September Quoted at \$2.10, an Advance of 5 Cents Over Yesterday's Finish.

Chicago, Aug. 21.—Light offerings and a continued desire of shorts to cover lifted corn prices early in the session today, figures going about one cent above yesterday's close and then receding somewhat. High prices for livestock led to the belief that corn values might not be materially lessened. Opening prices ranged from 3-8 cents lower to 3-8 higher with December at \$1.08 1/2 to \$1.09 1-8 and May at \$1.07 to \$1.07 1/4. The early bulge took December to \$1.09 7-8 and May to \$1.08 from which points they settled back to about the opening figures.

Most of the trading was at about the opening figures. The close was steady 1-8 lower to 1-8 higher with December at \$1.08 5-8 to \$1.08 3-4 and May at \$1.07.

There was little trading in wheat. The opening trade in September was at \$2.07. Subsequent deals carried the figure to \$2.10.

Wheat trading was without significance and the prices paid reflected the desire to replenish holdings. The close was steady with September at \$2.10, an advance of 5 cents.

Oats, which opened easy, advanced and receded with corn prices.

Provisions continued responsive to the live hog advance and made moderate gains. October pork making the sharpest increase at the outset.
