

SOLDIERS' TOBACCO FUND GIVEN BOOST BY OFFICE WORKERS

Southern Pacific Company Employees Send Their Contributions to Cheer Our Fighting Men on Western Front.

Employees in the engineering offices of the Southern Pacific company have responded to the appeal for the "Tobacco for the Soldiers" fund. Today they sent to the Guard office \$2.50, representing contributions by five persons. Take up a collection in your crowd tonight, fill out the blank printed in this paper. Join the movement which has as its object the carrying of a comfort to our soldiers on the firing line. Join in the movement which is going to carry the message to General Pershing's army in France that as a nation we stand behind the men who are fighting the battles to make the world safe for democracy.

The "Tobacco for the Soldiers" fund plan follows: For every 25 cents contributed to the fund, tobacco having a retail value of 50 cents in the United States will be delivered to a soldier in our army in France. For 25 cents it would be impossible by individual effort to deliver a single package exclusive of its original cost. Through a special arrangement this tobacco is to be supplied to the Red Cross by the large tobacco companies. The Red Cross will have charge of the tobacco from the time it leaves the United States until it is presented to the soldiers. Each package will contain a card bearing the name and address of the person who contributed the 25 cents necessary for its purchase. These cards will be ready for mailing and will be carried free through the mails from France to the persons sending the tobacco, as the soldier's acknowledgment.

information which they wanted. You changed it in your issue last evening to read "information which they had wanted."

"Why did you insert the word had?"

"Why have you refused to publish communications sent to the Guard favorable to me?"

"Will you publish favorable statements in the future?"

"Let me say that I will send to you some favorable communications during the next week, written by most responsible people. Will you give them space?"

"I accuse you of nothing. I hope you are as earnest and as truthful as I am trying to be, but your position is one of responsibility and the people are entitled to an answer to these questions."

Mr. Eaton's communication is like the statements which he has issued. He rambles around and gets nowhere. He says nothing that makes any material difference to his case. If his statement was changed, the editor did not know it. If Mr. Eaton's second statement meant anything at all, its effect was to convey to the reader that he had gone to the meeting of the People's Council that he might perform a service for his country and that he had been condemned for performing such a service. The Guard asked four very clear and very pointed questions in last night's edition. Mr. Eaton might have answered these four questions in four words. The four words in his answer would have enabled the people of Eugene to pass upon his case much more clearly than they can pass upon it after reading the whole column contained in his communication today.—Editor.
