DISCIPLINE IN ARMY BIG RUSS ISSUE

torious in battle. The import of the demonstration is emphasized by the fact that not one member of the cabinet was at the railway station, but instead there was an imposing display by the military and civilian admirers of General Korniloff.

During the morning General Korniloff's biography and his photographs were distributed free of the organizers of the demonstration. Officers went about the streets exhorting veterans of the war and particularly cavaliers of the Order of St. George to go to the railway station, explaining to them that duty compelled every patriotic man to support the "destined savior of Russia" from foreign defense and internal disintegration.

At the station when the commander-in-chief arrived was General Verhokoff, commander-in-chief of the Moscow military district; Mayor Rudneff with a deputation from the municipality; a group of socialist members of the conference, headed by M. Roditcheff, the veteran member of the duma as well as leaders of Moscow's industries.

Insists on Strong Measures.
The sole subject of conversation was the necessity of supporting General Korniloff's demand for strong measures, including capital punishment among the forces of disorder in the rear of the fighting army.

The station was filled with deputations of Cossacks and guards of honor, the chief guard of honor being composed of the much decorated cavaliers of St. George, youths from a military academy and Cossacks. Every man of the guard of honor, following the Russian army practice when welcoming a specially loved commander, held a rose and another flower. There was also present a group of seven boy volunteers, none over 10 years of age, all of whom had fought since the beginning of the war and a girl volunteer who had been wounded twice on the field of battle.

General Korniloff alighted from the train soon after noon, followed by a body guard of Terak Cossacks, gigantic Asiatics in prime colored caftans, leather belts and vast shaggy sheepskin bushes.

General Korniloff, who is of Cossack parentage, resembles a Japanese. He is below middle height and of medium size. He has small black eyes and a sparse Tartar beard. His manner was grave and modest as he inspected the guard of honor. He spoke to some of the soldiers and each soldier threw a flower under his feet as he passed.

Mayor Rudneff welcomed General Korniloff on behalf of the city of Moscow. The mayor declared that the general was not only the destined victor at the front, but the savior of Russia from ruin at home. As General Korniloff marched between lines of soldiers toward M. Roditcheff, the officers drew their swords and the band played the Marseillaise.

Addressing the Russian commander,

M. Roditcheff said:

"Russia has all her army wants, arms, supplies and a brilliant commander. All she lacks is a fighting spirit in her soldiers. It is you, general, who have the will and the means to restore that spirit."

After kissing M. Roditcheff, General Korniloff made a brief speech, roughly phrased, but impressive by its unpretentiousness.

"We expect from Moscow," General Korniloff said, "a message to the army. That message, I hope, will not in this grave crisis be of liberty and equality in the name of which, falsely interpreted, Russia's people have been driven off the right track, but a message of victory and order. For myself, at any sacrifice I shall do all in my power to turn that message into reality. I believe in and I predict the resurrection of our army."

As General Korniloff left the station he was given a tremendous ovation by the military and civilian population. The working classes, however, were absent. In view of the sharply defined attitude of General Korniloff towards the cabinet and the socialists, his declaration to the conference tomorrow is awaited with the keenest interest. His intimates, however, declare that owing to his position he will not indulge in any sharp attacks. They say that the program of the military party and its criticism of the government probably will appear in a speech which General Alexieff, the former commander-in-chief, already has prepared.

Must Reinforce Army.

"The strength of every army depends upon conditions in the district in its rear," General Korniloff continued. "The blood which will inevitably flow during the restoration period may be shed in vain if the army, having been reorganized and prepared for battle, remains without reinforcements and fresh supplies of projectiles and equipment. I therefore think it indispensable that the measures taken at the front should also be applied in the rear."

The commander-in-chief went on to say that according to information at his disposal the condition of the railways was such that by November the army would not receive any more supplies. In support of his statement he quoted a telegram from the commander-in-chief of the southwestern front saying that the shortage of bread and biscuit on this front amounted almost to famine. General Korniloff then read figures relating to the production of war materials which he said had decreased compared with the period from October 1916 to January 1917, by sixty per cent for guns and shells and 80 per cent for airplanes.

"If this state of affairs continues," he added, "the Russian armies will find themselves in the same state as in the spring of 1915, at the time of the retreat in Poland, Galicia and the Carpathians."

COUNCIL HOLDS SECOND SESSION.

Moscow, Monday, Aug. 27.—The second general sitting of the national conference was held this afternoon. General Korniloff, the commander-in-chief, entered the hall in company with Premier Kerensky. His appearance was the signal for prolonged cheers.

Vladimir Nabokoff, a prominent social democrat, speaking in the name of the first duma, declared the country aimed at the establishment of a strong and independent power, uninfluenced by political parties; a power, which based on democratic principles would establish obedience to the law, civil liberty and personal security. The speaker emphasized the absolute necessity of the independence of the high command of the army from every private influence.

M. Nabokoff said the members of the first duma repudiated with indignation all thoughts of a separate peace and that if they were to have peace they did not desire it to be the result of German vic-

HOPPESS TO SUCCEED ROSS AS COW TESTER

Creamery Man Succeeds Junction City Association Official Called to Serve in Army.

