RESPONSE TO CALL FOR ARMY IS GREAT

Total of 190,347 Men Enrolled, 7,000 More Than Authorized Strength.

(By The Associated Press)
Washington, Aug. 17.—War volunteers for the regular army have reached a total of 190,347 men bringing the roll to seven thousand in excess of the authorized strength.

Since the total quota for the expanded army was filled several days ago recruits have continued to enlist at an average of more than 1,000 men a day. They will be needed and the recruiting service will not relax its efforts.

There still are 25 states that have not supplied their quotas but some of the other states have furnished their quota several times over.

Member Japanese Mission Gives \$200 To Police Fund

TO FIX COAL PRICE.

Chicago, Aug. 17.—Public hearings preliminary to plans for fixing the price of coal opened today before Judge O. N. Carter, who has been appointed director of coal for Illinois by Governor Lowden.

Arguments have been prepared for submission by mine owners, retailers, officials of miners' unions and railroad representatives. The hearing is expected to continue for several days.

DROP BOMBS ON OSTEND.

London, Aug. 17.—The admiralty announces the successful carrying out yesterday of a series of raids by aviators of the royal naval air service, who dropped many tons of bombs on military objectives in Belgium. The Ostend railway station and sidings and the Thour-out railway junction were attacked. The airfield at Ghistel was bombed and several fires were observed. Attacks from the air were made on the airfields at Engel and Uytkerke. All the airplanes returned safely.

Boys Commissioned At Presidio Will Have Furlough Before Going to American Lake.

Eugene's officers are beginning to arrive for short visits at home after the three months' training at the Presidio, and before they report at American Lake on August 29.

Ralph S. Allen and Ben F. Dorris, among the first to get in, came Friday morning, and will visit with their parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. D. Allen, and Mr. and Mrs. E. P. Dorris, respectively, for the period of their furloughs. Mr. Allen has been commissioned a second lieutenant in the field artillery, while Mr. Dorris' commission of the same rank is in the infantry. Both young men are graduates of the University of Oregon, Mr. Dorris finishing with the class of 1915, and Mr. Allen a year later.

Herschel Taylor, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. R. Taylor, is another Friday morning arrival. Mr. Taylor is now a second lieutenant in the quartermaster's corps, Robert Kuykendall, son of Dr. William Kuykendall, who is coming by boat from San Francisco, is expected to arrive here Sunday. He has been commissioned as second lieutenant in the field artillery.

Ben Williams, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Williams, who is now a second lieutenant in the Oregon coast artillery, was expected by his parents at 5:25 o'clock Friday evening. Cecil Bell, son of ex-Mayor and Mrs. W. A. Bell, will probably arrive on Thursday of next week, as he is visiting for a few days with relatives at San Francisco. Mr. Bell's commission of second lieutenant is in the infantry.

C. L. Stoddard and a Mr. Bond, of Eugene, were expected here the last of the week. It is reported that they were given captaincies.

Second Lieutenant Ralph P. Laird, son of Mr. and Mrs. P. N. Laird of Pleasant Hill, also came in Friday morning, and will spend his furlough visiting at home and at Corvallis. Mr. Laird is in the infantry.

CHINA INDEPENDENT IN WAR ON TEUTONS

Association of Republic With Entente Powers Not Mentioned in State Documents.

Peking, Tuesday, Aug. 14.—China's declaration of war on Germany and Austria-Hungary beginning at 10 a. m. today and other documents relating to the conflict do not mention the association of the Chinese republic with the entente powers. They indicate that China's action will be entirely independent.

The declaration of war aroused little excitement in Peking or in other north China cities, the long discussion of the question having discounted its effect.

The Netherlands minister to China today took over the Austrian interests and received the arms of the Austrian guard. The doors of the Deutsch Asiatische Bank have been sealed.

Chinese troops at Tien Tsin took over the Austrian concession and the German bank and German barracks there without incident.

Regulations issued today by the Chinese government permit the departure of Germans and Austrians within five days. Registration within ten days is required to permit Teutons to continue doing business if it does not affect China's welfare. Enemy subjects are forbidden to travel without permits. The regulations also provide for the internment of troublesome enemies.

