LELAND LINER IS SUNK
(By The Associated Press)
Boston, Aug. 23.—The Leyland liner
Devonian, which left an Atlantic port on
July 28, has been sunk, presumably by
a German submarine. Officers of the line
today confirmed the report that the ves-
sel was lost but stated that they had
received no word as to the safety of the
crew.

The Devonian, a vessel of 10,435 tons
gross, was built at Belfast in 1900.
She carried a crew of sixty. Records
at the British consulate here showed
there were no Americans in the crew.

PARENTS OF BRITISH HERO LIVE IN EUGENE

Son of Mr. and Mrs. E. S.
Brooks Is Decorated With
Victoria Cross.

Company Sergeant Major Brooks, of
the 175th Overseas battalion of Cal-
gary, Alberta, Canada, son of Mr. and
Mrs. E. S. Brooks, of Eugene, has been
decorated with the Victoria cross for
bravery. Brooks is six feet five inches
in height and weighs 305 pounds. He is
credited with having charged a German
machine gun position single-handed.

An Associated Press correspondent
telling of Brooks' bravery states: "Com-
pany Sergeant Major Edmund Brooks
was fortunate enough to survive the fight
in which he won the coveted decoration.
He was in the second wave of an attack.
Seeing that the first wave had been
checked by a Prussian machine gun in a
close position, he leaped from the ranks
of the second wave, charged the position
single-handed, killed one of the gun crew
with his revolver, another with his bay-
onet and drove away the others. He then
turned the weapon against the Prussians
and later carried it back to his own
lines."

When Brooks first sought to enlist
in the Canadian army he was rejected
because of his size. He was finally ac-
cepted but was not permitted to go to
France with the first troops because it
was said that his body was too large
for trench fighting. He was detailed in
the recruiting service for several months
before being permitted to go aboard.

Brooks' parents recently received a
letter from him stating that he had just
been dismissed from a military hospital in
France. His grandfather was a Canadian.
His parents attribute his devotion to
the cause of Great Britain to this fact.

Brooks is a brother of Lloyd Brooks,
of Eugene; Roy Brooks, a brakeman in
the employ of the O. R. & N. of Port-
land, and Fred Brooks, a mailcarrier at
Marshfield.

DEER SEASON CLOSED UNTIL RAIN FALLS

Governor Withycombe Says
Hunting Forbidden Since the
21st Day of August.

The deer hunting season in Oregon is
now closed and has been closed since Au-
gust 21, according to a statement made
by Governor James Withycombe while in
this city last night. In the event of rain,
the season will open September 1. After
that date, it will open automatically with
the first rain.

Governor Withycombe before leaving
for Crescent City, Cal., to attend a good
roads conference, issued a proclamation
stating that the season which opened Au-
gust 15 would be closed August 21 in
the event there was no rainfall before
that date. This action was taken because
of the danger from forest fires.

he started to take some milk, on which
he has been practically living lately, and
was found a short time later, lying dead
on the floor.

TEUTON AIRMEN DROP BOMBS ON HOSPITALS

Raid Is Made Just After Injuries
of Injured Germans Had Been
Dressed.

On the French Front, Aug. 23.—In-
cendiary bombs which were dropped by
two German aviators on two hospitals
behind Verdun on Sunday evening kill-
ed ten wounded men, one woman nurse
and 19 trained male nurses. They wound-
ed 49 male nurses and inflicted further
injuries on patients suffering from
wounds received in battle, many of
whom rushed naked into nearby fields in
an attempt to find shelter from the
bombs which were being rained down.

Meanwhile the German aviators cir-
cled about in the air for half an hour,
firing their machine guns at hospital
orderlies who were endeavoring to ex-
tinguish the flames. The nurses had just
finished bandaging 180 wounded Germans
who had been brought direct from the
battlefield and had gone to bed when the
bombs were dropped from the height of
only 300 yards. The Red Cross signs
were painted prominently on the roofs,
and the Germans knew the hospital had
been in existence for more than a year.

