33 MEN FROM THIRD IN SICK QUARTERS

Sore Arms and Headaches Follow Vaccination and Prophylaxis Injections at Fort.

First Sergeant Stam and Corporal Fletcher of the Second company have been working until midnight for the past three days getting the pay roll of the Second company in shape. Pay day is expected early next week.

Lieutenant Williams and McKey who reported here from the Presidio training camp have been assigned to the Second company, C. A. C. This is a company of regulars and not Oregon troops.

Ice-cream was served to the Second company last night at mess. The treat was given by Corporal W. B. Follett of the company.

Any books or magazines that Eugene people can send the boys will be appreciated. Though electric lights have not been installed in the camps of the Second company, the boys have candles and also some daylight to use.

Lieutenant K. P. Cecil has been assigned to the Second company. He spent the summer at the Presidio training camp. Lieutenant Cecil took quarters at the camp last night.

KINGDOM OF POLAND MAY BE ABANDONED

Pan-German Newspapers Begin Campaign for Abandonment of Idea.

Copenhagen, Aug. 31.—The Taegliche Rundschau of Berlin gives a new version of the reason for the retirement of the Polish council of state, saying that instead of resigning, it was dissolved because it ventured to present an ultimatum to the German government on military questions. The retirement of the council has brought out the fact that at the confidential session of the reichstag main committee on Monday the majority parties demanded the establishment of a really representative assembly and a responsible ministry in Poland—a step which the Rundschau declares would lead to an immediate demand for the withdrawal of Germans from Poland.

The Pan-German newspapers have begun a campaign for abandonment of the idea of a Polish kingdom. Newspapers of all shades of opinion agree that there is little friendship for Germany among the Polish population.

INVOICE OF NATION'S FOOD TAKEN TODAY

Volunteer Army of Housewives, Merchants and Farmers Take Part in Work.

Washington, Aug. 31.—A volunteer army made up of ten thousand American housewives, three hundred and fifty thousand merchants and thirty-five thousand farmers, is today engaged in taking an inventory of the nation's food supplies. They are taking stock of the food they have on hand, on the pantry and preserve closet, on the shelves and under the counter, in warehouses and grain elevators and in barns and bins on the farm.

As soon as the returns from today's inventory are complete they will be forwarded to Washington for tabulation, and the results will be announced later.

17 Japanese Believed to Have Lost Lives at Sea

Seward, Alaska, Aug. 31.—Chief Officer K. Matsudo and 31 survivors of the Japanese freight steamer Kotobira Maru, which was wrecked July 27 in Alaskan waters, have been landed here by the steamer Santa Ana, which brought them from a port which they reached after the wreck. The survivors fear that Captain Harabiko Shouga and 16 other members of the crew have perished, as nothing has been heard of them since they put out from the wreck in a lifeboat. The survivors will sail for Seattle next Saturday.

DENTIST MUST JOIN SOME SERVICE BRANCH

If D. E. Hardenbrook Is Not Taken by Dental Reserve Corps, Draft Will Apply.

Dalles E. Hardenbrook, a dentist of Brookings, Curry county, must be accepted in the Dental Reserve corps of the United States army within 60 days or be drafted into the new National army, according to a ruling made Thursday by the appeal board of the Second district of Oregon.

Hardenbrook made a claim for exemption on the ground that he planned to enter the dental corps in the army. He submitted correspondence to show that both he and his wife, who is also a dentist, had made application for enrollment in that branch of the service.

The board for the district was today served with notices of appeals to the president by seven Italian residents of Klamath county.

METHOD OF KNITTING DETERMINES SIZES

Illustration of Loose and Tight Work Shown; Box Packed Thursday at Red Cross.

An illustration of the results of knitting in different ways is shown by the sizes of the socks which were packed at the Red Cross headquarters Thursday. Of the 33 pairs all wool day socks, which had been asked for in sizes 10, 11 and 12, there were two dozen pairs which measured 12 inches, one dozen which measured 11 1/2 inches, 16 dozen pairs which measured 11 inches, nine dozen pairs which measured 10 1/2 inches and five dozen pairs which measured 10 inches. This variance is explained by the fact that some ladies knit looser than others and shows how the different sizes are obtained.

Besides the day socks, eight and one-half dozen pairs of bed socks, and nine dozen pairs of wristers were packed for shipment. Mrs. George Midgley is secretary of the knitting classes.

American Banker in London Will Aid Food Administrator

London, Aug. 31.—Louis P. Sheldon, who is associated with a London banking firm, has been asked by Herbert C. Hoover to accept appointment as representative of the American administration board in the United Kingdom. It is understood Mr. Sheldon, who is a Yale graduate, has accepted and that it is now being determined whether he shall become an attaché of the American embassy.

As Mr. Hoover's representative, Mr. Sheldon will deal with the British food controller for the purpose of bringing about close co-operation between the United States and England in regard to the control of food.

Title of Jewish Regiment Is Abandoned by British

London, Aug. 31.—A deputation of prominent English Jews headed by Lord Swaythling visited the Earl of Derby, secretary for war, yesterday, says the Daily Mail, and urged the abandonment of the title "Jewish regiment" which had been adopted for the new Hebrew regiment recently organized. The deputation pleaded that 40,000 Jews now serving in the army were fighting not as Jews but as British subjects and wished to continue to do so. Lord Derby agreed to abandonment of the title and promised to give the regiment a new designation.

Three German Spies Convicted at Bergen

(By The Associated Press)

Christiania, Aug. 31.—Three German spies have been convicted at Bergen for supplying information to submarines regarding the sailing time of vessels which later were torpedoed. Captain Laven and Officer Schwartz, German citizens, and Thorsen, a Norwegian, all were given terms in the penitentiary. Laven was sentenced to five years, Schwartz to four and Thorsen to ten years' imprisonment.

Captain Laven admitted that he worked under instructions from the German authorities. He said that German subjects were forced to obey such orders. Norwegian newspapers in commenting on the trial emphasized that the country must take note of the fact that German subjects must obey orders from their own country.

COTTON PROSPECTS BETTER

Washington, Aug. 31.—Cotton production prospects improved to the extent of 450,000 bales during August and brought the estimate of final output to 12,499,000 equivalent 500-pound bales. That quantity was forecast today by the department of agriculture on the condition of the crop August 25 which showed a decline of 2.5 points compared with a ten-year average of 6.6 points decline. Acre yield was forecast at 174.6 pounds compared with 166.9 pounds forecast from July 25 condition.