TALK COAST HIGHWAY

Salem, Or., Aug. 17.—S. Benson, chairman of the state highway commission, his son, Amos Benson, and John B. Yeon, of Portland, were in conference with Governor Withycombe here yesterday, preparing for their trip to California early next week, when they will meet with Governor Stephens and the highway commission of that state to discuss the completion of a coast highway from Crescent City north through Curry and Coos counties.

Chairman Benson, his son and Mr. Yeon left this afternoon over the Pacific highway, where an inspection of the road will be made, particularly as to the work in Douglas county.

Governor Withycombe and probably Highway Commissioner Adams will join the party Sunday at Grants Pass, and they will continue on to Crescent City. General ideas as to the continuation of the coast highway into Oregon will be discussed at the conference," said Governor Withycombe.

"Just how far we will get along as to the tangible plans for a continuation of the work I cannot say at this time, but the route that is proposed seems to be a feasible one and such a highway would be a magnificent thing for Oregon."

"Taken up into Coos county it would have a continuing link with the Roseburg-Marathon road and eventually could be constructed further north along the coast."

HOGS MAKE SLIGHT ADVANCE IN EUGENE

Little Change in Conditions; Plenty of Vegetables in Sight for Local Market.

The only change in local market prices in Eugene today is a slight advance in the price of live hogs, which have advanced from 14 cents to 15 cents per pound.

London, Aug. 17.—Reuter Limited says it learns on good authority that German concessions in Poland are expected shortly but that they will be conditional on Austria's approval.

to peace without annexation or indemnities supported in other quarters," says the Corriere d'Italia, the semi-official organ of the vatican. The paper adds that the Pope's note does not propose to return to the status quo and suggests the restoration of "the old kingdom of Poland" as it was before being dismembered by the three empires.

The note suggests autonomy for Armenia, a re-arrangement of the colonies and the return of Alsace-Lorraine and Trent and Trieste to their respective nationalities. "Is it possible that the central powers will consent to make peace, imposing upon them such sacrifices and obliging them to pronounce, as Lloyd-George said, the word 'restoration'?" asks the Corriere d'Italia.

The Giornale d'Italia expressed the hope that the voice of the Pope urging peace will be accompanied by the sound of the cannon of the allies from Flanders to the gulf of Trieste attacking the enemy with renewed armor.

BERLIN DISCUSSES NOTE.

Amsterdam, Aug. 17.—The Kreuz Zeitung, of Berlin, a copy of which has been received here, says sympathy with the Pope's wish for peace must disappear when it is seen that he has united himself with such conditions as restorations and no indemnities.

The Berlin Taegliche Rundschau considers that the nature of the peace outlined by the Pope must compel the central powers to refuse the offices of the pontiff. This newspaper says it fears the affair will have an unhappy influence, not only in Austria, but among the Catholics in Germany.

The Koelnische Zeitung reserves judgment on the proposal until the full text of the Pope's note is obtained. Nevertheless, it considers the proposal to enter into negotiations on the basis of the pontiff's program should not be rejected. This newspaper asserts that it is not aware of the German government's attitude, but that it believes logic prescribes that the government, in conformity with its previous attitude, should follow the path indicated by the pontiff.

The Cologne Volks Zeitung also awaits the text of the proposal, but expresses the hope that, notwithstanding all obstacles, the road to the reconciliation of the nations may be paved by the Pope's appeal.

Order Restricting Saloons Near Mobilization Camps Modified

Washington, Aug. 17.—The war department has modified the order prohibiting a saloon or bar within half a mile of a military camp so as not to be effective where purely temporary camps are concerned.

The modification was caused by a situation in Kansas City where many saloons and leading hotel bars in the city were closed because some troops were being mobilized in Convention Hall.

Under the new ruling such temporary mobilization of troops will not be cause for closing bars and officers will be dependent on to restrain their men.

Woman Shoots Husband and Son, Then Commits Suicide

Chillicothe, Ohio, Aug. 17.—Bessie a woman named "Dora," from El Paso, Texas, had sent a telegram to her husband, notifying him that she was coming to claim him as her husband. James Nelson late last night shot and killed her husband, shot her eight-year-old boy and then killed herself. She died this morning.

The woman left a note explaining she had done the shooting. The Nelson family came here recently from El Paso, Ind. The father and husband was employed on construction work at the new army cantonment here.
