

## SELL MORE VELTUM MACHINES TO ARMY

Company Receives Second Order for Valve Seat Grinders for Shipment to France.

The Veltum & Clow Manufacturing company, of Eugene, has filled a second order of 36 Veltum seat valve-grinding machines for the United States government. These machines, which were invented by Mr. Veltum and used by him for some time before putting them on the market, are driven by compressed air, and are proving very efficient. They have been manufactured only about six months, but the second consignment for the United States for shipment has been made, in addition to the first trial order which was used in this country. The machine, which is used for grinding the valve seats in a motor without removing the motor from the car or aeroplane, are driven by compressed air, and are made of aluminum and are so light as to be handled easily at any time.

The company also has had exceptional success in introducing them to the garage trade in America, five dozen being shipped to Sioux City, Iowa, in addition to many other shipments all over the country.

The patents are controlled by the Veltum & Clow Manufacturing company, and the business bids fair to grow to large dimensions. All parts of the machine are manufactured in the local plant, including the aluminum and bronze castings.

### STRIKE AT SPOKANE

Spokane, Wash., Nov. 1.—One-third of the electrical workers employed by the Home Telephone and Telegraph company, a subsidiary of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph, reported for work today, according to the company officers. The local union at a meeting last night voted to strike. The men who remained at work said they were following the instructions issued yesterday by their international president in Washington. The telephone operators remained at work as they have no charter for their newly organized union.

### OPERATORS AT WORK

Bellingham, Wash., Nov. 1.—Telephone service here has not been interrupted by the strike in any of the cities of the state. The electrical workers here of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company received a telegram from the vice-president of the international union last night requesting them to defer action and are not expected to walk out at this time. The telephone operators who are not organized, are still at work.

### BUSINESS IS NORMAL

North Yakima, Wash., Nov. 1.—Business as usual prevails at the local exchange of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company here. At 8:30 a. m. the company had a full switchboard made up of girls who did not join the strikers and other company employees. The lines are out, but only a few of the operators have failed to report on schedule time and it is intimated that these will return later. Manager Jolly says the company is prepared to maintain service.

### SERVICE NOT CRIPPLED

Portland, Nov. 1.—The strike of unionized operators and electricians of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company was in force here today, many of the employees having quit work at midnight last night, despite the order from San Francisco to postpone action. The service was not crippled early today, according to officials of the telephone company, as reserves had been taking the places of operators who walked out. Union officials said that 700 out of 152 unionized workers were out on strike today, but telephone company officials scoffed at this claim and declared their service was not appreciably affected. No difficulty was experienced in filling vacancies, they said, as many former employees had offered their services and gone to work.

Pickets were stationed at the seven exchanges and a squad of police was detailed wherever there were pickets but no disorder was noted.

No residence phones are working and generally no store phones.

### Italians' Loss

ing the last few days, but permitted the sending of a description of the destruction of Italian stores. The correspondent says:

"The sky was constantly springing into a livid flare like an instantaneous sunset, followed by a deep grumbling roar. Black clouds of smoke were outlined against the glowing heavens."

"Ammunition depots were being blown up, stores were being burned and bridges destroyed. The glare of explosives gave light of ghastly brilliance over the throngs of the retreating army."

"A rain storm broke and lasted for three hours, often with extreme violence. It added to the hardships of the retreat, already severe enough, and must have meant death to many of those wounded while covering the retreat. But it delayed the enemy's advance by swelling the rivers, softening the ground to mud and making air reconnaissance and bombing raids on congested roads and railways impossible. Such are the outlines of the story, of which fuller details are not permitted."

"The situation undoubtedly is grave, but the silence which the interests of the army now impose must not be construed as an indication that things are worse than they actually are. The blow has been severe but it will not crush Italy."

### ITALIAN FORCES UNITED

Italian Headquarters in Northern Italy, Wednesday, Oct. 31.—Premier Lloyd George has said that the horrors of a Zepplin raid received much attention whereas in their relative importance to vast sections of London remaining untouched, they are insignificant. Exactly the same conditions exist here for while the horrors of the recent experience stand out boldly to those who went through it, yet this is offset by the magnitude of the beneficial military and strategic results accomplished.

Exactly what these are can not be even hinted at for the present, but the main fact is that another wall—another line of steel—will face the enemy, and all Europe and America are now doing their part to second Italy's tremendous task.

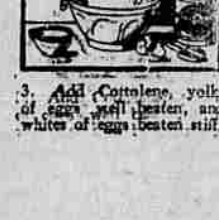

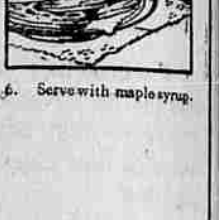