O. N. Hoppe, formerly with the Junction City creamery, has been secured as official cow tester by the Junction City cow testing association to succeed L. N. Ross, who was drafted into the new national army from Los Angeles, where he was registered. Mr. Hoppe has been engaged in creamery and dairy work for a number of years and has just spent several weeks with the herdsman at the Oregon Agricultural college, getting the latest and most approved methods of feeding. It is the intention of Mr. Hoppe to also take up the testing of skim milk for the members, in order to check up poor skimming, and consequent loss of profits.

SCHOOLS WILL TEACH FOOD CONSERVATION

Special Attention Will Be Given This Subject in Rural Districts the Coming Year.

Food conservation will be one of the subjects which will receive special attention in Lane county rural schools the coming year, according to Floyd L. Senter, county school supervisor. Copies of a pamphlet entitled "Ten Lessons in Food Conservation," prepared under the direction of Herbert C. Hoover, food administrator, have been received from P. P. Claxton, commissioner of the Bureau of Education in the United States Agricultural department and will be distributed to the teachers of Lane county to be used in connection with this work.

Anxiety for Safety of Explorers Is Relieved

Pittsburg, Aug. 28.—Anxiety of friends here for the safety of Daniel M. Wise and Bradley Jones, who were reported in a letter received in San Francisco Sunday as being in danger of death in a jungle in South America, has been relieved by a later letter, which told of their hazardous adventures, expressed the hope that the two men would be able to push through the mountains of Peru to the coast. Wise and Jones, it was learned today, set out on an expedition to South America on September 30, 1916, and are connected with the department of terrestrial magnetism of Carnegie Institute of Washington, D. C., instead of the Carnegie Institute of Pittsburg, as previously reported.

The later letter was mailed at Uchiza, Peru, and was written by Wise while they were on the river Huallaga, a branch of the Amazon. At the time of writing the party had not eaten bread for more than three weeks and had been subsisting on green bananas, either boiled or baked. A number of valuable scientific instruments and their entire supply of money was lost a few days before the letter was written when their canoe struck a snag and capsized. To reach the coast, Wise wrote, they would have to cross two ranges of the Andes and pass through several belts where malignant fevers and diseases are common.

Will Go to Deadwood to Attend Big Harvester Picnic

GREEK STEAMER SUNK.

An Atlantic Port, Aug. 28.—The Greek steamship Nea Eklia, a vessel of 3,517 tons gross register which left Baltimore May 20 with a cargo of grain for Italy was sunk June 9 in the Mediterranean by a German submarine, according to William White, a member of the crew who arrived here today on a French steamer. No lives were lost, White said, the ship being sunk by gunfire after the crew had taken to the lifeboats. They were picked up by a French cruiser and landed at Saloniki.

RUSS SECRETS GIVEN TO GERMAN AGENTS

General Ivanoff Is Witness at Trial of Soukhomlinoff for High Treason.

(By The Associated Press)

Petrograd, Aug. 28.—At the trial for high treason of General Soukhomlinoff, former minister of war, General Ivanoff, former commander in Volynia and Galicia, testified yesterday he had information showing that military secrets had been communicated direct from Petrograd to Germany and Austria by way of Warsaw.

General Velitchko, deputy director of the engineer corps, said he regarded General Soukhomlinoff as having been principally responsible for the defeats of the Russian army.

As soon as he was appointed minister of war, the witness testified, he suppressed various councils created for the purpose of discussing questions of national defense.

Former Emperor Nicholas, General Velitchko said, should not be held responsible for the military misfortune of Russia, as he saw everything through the spectacles of General Soukhomlinoff.

WILL LIST GROWERS OF SEEDS FOR MARKET

County Agricultural Agent Has Asked for Addresses of Lane County Raisers.

County Agricultural Agent N. S. Robb will establish a clearing house for the distribution of information regarding the securing of pure seeds. He has received an inquiry from the seed marketing section of the bureau of markets of federal department of agriculture asking the names of all seed growers in the county. Mr. Robb has asked that all seed growers communicate with him and let him know what seeds they raise and the quantity available. By seed grower, one is meant who makes a specialty of raising seeds pure as to variety and raised especially for market for seed purposes. Mr. Robb states that one reason why Willamette valley wheat grades so low in the terminal markets is that the varieties are badly mixed, and the same rule holds with other seeds. Mr. Robb also states that pure seed is one of the most vital elements in growing of good crops. He states that it is essential that this list be completed at an early date so that the campaign for seed conservation can be under way by the time the seed is harvested this year. The seed marketing section of the bureau of markets will list all seed growers reporting to Mr. Robb and thus assist in gaining a market for Lane county seeds. Mr. Robb also states that the farmers of Lane county will find that the use of better seed will influence the yield and market value to such an extent as to more than pay for the extra time and expense of securing good seed.

International Meeting at Stockholm Planned

Stockholm, Aug. 28.—An international conference of women from both belligerent and neutral countries will be held here September 16-18. The conference will be of a semi-private nature.

Italian Army Officers Make Visit to America

Bethlehem Steel Company to Increase Capital Stock

New York, Aug. 28.—Bethlehem Steel corporation's new financial plan was announced here today, the chief feature of which is that holders of old and new common stock will have the right to subscribe at par to \$30,000,000 of eight per cent cumulative preferred stock. The shares will be convertible into common stock, class B, at \$115 a share.

The new issue has been underwritten by a banking syndicate. The plan will be presented for ratification at a stockholders' special meeting September 14.
