Berlin, Tuesday, Aug. 28, via London, Aug. 29.—The newspapers denounce as wholly false the reference made by Premier Kerensky in addressing the Moscow conference, to a recent offer of a separate peace. Nothing is known of such a move in any official quarters here.

FINNS KILLED IN RIOT

London, Aug. 29.—Serious rioting at Bjorneborg, Finland, is reported in a private telegram from Haparanda to Copenhagen forwarded by the Central News to London. It is said fighting between Finns and soldiers of the Russian garrison lasted for several hours and that a number of persons were killed or wounded.

This is the day set for reassembling of the Finnish landing in defiance of the dissolution of the provisional Russian government. In his address at the opening of the Moscow conference Premier Kerensky gave warning that the government would prevent by force reopening of the diet and the carrying out of the plan for a separation of Finland from Russia.

GERMAN PRESS COMMENTS.

Amsterdam, Aug. 29.—German newspapers are not disposed favorably toward the Moscow conference. The Cologne Gazette describes it as the "comedy of Moscow," adding that it is intended to excite the Russian people to further mad sacrifices. The Kreuz Zeitung says: "Premier Kerensky's speech proves that the Russian government is acting autocratically. The Russian peasant has to bleed at the government's command and without knowing the government's aims. This is the freedom which the revolution has given the country."

Declares Wilson's Reply Is Farewell to Autocracy

Washington, Aug. 29.—Upon motion of Senator Brady, who characterized it as a last farewell to the autocracy of the world, President Wilson's reply to the pope's peace proposals was ordered printed today in the Congressional Record.

"While it rejects the pope's proposals," said he, "it points the way for the other nations to reach a peace in a fair and honorable manner."

Chairman Stone of the senate foreign relations committee made this comment:

"The note was just what I expected it would be. It was a strong note, as are all notes of the president."

"It was a very good note," said Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, ranking republican of the committee.

MINE FIELD ADRIPT

Copenhagen, Aug. 29.—Steamships arriving from Bergen report hundreds of drifting mines off the Norwegian coast. It is believed that an extensive mine field is adrift. Many mines also are reported off the northern coast of Norway and in the Arctic ocean.

GERMAN PLANT BURNS

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PROPOSAL BY POPE IS REJECTED

ent peoples, dated August 1, 1917, the President of the United States requests me to transmit the following reply:

"Every heart that has not been blinded and hardened by this terrible war must be touched by this moving appeal of His Holiness the Pope, must feel the dignity and force of the humane and generous motives which prompted it, and must fervently wish that we might take the path of peace he so persuasively points out. But it would be folly to take it if it does not in fact lead to the goal he proposes.

"Our response must be based upon the stern facts and upon nothing else. It is not a mere cessation of arms he desires; it is a stable and enduring peace. This agony must not be gone through with again and it must be a matter of very sober judgment what will insure us against it.

"His Holiness, in substance, proposes that we return to the status quo ante bellum and that then there be a general condemnation, disarmament and a concert of nations, based upon an acceptance of the principle of arbitration; that by a similar concert freedom of the seas be established; and that the territorial claims of France and Italy, the perplexing problems of the Balkan states and the restitution of Poland be left to such conciliatory adjustments as may be possible in the new temper of such a peace, due regard being paid to the aspirations of the peoples whose political fortunes and affiliations will be involved.

Autocracy is Condemned.
"It is manifest that no part of this programme can be successfully carried unless the restitution of the status quo ante bellum be a firm and satisfactory basis for it. The object of this war is to deliver the free peoples of the world from the menace and the actual power of a vast military establishment controlled by an irresponsible government which, having secretly planned to dominate the world, proceeded to carry the plan out without regard either to the sacred obligations of treaty or the long-established practices and long-cherished principles of international honor; which chose its own time for the war; delivered its blow fiercely and suddenly; stopped at no barrier either of law or of mercy; swept a whole continent within the tide of blood not the blood of soldiers only but the blood of innocent women and children also, and of the helpless poor, and now stands harked but not defeated, the enemy of four-fifths of the world.

"This power is not the German people. It is no business of ours how that great people came under its control, or submitted with temporary zest to the domination of its purposes, but it is our business to see to it that the history of the world is not longer left to its handling.

German's Word Doubtful.
"To deal with such a power by way of peace upon the plan proposed by His Holiness the Pope would, so far as we can see, involve a recuperation of its strength and a renewal of its policy; would make it necessary to create a hostile combination of nations against the German people, who are its instruments, and would result in abandoning the new-born Russia to the intrigue, the manifold subtle interference and the certain counter-revolution which would be attempted by all the malign influences to which the German government has of late accustomed the world. Can peace be based upon a restitution of its power or upon any word of honor it could pledge in a treaty of settlement and accommodation?

"Responsible statesmen must now everywhere see, if they never saw before, that no peace can rest securely upon political or economic restrictions meant to benefit some nations and cripple or embarrass others; upon vindictive action of any sort or any kind of revenge or deliberate injury.

America Suffers Wrongs.
"The American people have suffered intolerable wrongs at the hands of the imperial German government, but they desire no reprisal upon the German people, who have themselves suffered all things in this war, which they did not choose. They believe that peace should rest upon the rights of peoples, not the rights of governments—the rights of peoples great or small, weak or powerful; their equal right to freedom and security and self-government and to a participation upon fair terms in the economic opportunities of the world—the German people, of course, included, if they will accept equality and not seek domination.

