HIGHWAY NORTH AND SOUTH ON CASCADES IS CONTEMPLATED

B. F. Beasley, Superintendent of Road Construction in Forestry Service, Tells of Plans for Skyline Road.

A highway in Oregon north and south along the summit of the Cascades is one of the projects considered by the United States forest service, according to B. F. Beasley, superintendent of road construction in that branch of government work, who arrived in Eugene last night after making a preliminary examination of a portion of the probable route for this skyline thoroughfare, which he says if constructed would be a scenic highway surpass all other roads in the west.

The plan is to build this road as near the summit of the mountains as possible, Mr. Beasley stated. It will be of great value in forest administration, supplanting present trails and will open a veritable wonderland to the tourists who travel that way, according to the engineer. Its scenic value would be tremendous, he said.

The portion of the route over which Pass to McKenzie Pass, a distance of 10 miles.

"I have been in this service for many years, but never in all my experience have I been in a country surpassing this for scenic grandeur," said Mr. Beasley. "A road between these two points would include Fish Lake and Clear Lake. These lakes in the mountains have been caused by the flow of lava where it has crossed a valley or ravine. Clear Lake is different from all the rest. It is clear, as its name signifies, and when you look down into it you see great forest trees standing as they did before the lake was created by the volcanic action. How long these trees have been there, no one knows. They appear to be from 75 to 100 feet in height and in a perfect state of preservation. I spent some time in an effort to make some photographs of them, but success will not be known until I have the films developed. There are no trees in other lakes in the Cascades I have visited, although these lakes were formed in much the same manner as Clear Lake."

Mr. Beasley and force of engineers yesterday completed a reconnaissance survey of that portion of the central Oregon highway from Blue River to the east side of the lava on the opposite side of the mountains. Their work carried them into the Deschutes three miles beyond the eastern boundary of the Cascade reserve and connected with a location survey made from that point to the town of Sisters last year. The road has now been surveyed, including both the reconnaissance and location surveys, from Blue River to Sisters, a distance of 45 miles.

Mr. Beasley will make a report of the work done this summer on the central Oregon highway to the various departments of the government. This report will be used to determine the amounts which must be spent by the state and federal government in building the road which will, according to Mr. Beasley, following closely along the lines of the present McKenzie highway.

Another advantage of the proposed road along the summit of the Cascades suggested by Mr. Beasley is that by making a connecting link between the road running from Albany through Santiam Pass and the McKenzie highway travelers desiring to reach southeastern Oregon road through McKenzie Pass, a shorter route in reaching southeastern Oregon from points north of Eugene will be provided.

British Troops Told of America's Aim in War

London, Aug. 27.—The Manchester Guardian says the government has been making the troops in France fully acquainted with the American attitude in the war. Dr. Kellman, a well-known clergyman who recently has been in the United States, has been touring the British front and lecturing to the troops at various centers on America's ideals, aspirations and endeavors. An officer who was present testified that the lectures have been a great success.

PUGLIESE PLEADS GUILTY; PAYS FINE

One of Occupants of Wrecked Car Assessed \$100 for Violation of Prohibitory Law.

Eugene Pugliese, one of the occupants of the Winton Six which was wrecked at Jenkins Point Wednesday night, pleaded guilty to the charge of unlawfully bringing liquor into the state before Justice Jesse G. Wells Saturday evening and was assessed a fine of \$100. Attorney M. G. Montezza, of Portland, came to Eugene to look after his interests here and advised that he plead guilty, which was done. They left Saturday evening for Portland. It was stated Saturday that his hand, which was injured when the car was wrecked, was in bad shape and it may be necessary to amputate one or two of the fingers.

MRS. MARY EVANS DIES AT HOME OF DAUGHTER

Mrs. Mary Evans, mother of Mrs. Henry Wagner, of Hayden Bridge, died Saturday night, August 25, 1917, at the home of Mrs. Wagner. The funeral was held at the undertaking parlors of Branstetter and McLaughlin Sunday afternoon and the remains taken to Oakdale, Wash., for interment Sunday night.

