

MORE PRESSURE ON ENEMY IN FLANDERS IS URGED BY BRITISH

Press in London Thinks General Haig's Continual Hammering Germans Most Effective Way to Help Italy.

(By The Associated Press) London, Oct. 30.—Satisfaction with the decision of Great Britain and France to help the Italians is expressed by most of the morning newspapers, which again urge that whatever assistance is possible must be given without delay. The general assumption seems to be that concrete reinforcements contributed by Great Britain and France will appear on the Italian front.

The Morning Post, however, contends that the best way of helping Italy is to keep hammering the Germans on the western front. It adds:

"A German victory over the Italians will not help them if we keep striking hard in Flanders. It is a maxim in war never to allow the strategy to be diverted to the enemy and every move of our enemy now is to attempt to create a diversion from the western front."

Taking the view that the German success is due partly to treachery and that the Germans are using the same tools in Italy as those with which the Russian armies were betrayed, the Post declares: "Let our statements awake and counter these activities. This may be of even more service than any military aid we can render."

The Post, nevertheless, assumes that such military aid as can be given without weakening the pressure on the western front also will be furnished and urges the Italians to hold on until succor arrives.

The Daily Telegraph, while fearing that the German claim to have shaken the whole Italian front is justified, is persuaded that the perilous situation will inspire the defenders to a harder determination.

Garabed T. K. KNAPP CASE IS NOT REOPENED BY BOARD

Testimony of Father of Louis Laurier Knapp Fails to Change Refusal of Exemption

C. A. Knapp, hotel man and ranch owner of Port Orford, appeared before the district exemption board Monday in behalf of the exemption of his son, Louis Laurier Knapp. Young Knapp was exempted from service on affidavits to the effect that he was running his father's ranch and was needed in the business. Afterwards the board received evidence which they believed justified them in reopening the case and the exemption was revoked.

Mr. Knapp was given a hearing but the board declined to reopen the case.

Another case before them is that of Emmett Benton Draper, whose affidavits of exemption, if prepared, failed to reach the district board. Draper claims exemption because he owns a half interest in a big tractor and is engaged in plowing and harvesting with it, and alleges that the machine is very intricate and that it is practically impossible to get anyone else to take his place. Draper also owns land in California which he expects to till if not taken to war.

The board has asked for more definite information as to the scope of his operations as a farmer, and whether or not they are of greater value to the armies of the United States than his services in the field would be.

SEVEN POUNDS WILL BE MAXIMUM WEIGHT

Owing to French Postal Rules Large Packages Cannot Be Sent Soldiers There.

The size of parcel post packages to the Expeditionary forces in France has been reduced owing to the fact that the French railway companies will not carry mail over their roads where the packages are in excess of seven pounds. This limits the weight from 20 pounds as at present to 7 pounds. There is not any limit, however, on the number of packages that can be sent and the rate of postage remains the same, 12 cents a pound or fraction thereof.

Stock Exchange in Montreal Fails to Open for Business

The unofficial explanation was that the exchange was closed because a number of brokers are in danger of ruin on account of their heavy holdings which they had been unable to dispose of in the unfavorable markets of recent days.

PLOT TO STEAL PLANS OF AMERICAN SHIPS UNDER INVESTIGATION

Authorities at San Francisco Raid Home of Workman and Office of Naval Constructor, Seizing Papers.

San Francisco, Oct. 30.—An alleged plot to steal plans of submarines under construction for the government at the Union Iron Works here was being investigated by federal authorities here today, following a raid yesterday on the home of John Kulleoff a riveter at the plant. Kulleoff was arrested by department of justice agents for taking snapshots in the shipyard and having the films developed at a drug store. The authorities charged that plans of the submarines were found in his home.

Plans of other ships under construction at the plant were found in the offices of Tormen Fonander, a naval constructor, the authorities charged. His offices were raided on a warrant issued in police court.