"The test, therefore, of every plan of peace is this:

Tests of Peace Listed.

"It is based upon the faith of all the people involved or merely upon the word of an ambitious and intriguing government on the one hand and of a group of free peoples on the other? This is a test which goes to the root of the matter, and it is the test which must be applied.

"The purposes of the United States in this war are known to the whole world—to every people to whom the truth has been permitted to come. They do not need to be stated again. We seek no material advantage of any kind. We believe that the intolerable wrongs done by this war by furious and brutal power of the imperial German government ought to be repaired, but not at the expense of the sovereignty of any people—rather a vindication of the sovereignty both of

those that are weak and those that are strong.

Damages Not Demanded.
"Punitive damages, the dismemberment of empires, the establishment of selfish and exclusive economic leagues, we deem inexpedient and in the end worse than futile and no proper basis for a peace of any kind, least of all for an enduring peace. That must be based upon justice and fairness and the common rights of mankind.

"We cannot take the word of the present rulers of Germany as a guarantee of anything that is to endure unless explicitly supported by such conclusive evidence of the will and purpose of the German peoples themselves, as the other peoples of the world would be justified in accepting.

"Without such a guarantee, treaties of settlement, agreements for disarmament, covenants to set up arbitration in the place of force, territorial adjustments, restitutions of small nations, if made with the German government, no man, no nation could now depend upon. We must await some new evidence of the purposes of the great peoples of the central powers. God grant it may be given soon and in a way to restore the confidence of all peoples everywhere in the faith of nations and the possibility of a covenanted peace.

Paris, Aug. 29.—Captain Giulio Laureami, an aviator in the Italian army, has established a new world's long distance record by flying more than 900 miles without stopping, according to a despatch to the Temps from Milan. The Italian flew from Turin to Naples and returned, a distance of 920 miles as the crow flies.

Captain Laureami used a new S. L. A. machine with a Fiat motor. He left Turin at 10:37 a. m., and reached Naples at 12:30 p. m., flew over that city and was back in Turin at 8:40 p. m.

Socialists in London Plan Drafts of Peace Terms

London, Aug. 29.—The inter-allied socialist and labor conference, which devoted itself yesterday to preliminaries, met today to consider the reports of two commissions, one appointed to deal with the general question of the international socialist conference at Stockholm, the other to consider and report on the drafts of peace terms submitted by the various socialist parties.

The views of the different elements were so widely divergent that it was considered unlikely that the commissions would have their reports ready, however, and when the delegates met this morning adjournment was taken until afternoon to give the commissions more time.

At yesterday's sitting the Russian delegates who at first were present merely as spectators, expressed willingness to take part in the conference as it is merely "consultative" and therefore binds no party.

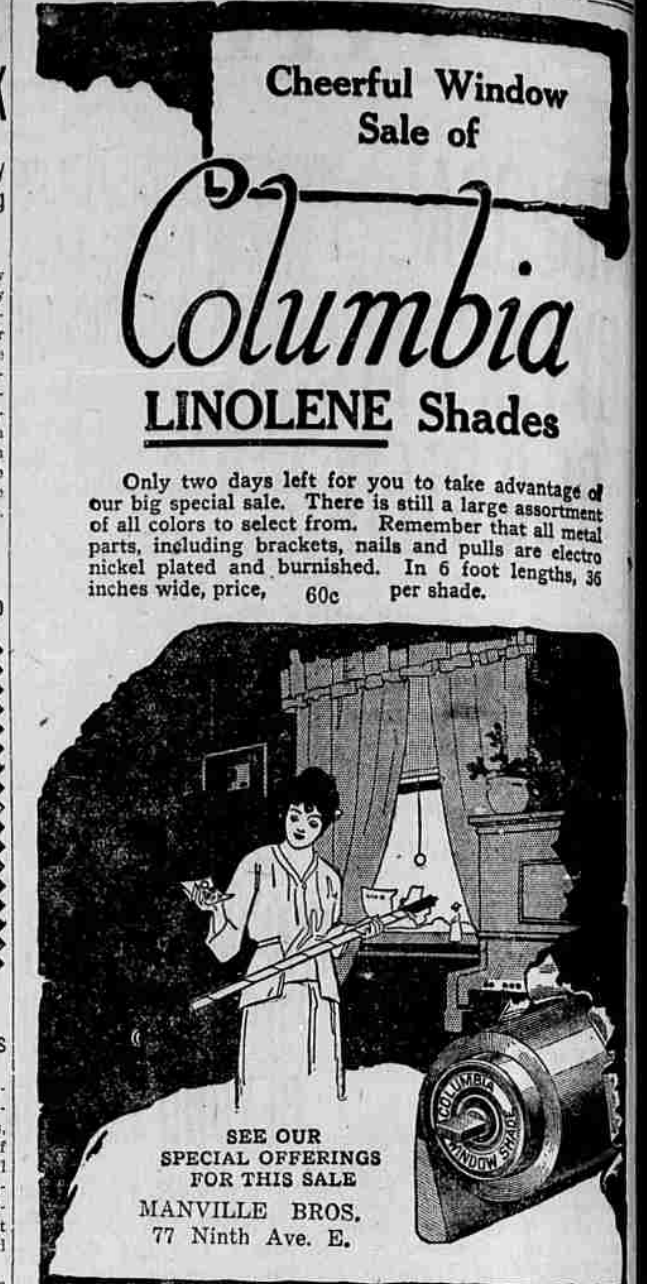
