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ENTRANCE OF TROOPS FROM UNITED STATES BIG EVENT ON FRONT

British Comment Upon Arrival of General Pershing's War Forces in First Line Trenches in France.

(By The Associated Press)
London, Oct. 29.—The entrance of units of the American army into active service on the western front, although overshadowed by the Austro-German invasion of Italy, receives prominent notice in the newspapers as a much more than picturesque event. The Daily News says: "It would be idle to presume to expect Germany's intoxication of the Italian victory to appreciate its full meaning. This does not alter the facts. Germany has called in the new world to redress the balance of the old. The balance will be redressed."

The Daily Express, remarking "on American energy," says it bodes ill for Germany and gives added certainty that victory, however delayed, is assured.

The Graphic says: "The descendants of the embattled farmers of Concord have fired a shot, which like that of the minute man, will be heard around the world. The advent of the United States has more than made up for Russia's temporary weakening. It should have a steady influence, in view of the blow at Italy, and should be recalled whenever there is a tendency toward pessimism."

"FROSH" TEAM WILL BE STRONG INDEED

Next Year's Varsity Squad Will Be Strengthened by Heavy-weight Yearlings.

That the University of Oregon will have a football team in 1918 that will make other colleges set up and take notice, is evidenced by the freshman team this year. The players are a husky lot of youngsters averaging 108 pounds in weight and are already able to make Coach Beade's first string men trouble in the tri-weekly scrimmages. Bill Hayward, the veteran track coach and football conditioner, remarked the other day, "They look good; I wish we could use them in the first lineup."

A review of the team in Sunday's Oregon Journal says of them:

Few Stars in Team.

"Collectively the frosh are a well-balanced eleven, averaging from end to end, close to 108 pounds. Individually there are few stars that stand out over their teammates. Coach Walker has worked up a fast, smashing backfield in Blake of Condon, Chapman of Marshfield, and Masterson and Jacobberger of Portland. The latter two are products of Columbia university prep. school. Jacobberger is handling the kicking and is fast rounding into a punter of merit."

"Center is being taken care of by Strand, a freshman from Baker, Or. Both Drosser of Marshfield, and Mautz, late of Washington high school of Portland, tip the beam well over the 200 mark. Few gains will be made through the center of the line with these two 'Goliaths' at guards. Ward, who entered school last February from Dufur, Or., is a fixture at right tackle by virtue of his speed and aggressiveness."

Trowbridge Shows Fight.

"Another Portland boy on the first year eleven is Joe Trowbridge of last year's Jefferson high school championship interscholastic title winners. What Trowbridge lacks in weight he makes up by a surplus of fight and ability to smash opposing backfield plungers off his tackle. Lincoln high school of Portland is represented by Coggriff, who has grabbed the right wing berth. Gilbert of Mapleton, is assured of the opposite end position."

"About next Wednesday either Chemawa or Mount Angel will oppose the freshmen. The big 'yearling' game of the season with the Aggies is scheduled for the third week in November on the Corvallis gridiron. Plans are now under way whereby Manager Tiffany will take winning Portland interscholastic eleven to Eugene on the Saturday preceding Thanksgiving."