The correspondent, after inspecting
the hospital visited a camp at which Ger-
man prisoners are assembled. It contain-
ed considerably more than 6,000 officers
and men. The correspondent was permit-
ted to interrogate a number of prisoners,
a number of whom are 18 or 19 years
of age. They all declared themselves
contented at being out of the war. On
the way other smaller camps containing
hundreds of prisoners were passed.

proposed new wage scales.
The question of calling a strike, Miller
said, had been laid before the metal
trades department of the American Fed-
eration of Labor by the sending of the
following telegram to A. J. Berres, the
department's secretary, at Washington,
D. C.:

"Shipping board has not given ship-
builders anything definite on wage ques-
tions up to this time. Strike vote being
taken, returnable not later than Monday.
If not decided by Monday, a strike will
undoubtedly be called, affecting 12,000
metal trades men. Organizations threat-
en to expel members quitting before this
time."

WILSON DISCUSSES STRIKES.

(By The Associated Press)
Washington, Aug. 23.—The general
strike situation throughout the country
was discussed today at a conference be-
tween President Wilson and President
Gompers of the American Federation of
Labor. Mr. Gompers declined to discuss
it further than to say that he had laid
"labor's just grievances" before the pres-
ident and that he had been assured that
the rights of labor would be cared for.

Some time ago Mr. Gompers was cred-
ited with having expressed the opinion
that unless labor had a better represen-
tation in handling some of the war labor
problems the no-strike promise made at
the beginning of hostilities might not be
respected.

LISTER MAKES APPEAL

(By The Associated Press)
Olympia, Wash., Aug. 23.—Governor
Lister in his Labor Day proclamation is-
sued today, refers to the strikes and
threats of strikes in Washington and
asks for a sentiment that will bring in-
dustrial peace. The proclamation says:
"Conditions in the industrial world
at the present moment render it par-
ticularly appropriate for us to earnestly
consider the labor situation in its in-
evitable relation to our progress and
prosperity, and, at this critical juncture
in world affairs, to our national safety
and well being.

"Now, therefore, I, Ernest Lister,
governor of the state of Washington, in
compliance with the law of the state and
in keeping with established customs, do
hereby proclaim and designate Monday,
September third, 1917, as labor day.

"And I most earnestly recommend
that the day be devoted to a very serious
consideration by all citizens, in such
manner and at such places as seem most
appropriate of the exceedingly complex
labor problems, now confronting the
state, with a view to an amicable and
permanent settlement of that problem,
guaranteeing justice to the laborer, to
the employer and to the public. Such
settlement can and must be made. Fail-
ure to make it means individual misery,
economic disaster and the placing of ad-
ded power in the hands of the enemy who
is menacing our common country. I am
confident the people of the state of
Washington will create that sentiment
which will bring about a speedy and last-
ing settlement of this problem."

FIRE CONDITIONS IN SIUSLAW FOREST

Very Few Extra Flame Fighters
Needed This Year; Little
Lumber Cut on Reservation.

Fire conditions are good on the Siu-
slaw forest reserve, stated Supervisor H.
B. Rankin, who returned from a trip to
the south part of the reserve, Wednes-
day afternoon. He stated that there were
no fires in the forest at present and very
few had menaced it this year. There
have been very few extra men employed
this year in fighting fire. Some fires
from outside have menaced the forests
but have done no damage.

Mr. Rankin states that there is com-
paratively little lumber or piling being
cut in the forests and that so far as he
has learned there are no labor troubles
in that part of the country.

Entente Forces Capture 25,000 in Three Days

London, Aug. 23.—"In the past
three days the entente forces on the
western front have taken 25,000
prisoners and since July 31 they
have taken 32,000 prisoners," said
Major-General Frederick S. Mau-
rice, chief director of the war in-
telligence office, in his weekly talk
with The Associated Press.

FRENCH CAPTURE 7,639.

(By The Associated Press)
Paris, Aug. 23.—The number of pris-
oners taken by the French in their of-
fensive operation on the Verdun front
has been increased to 7,639, the war of-
fice reports. Twenty-four cannon and
200 machine guns also have been cap-
tured. The French last night captured a
fortified German position north of Mort-
mont farm.
