CHERNIAVSKY TRIO GAVE GREAT CONCERT.

Local Musician Gives Critique of Concert at Local Theatre Thursday.

There is an erroneous opinion that the higher forms of the stringed instrument music can be appreciated only by those who have studied long and faithfully. Paderewsky, pianist; Casals, cellist; and Mand Powell, violinist, have proven themselves capable of bringing audiences to the highest pitch of enthusiasm.

The Cherniavsky Trio, three brothers, born of a musical father, himself a teacher of many instruments, the boys trained to their respective instruments from early childhood, gave a recital at the Eugene theatre Thursday evening and proved themselves one of the finest trios in the world, if not the finest.

With such early and careful training, with a natural refinement of body movement and facial expression, with a world-wide experience in concert work, it is little wonder that they have developed into such a perfect organization. The "cello," the noblest instrument, and the most like the human voice in its exquisite tone, sang in perfect sweetness.

The fire and dash and wonderful fortissimo and abandon of the Military March by Schubert-Tausig, although done by so young an artist as Jan Cherniavsky, was quite as finished as though played by Hambourg or Carreno.

The tempos of the ensemble numbers was so rapid that we wondered that a crash did not come, so intense were the trio and the audience. The sum of all human possibility in light and shade and tone and expression seem but pastime to this trio of musicians. The trio will come here again, so it was hinted by one of the company, and it is to be hoped that the city will give them a greater audience than at this visit.

UNIVERSITY TO AID OREGON EXPORTERS

Will Furnish Information of Value to Those Seeking Foreign Markets.

The school of commerce, of the University of Oregon, again has made arrangements to supply Oregon people with information intended to assist in the development of the state's commercial and industrial interests.

This service now has been supplied to the business men of the state for the last two or three years, and has proved exceptionally helpful, especially to manufacturers and exporters who are endeavoring to reach into foreign markets. The school of commerce is in close co-operation with the federal department of commerce and with various other agencies that maintain connections in foreign countries.

The industrial and commercial service department of the school of commerce this year is in charge of Shad O. Krantz, who for seven years before coming to the University was reporter on financial and industrial subjects for the Oregonian, and expects to use his newspaper experience to the advantage of that department. ARTILLERY BOYS WILL GO TO FRANCE

Governor Withycombe and Adjutant-General White Carry Them Message.

Fort Stevens, Or., Oct. 12.—Troops of the Oregon Coast Artillery and of the regular army stationed here were reviewed by Governor Withycombe and Adjutant-General White yesterday afternoon. Before and after the review the men had the day for athletic sports. All routine duty was suspended.

Adjutant-General White who will leave for duty with the 141st division of United States forces next week complimented the troops.

"My only regret on being transferred is that I shall not be with this unit," he said. "I hope that a year from now the Oregon Coast Artillery changed to field artillery, will be dropping the baggage while the troops go over the tops."

Governor Withycombe told the men that "they were not here for police duty."

"You are being trained for the time when you will see service in France."

The regulars won the ball game in the



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morning and the tug-of-war in the afternoon. No calls were observed during the day, the men thoroughly enjoying their selves.

AUTOMOBILE GETS FEDERAL COURT ROOST

Judge Bourgum Expresses Opinion of Motor Cars in Rendering Decision on Bench

The Docket, the house publication of West and Company, of St. Paul, compilers of court reports, contains the following item concerning automobiles:

"In the case of United States v. Old Automobile, 237 Federal Reporter, 584, the question arises as to whether or not an automobile would come under an old Indian Territory statute calling for a forfeiture of 'boat, team, wagon or sled,' if same is used in conveying people into an Indian country. In discussing this feature of the case, Justice Robinson says in part: 'It was not long that the automobile was developed to a degree that, while it is a tremendous and valuable industry, it is also so conducive to great public and private extravagance and debt, too largely responsible for the public streets, contemporary of the rights of pedestrians, the Jehu driving furiously—a rare combination of luxury, necessity, and waste.'
