Hop-picking Nearing Close—Hop-picking operations in many of the smaller yards of the vicinity have ceased for this year. The crop was short, in most instances, and as large crews were employed, picking was finished sooner than usual. The yield is of fine quality, in the main. At the E. E. Morrison yard on the McKemie, work was finished Wednesday, as was also the case in the Hardy yard, in the Prunelle neighborhood. At the Palmer Agnes yard, in the Norkenzie region, the pickers finished Tuesday and came in to their homes around this city and Springfield, on Wednesday. It is said that the recent rain did little damage to the hops of these yards, since picking was nearly completed.

Eugene Man Gets Good Position—According to a letter just received in Eugene by Mr. and Mrs. John T. Genn from their son, Vernon C. Genn, the latter has been elected principal of the high school at Juneau, Alaska, at a salary of \$100 per month. Mr. Genn, with his bride, went to Alaska on a wedding trip, and they had intended to return late this summer, as Mr. Genn expected to teach at Santa Clara. Mr. Genn is a graduate of the University of Oregon with the class of 1914, was married in July to Miss Ada Young, of Portland, a graduate of the art school at Berkeley. Mr. Genn writes that they were surprised at the temperature at Juneau, the weather is quite warm, and vegetation is green. As to living expenses there, he writes that a good dinner, including meat, vegetables and dessert can be had for 40 cents.

DOG TAX LAW MAKES OFFICIALS TROUBLE

Causes Even More Worry After Being Declared Unconstitutional Than Before.

The dog tax law passed by the last legislature is causing Lane county officials even more trouble since it was killed by the supreme court than it did before. There was a very general kick on paying the tax, though many did so, under protest. When the Douglas county circuit court declared the law unconstitutional the collection of taxes ceased. J. J. Harbaugh, who had the collecting of the tax for the Eugene district, ceased collecting the tax at that time. The money collected by him was all turned over to County Treasurer W. S. Taylor, and Mr. Harbaugh took his receipt therefor.

Since the law was declared unconstitutional Mr. Harbaugh states that his telephone has been kept busy with calls from those who had paid, demanding their money back. He refers them to County Treasurer Taylor, who of course, cannot pay out a cent of money from the treasury without the written order of the county court.

As to the possibility of recovery there seems to be a diversity of opinion, though lawyers are waiting for the text of the recent supreme court decision before giving opinions as to possibility of refunds.

ARRESTS MOTHERS VAGRANCY CHARGE

Asks County Judge to Commit Five Children to Care of Other Parties.

Mrs. Bertha Strehl and Mrs. Minnie Stanley, both of Cottage Grove, were arrested Tuesday on a warrant sworn to by District Attorney L. L. Ray, on a charge of vagrancy. Their trial will be held in Cottage Grove in a few days.

Wednesday Mr. Ray also filed information in the juvenile court asking that Mahr Strehl, aged 11 and Sheldon Strehl, aged 9, be taken from their mother, Mrs. Bertha Strehl, on the ground that she is not a fit person to care for them. An action was also started by Mr. Ray looking toward the taking of Rose Stanley, aged 10, Edna Stanley, aged 6, and Grace Stanley, aged 4, from their mother Mrs. Minnie Stanley.
