REIGN OF TERROR FOR ALSACE LORRAINE IS BEGUN BY GERMANS

Sentences totaling 5000 years' imprisonment are imposed on citizens who speak favorable to France.

French Front in France, Sept. 26.—Fresh evidence of the German campaign of terrorization in Alsace-Lorraine comes to hand every day.

Since Alsace and Lorraine were annexed by Germany in 1871, until the outbreak of the war in 1914, no fewer than 500,000 of the inhabitants of the provinces, according to official figures, have migrated to France.

While the migration was in progress the younger and more daring spirits among the men of Alsace and Lorraine took the still more serious step of joining the French army.

GERMAN SEA RAIDER PASSES INSPECTION BY BRITISH OFFICER

Seeadler, Disguised as Lumber Carrier, Was Permitted to Cross Allies' Lines, Master of American Schooner States.

(By The Associated Press) Honolulu, T. H., Oct. 12.—Graphic details of how the famous German commerce raider Seeadler, which preyed on allied commerce for seven months in the south Pacific before meeting her fate on the reefs of Mopeha Island, passed the inspection of a British cruiser by assuming the disguise of a lumber carrier, were revealed here today by Captain Hador Smith, master of the American schooner R. C. Slade, one of the three victims of the German craft.

After capture by the British and subsequent escape the Seeadler put into Bremerhaven, a German port and in December, 1916, fitted out as a motor schooner under command of Lieutenant von Lielner and a crew of 68, half of whom, according to Captain Smith, spoke Norwegian.

With forged Norwegian clearance papers and two four-inch guns concealed by a deckload of lumber, the vessel put to sea, encountered a British cruiser, passed inspection, mounted her guns and proceeded to sink 13 vessels in the Atlantic, two of them British, Captain Smith said.

ALLEN PETITION FOR REDUCTION DENIED

County Board of Equalization Refuses to Lower All Eugene Real Estate.

The county board of equalization has filed its complete report. The most important action of the board was the refusal of that body to accede to the request of S. D. Allen and others and reduce the assessment of all Eugene real estate.

The complete record of orders by the board, in brief, follows: Elizabeth Thompson, petition for reduction of assessment on lots 3 and 4, Cooper's plat in Eugene, denied.

Walter B. Jones, attorney for C. P. Poole, assessment reduced from \$825 to \$500 on land in section 4, township 19, south of range 1 west.

John H. Klemm, assessment reduced on the east 50 feet of lots 6 and 7, block 9, Skinner's donation, from \$17,000 to \$14,000.

N. R. Gaylord, assessment reduced on his hotel property on Willamette street, Eugene, from \$11,250 to \$10,000.

S. P. Ness, assessment reduced on real property in Eugene from \$2000 to \$2000, and on the improvements from \$3500 to \$3200.

George Ness, assessment reduced on lot 6, block 7, Scott's addition to Eugene, from \$800 to \$600, and on lot 6, block 7, same addition, from \$150 to \$100.

Eugenia Hoffman and others, assessment reduced on vacant lot adjoining Hotel Hoffman property, from \$1800 to \$1000.

Elizabeth M. Gale, petition to reduce assessment on property in township 17, south of range 3 west, denied.

Brown Lumber company, petition to reduce assessment on sawmill property at Cottage Grove for the reason that it recently burned, denied.

W. S. U'Ren, petition for reduction on lot 2, block 4, Stewart's addition to Eugene, denied.

Barrett Johnson, petition for reduction on certain tract of land, denied.

Fraser Real Estate and Holding company, reduction of assessment on 100 acres, from \$5 to \$2 per acre, and on a tract of 205 acres a reduction was granted from \$2000 to \$615.

E. J. FRASIER IS ARRESTED UPON FORGERY CHARGE

Fraser appealed to the United States district court. Early this summer, a man appeared in Eugene representing himself to be William J. Rogers, foster brother of Fraser. He stated he had come all the way from Paral, Mexico, to prove his existence and claim the shares of the Fraser Real Estate and Holding company as his property.

Referee's Decision Sustained. When the Fraser case came before Judge R. S. Bean, in the United States district court at Portland, he sustained the findings of Referee Cannon, holding that the papers and checks purporting to have been signed by Rogers were forgeries.

Soon after the announcement of Judge Bean's decision, Rogers announced that he would pay Fraser's creditors dollar for dollar. Fraser intervened and reserved the right to protect the claims presented by any creditor.

Check Dated October 10, 1909. The indictment charges: "The said E. J. Frasier on the 11th day of August, A. D., 1917, in the county of Lane, state of Oregon, then and there being, did then and there willfully, knowingly and feloniously, utter and publish, as true and genuine, to one A. M. Cannon, as referee in bankruptcy, a certain false and forged writing, check, receipt and instrument, as evidence of money paid on a debt, knowing the same to be false and forged."

The check was dated October 10, 1909, and for sixty-nine dollars. It was signed "E. J. Frasier" and endorsed "T. W. Harris." The check drawn on the First National bank of Eugene was perforated by the mark "Paid 10 11 09" and was also marked with an encircled letter "P."

Witnesses examined by the grand jury were: T. W. Harris, S. S. Spencer, E. N. McAllister, Luke L. Goodrich, Henry Tromp, A. M. Cannon and J. Fordyce Wood. The witnesses included the principal officers of the bank.

It is alleged that the check upon which the indictment was brought is drawn upon a form not in use by the bank at the time the check purports to have been drawn; that the cancellation mark on the check, an encircled "P" has never been used in the bank where the cancellation mark has always been a diamond shape with the letter "P" in the center; that the perforation mark "Paid 10 11 09" was made by a different sized machine than was ever used in the bank.
