**BOYS ARE RELEASED  
AFTER STORY IS TOLD**

**Youths Arrested by Fire Warden Released When He Fails to Appear to Prosecute.**

Two brothers, aged 15 and 17, living near Dexter, who were arrested by Deputy Fire Warden Patton at their home Wednesday were released by Judge Bown Thursday morning. The fire warden telephoned to Eugene that he had two fire setters, and a patrol of the Third Oregon Infantry was rushed up there. They found the boys under arrest and brought them down and turned them over to District Attorney Ray, who with F. A. Thraasher, federal investigator, questioned them. The boys claimed that they were in the woods peeling chittum bark and had set no fires.

The younger one was carrying a .32 caliber revolver and it was taken possession of by the county judge. The lad also admitted smoking cigarettes and was given a lecture for that. Mr. Patton had phoned down that he would appear against the boys when wanted, but had not come in with them, and both the district attorney and the county judge decided that they would not hold them unless formal charges were filed. They had received no information as to the evidence against the boys, nor did the soldiers have any.

**WILSON TO DECIDE  
ON PRICE OF WHEAT**

**Commission Apparently Unable to Agree; Chief Executive Will Make Announcement.**

(By The Associated Press)  
Washington, Aug. 30.—The wheat price-fixing committee carried its deliberations into the third day in an effort to reach an agreement on a fair valuation for the 1917 crop. Decision on the question was expected before the close of the day's session.

The report will be made to President Wilson who will make the announcement. The decision to submit a report to President Wilson, with recommendations was taken to indicate that it had not been able to agree wholly on a price and that the president would in effect cast the deciding vote.

Announcement will be made at the White House after the president has reviewed the recommendations and approved a price.

**\$1,000,000 WORTH OF  
CROPS ARE SAVED BY  
KILLING SQUIRRELS**

**Department of Agriculture and  
State Authorities Carry on  
Campaign in North Dakota.  
Similar Work Started in West**

(By The Associated Press)  
Washington, Aug. 30.—More than a million dollars worth of crops were saved from ground squirrels in North Dakota this year as a result of a campaign conducted by the department of agriculture in co-operation with state authorities.

The squirrels on seven million acres in North Dakota were killed by means of poison at a cost of about five cents an acre. Nearly twenty thousand farmers assisted in the work.

Similar work has been started in Montana, Idaho and Oregon and interest is being developed in Nevada and California in organizing like campaigns of extermination.

**FIRE CONDITIONS  
ARE BETTER TODAY**

**Reports From Noti and Marcola  
Show Danger Passed if the  
Weather Remains Calm.**

Reports received from the lumber company at Elmira, state that the fire east of Noti is practically under control. It burned a small quantity of logs for that company, but danger to either green timber or logs is thought to be past.

The Fisher Lumber company at Marcola, reported Thursday forenoon that the fire which threatened to do great damage Wednesday had been gotten under control and all danger of damage to the mill or plant was thought to be passed.

A fire which has been burning for nearly a month in the old slashings of the Coast Lumber company suddenly commenced running toward the mills and camps of the Fischer Lumber company, of Marcola, Wednesday afternoon, having burned across the mountain that day. A force of men was sent from the mill to fight fire and fifty shovels were ordered from Eugene.

**Gas Fumes Annoy; Find  
Combustion Fire in Coal**

For three days employees and passengers at the Oregon Electric passenger depot have been greatly annoyed by ill-smelling gas fumes which filled the rooms and were noticeable about the grounds. It was not known where they came from at first, but upon investigation it was found that the whole basement was full of smoke and gas occasioned by a spontaneous combustion fire in the coal piled there for fuel. There is no blaze, and so no danger from fire. Workmen are now employed in removing the coal and wood and piling it outside, until the smoke clears away. It will then be piled in differently.

**Mexican Silver Dollar  
Is Now Worth 70 1-2 Cents**

(By The Associated Press)  
Washington, Aug. 30.—The Mexican silver dollar, the value of which has long been established at approximately 50c in American money, has risen to a new high standard because of the soaring price of silver. At today's market quotation the silver contained in a Mexican dollar is worth 70 1/2 cents, a new high record. Mexican paper money, however, does not share in the same high value.

**MRS. WALSH DEAD.**  
Washington, Aug. 30.—Mrs. J. Walsh, wife of the senator from Montana, died in a hospital in Baltimore early today. Mrs. Walsh had been in ill health for several months. The body will be taken to her home in Helena, Mont., where the funeral will be held. Mrs. Walsh during the last election was head of a woman's organization working for President Wilson's re-election.

**RUSSIAN CITY BURNS.**  
Petrograd, Aug. 27.—Many persons were injured in a fire which broke out in the city of Kazan, on the Kama river, 430 miles east of Moscow, on Monday. The flames spread rapidly and caused much destruction. Martial law has been proclaimed.