The deceased was 93 years of age, having been born on Christmas day, 1824, in the state of New York. She was married at the age of 16 to Isaac Linn with whom she lived 40 years before his death. To them were born nine children, of whom four survive, three sons in New York and one daughter in Oregon.

Mrs. Linn was married to Wm. Evans, in Iowa, where they lived for several years before moving to Oakdale, Wash., where he died.

Mrs. Evans was said to have been a remarkably well preserved woman for her age.

BAPTIST MINISTER RETIRES TO ENTER ARMY Y. M. C. A. WORK

Rev. H. W. Davis Believes Every "Red-Blooded" Man Should Be With Those in the Fight; to Go to American Lake.

Rev. H. W. Davis, pastor of the First Baptist church of Eugene, on Monday announced his retirement from his pastorate here to engage in war work. Rev. Davis, who is president of the Eugene Ministerial association and chairman of the Lane County Red Cross committee, will become a religious director for the Young Men's Christian association. He expects to be first detailed for service at the American Lake cantonment and may later be sent to France.

Reverend Davis is the only Baptist minister in Oregon to be selected for war work as a religious director by the Y. M. C. A. The only other minister from Oregon who will engage in this service is Reverend Clark, Presbyterian pastor at The Dalles.

Rev. Davis several weeks ago received a notification from the national war council of the Y. M. C. A. that the application had been accepted. He was called to Seattle, Wash., at that time for a conference with association officers and to receive instructions.

"It seems to me that in this time of national crisis every red-blooded man that can do so should be with the men who are making the fight," Rev. Davis stated today. "I look to the Y. M. C. A. work with the army as the most important work of the present generation. It is just as important to preserve the moral of the army as it is to equip the army for fighting. Most of these men are going to come back as citizens and we want to surround them with the right influences while they are away."

The Y. M. C. A. will, according to present plans, have eight buildings at the American Lake cantonment camp, or one building for every 5,000 men. Each building will have officers as follows: Religious work director, educational secretary, physical director and building secretary. Rev. Davis, during the period of training the first troops assembled under the draft, will have charge of the religious work in one of those buildings.

The association in its selection of officers has sought to secure men experienced in working among men. Rev. Davis is a man of much experience in this line. He was religious director of Y. M. C. A. work in San Francisco for three years before the earthquake and fire and served in a similar capacity for one year in Portland before being chosen as pastor of the First Baptist church in Eugene seven years ago.

Rev. Davis is the oldest minister in a Lane county church to retire from a pastorate to enter the war work within a week. Rev. Chris H. Jensen, pastor of the First Christian church of Springfield, preached his farewell sermon last Sunday night and left Thursday for Presidio, Cal., to receive instruction at the second officers' training camp.

COLLEGE ATHLETICS TO BE MAINTAINED

Oregon Will Follow Plan of National Collegiate Association in Activities the Coming Year

The University of Oregon was one of the first colleges in the country to announce its decision in favor of a continuance of intercollegiate athletics despite the war. An announcement by President P. L. Campbell soon after the declaration of a state of hostilities included a program of sports with the idea of athletics developed for all students rather than for a chosen few, intercollegiate games to be retained to the extent of giving the athletic activities of the college zest. Indications are that with the opening of school in the fall, an athletic program along the line suggested by President Campbell will be carried out.

In fact the position of the University in relation to sports in war times has been strengthened by resolutions adopted at a recent meeting of the National Collegiate Athletic association, in Washington, D. C., attended by representatives of 52 of the leading universities and colleges of the country.

The resolution outlines recommendations for all the colleges of the nation as follows:

First—That athletic sports be continued during the coming year, with an increased effort to develop athletics for all students.

Second—That the schedule for intercollegiate sports be carried out so far as local conditions allow, care being taken not to interfere with the military training of the students or to conflict with the military interests of the nation.

Third—That there be no pre-season coaching during the coming academic year.

Fourth—That training tables be given up.

Fifth—That professional coaching and the expenses incidental thereto be reduced to a minimum.

Sixth—That the number of officials at intercollegiate games and their fees be kept as low as possible.

The resolutions reiterate the belief of the national association in the freshman
