forces.

The strike, which was begun by the
railroad employees, has even affected
newspapers here and only those which
have non-unionist staffs will appear to-
night. They have received assurances
from the government that they will be
protected. At noon yesterday the capital
was quiet. A majority of the workmen
wish to work in peace; only a minority
seeks to promote disorder.

AUSTRIAN PAPERS ARE JUBILANT OVER BRITISH LABOR VOTE

Vienna Publications Believe
That Action Threatens to Col-
lapse War Policy of Entente
and End War.

Zurich, Switzerland, Aug. 14.—Aus-
trian newspapers are jubilant at the vote
of the British labor conference to send
delegates to the Stockholm conference
and the resignation of Arthur Henderson
from the war cabinet. The Reichspost
and Arbeiter Zeitung see thereimport-
ant events, heralding the dawn of peace.

The Reichspost says: "Henderson
wrecks Lloyd-George's cabinet and party
coalition at a moment when the entente
statesmen are making new arrangements
for a continuation of the war. The en-
tente's war policy threatens to collapse
and the terrible world war is reaching an
end."

The Arbeiter Zeitung says: "The re-
signation of Henderson marks a defection
of labor from Lloyd-George's war,
which was to be continued until mankind
perished. One may hope now that the
time of suffering and terror is approach-
ing an end."
