### VETERANS OF GRAND ARMY OF REPUBLIC PARADE IN BOSTON

Men Who Fought to Preserve Union More Than Half Century Ago Attend National Encampment of Order.

(By The Associated Press) Boston, Aug. 21.—Several thousand aged men in blue, survivors of the army which fought for the union more than half a century ago, marched with brass step through Boston streets today. The route was the shortest ever selected for the annual parade of the national encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic. The veterans were favored by a clear sky, moderate temperature and a refreshing breeze.

The chief marshal was J. Payson Bradley of this city. In the line were the departments of the Grand Army in order of seniority of organization. The national officers and past commanders-in-chief in automobiles, the Sons of Veterans, former prisoners of war, naval veterans and a rear guard of disabled veterans in cars. Commander-in-Chief William J. Patterson reviewed the parade from a large grandstand on the Tremont street side of the common. Governor McCall was at the state house and Mayor Curley at the city hall.

About 8000 blue coated, gray haired men were in line as compared with nearly 50,000 who formed the parade at the last reunion held in this city. Many of the veterans of 50 years and over rode in automobiles, but there were hundreds of nearly that age who marched over the entire route. For those who found their endurance unequal to this task, cars were stationed at various points in readiness to pick them up. Red Cross stations were called on to care for a few cases of slight heat prostration.

U. S. Grant post of New York headed the line as guard of honor carrying the colors of Commander-in-Chief Patterson. The Nebraska men attracted attention as they swung past one of the reviewing stands by singing: "We'll hang the kaiser to a sour apple tree."

Aside from the commander-in-chief, the individual veteran who received the most applause was E. E. Timmons of Pennsylvania, who served with the First California regiment in the war. Mr. Timmons is 78 years of age, but he tramped sturdily along the route wearing the uniform and equipment he had at Gettysburg, including his blanket roll, knapsack and canteen.

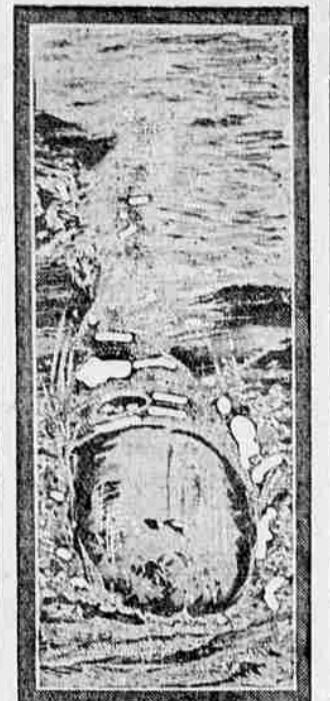

### NEED THOUSANDS TO FIGHT FOREST FIRES

Call Issued for Assistance in Combatting Conflagration in Bitter Root Mountains.

(By The Associated Press) Butte, Mont., Aug. 21.—A call was issued this morning by E. D. Gardner in charge of the local forestry office for all the men who are willing to take employment with the forestry department to fight fires along the Montana-Idaho line to report to him at once. Mr. Gardner announced that half a dozen forest fires in the Bitter Root mountains are threatening a conflagration more serious in their proportions than anything the department has been called upon to handle since the disastrous forest fire of 1910. Between 3,000 and 4,000 men have been employed in the last two weeks in western Montana to fight fires. The most threatening fire today is located at the crest of the mountains on the state line near Lolo Hot Springs. Two hundred men were sent out from here last night to join the forces combatting the flames.

### MARRIED MEN MUST SERVE UNDER DRAFT

No Modification of Present Rigid Ruling Regarding Exemptions Is Expected.

(By The Associated Press) Washington, Aug. 21.—If there is to be any modification of the present rigid rulings of the provost-marshal-general regarding exemptions of married men from draft, it is known only to President Wilson, who alone has authority to alter or modify those regulations. The war department so far, basing its rulings on what it interprets as the intention of congress in passing the draft law, has gone on the theory that a man's exemption was based on a condition of dependency, rather than on the mere condition of marriage. The department still holds to that view and will urge it upon the president. Today there was no intimation from any official source that the president intends to modify the rulings of the war office.
