## ORDER FOR RETAIL COAL PRICES GIVEN

Action by Fuel Administrator Expected to Result in Cheapening Price of Fuel.

(By The Associated Press)

Washington, Oct. 1. An order of fuel administrator H. A. Garfield, made effective today defining the profits of retail coal and coke dealers throughout the country is expected to effect an immediate decrease in the prices now charged the consumer. Gross margins over production cost are limited to the average of 1915 plus a maximum increase of thirty per cent with a check provision that the average margin of July this year not be exceeded. Compliance with the order will be enforced in the several states.

The text of the order fixing the margin says:

"On and after October 1, 1917, in making prices and sales to consumers the retail gross margin added by any retail dealer to the average cost of any size or grade of coal or coke for each class of business shall not exceed the average gross margin added by such dealers for the same size or grade for each class of business during the calendar year 1915, plus thirty per cent of the said retail gross margin for the calendar year 1915; provided, however, that the retail gross margin added by any retail dealer shall in no case exceed the average added by such dealer for the same size, grade and class of business during July, 1917. By this order retailers are required to fix a retail gross margin which may be less than, but shall not in any instance exceed, the margin added by them in 1915, plus thirty per cent thereof."

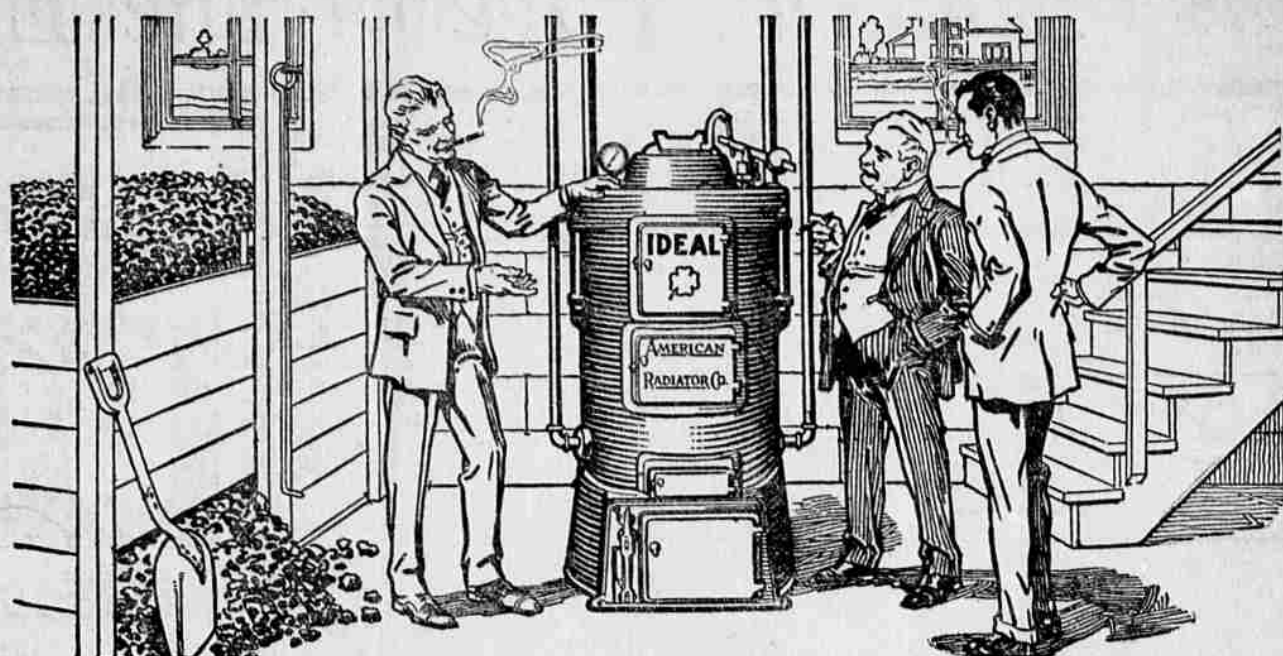

## BOY SCOUTS WORK IN PRESENT WORLD WAR

Benefit of Movement in Present Crisis Set Forth by University Man.

(By Prof. Norman E. Richardson, of Boston University.)

The war in European nations has resulted in a rapid increase of juvenile delinquency. Information that has been carefully secured goes to show that this increase in seventeen of the larger cities and towns of Great Britain during one year averaged 34 per cent. The causes of this unfortunate condition are in many instances similar to forces that have already begun to operate in America. It is imperative that the American people take time by the forelock in this matter by setting in motion immediately influences that will counteract a number of injurious forces which will play upon the lives of our boys during the coming months and possibly years.

A careful study of the causes of increased delinquency and of the suitability of the Boy Scout program to reduce the harm from these influences presents a powerful argument for the immediate enlistment of thousands of our best citizens as scoutmasters.
