French Aviator in Flight Is Saved by His Colleague
Somewhere on the French Front, Sunday, Aug. 26.—Lieutenant Raoul Lufberry of the Lafayette squadron, saved

his colleague in a patrol flight, Sergeant Robert Soubrin, of south Boston, from death today when Soubrin was suddenly attacked by four German machines of the Albatross type while he was flying at a low altitude. The German machines were over Soubrin, attempting to down him, when Lufberry, seeing his companion's plight, darted at the enemy aviators, scattering them and allowing Soubrin to escape.

Cottage Grove Attorney Tells of Sawmill Fire
Alta King, a Cottage Grove attorney, was in Eugene Tuesday and in speaking of the fire which destroyed the mill of the Brown Lumber company, Monday night expressed the opinion that it might result in opening up the Lorane district by a new railroad. Mr. King stated that the interests reported to be connected with the mill had large holdings of lumber west and southwest of Cottage Grove and it is possible that they may decide to build a mill in that section and put in a railroad, thus help to bring marketing facilities to a community now without them.

Mr. King stated that he had no inside information, but that the possibility of such a move had been known for a long time and the fire might hasten its consummation.
