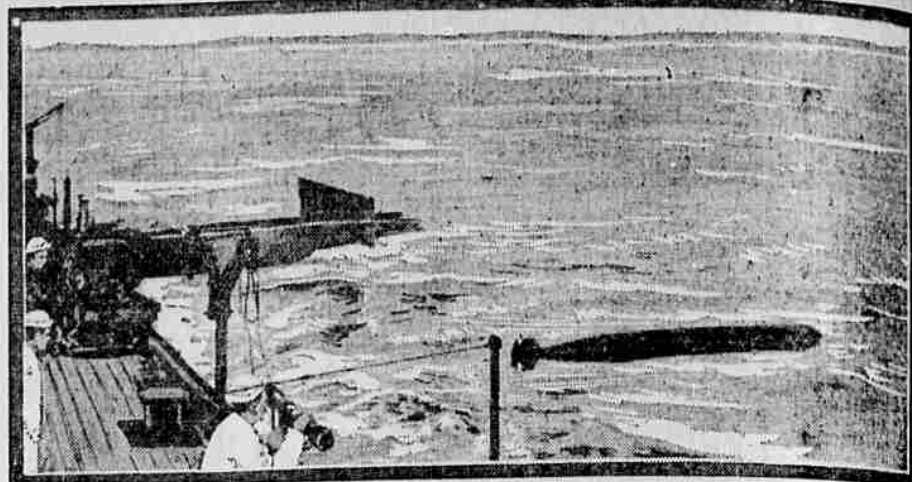


Torpedo of American Warship Poised in Midair.
