

HOODLUMS DEFACE SCHOOL BUILDING

Black Paint Used in Marking Up
Eugene High School on Three
Entrances.

Some time between 12:30 and morning last night hoodlums badly defaced the beautiful Eugene high school building. Using black asphalt paint they marked the letter C on the steps and on the brick work on three of the entrances to the building. On the north entrance walk they also painted in rough letters, "We have got your nannie this time."

The building was watched until 12:30 o'clock by Fred Chess, of the faculty, and it was after that time that the damage was done. Opinion is divided as to whether it was the work of Eugene hoodlums or Corvallis hoodlums. The school authorities do not believe, for a minute, that the Corvallis faculty, team management or student body as a whole would be guilty of such an act.

Mr. Chess states that Halloween night his dog aroused him and he found a number of young men disguised as ghosts trying to break into the building on the southwest corner, the side on which he lives. He had some trouble driving them away, and while he could not identify them he is confident from their voices that they were not Eugene high school students.

Monday night large Cs were placed on the cement wall on the north entrance. Last night the defacement was all done on the north and east fronts of the building, which leads Mr. Chess to believe that it was the same gang which tried to break into the school house Halloween.

VETCH PADS AND FERN MAY POISON HORSES

Deputy State Veterinarian
Sends Out Warning Regard-
ing Danger From This Source

Two diseases or troubles that may become common to horses this fall are fern and vetch poisoning, according to Dr. Derflinger, assistant state veterinarian. Where large quantities of hay are fed containing fern the trouble will occur. It may be several months before the trouble will appear, but when it does it will appear suddenly, thus giving the owner the idea that the disease is in acute form.

There is no satisfactory remedy says the doctor. One should give plenty of exercise and feed a little epsom salts. It seems the trouble is most common with animals standing in stalls. Dr. Derflinger mentions this because of a number of cases being reported over the state already. Vetch poisoning is due to feeding hay containing vetch pods that are too ripe. The symptoms are the same as the above. Both are classed as forage poisons.

Enforcement of Coal Prices Asked in State of Colorado

Denver, Colo., Nov. 8.—Immediate relief from alleged overcharging of as much as one hundred per cent on the part of coal producers to Colorado public utility corporations and that steps be taken to enforce the fuel administration's regulation in this state are "respectfully insisted" upon in a letter from the state public utilities commission to the national fuel administrator, made public today.

PACKAGES FOR FRANCE MUST BE INSPECTED

No Parcel Destined for Expedi-
tionary Forces Can Other-
wise Leave Office of Mailing.

"There should be no misunderstanding of the requirements regarding parcels being mailed to soldiers in France," said Postmaster E. L. Campbell Thursday. "We are compelled to open and inspect every package offered for mailing to the expeditionary forces and stamp on the package after we do it up again. No prohibited matter contained in this package, with the postmaster's signature."

Mr. Campbell advises that all packages be wrapped securely with heavy, tough paper, and tied in good shape with plenty of tough manila twine which will not break or cut itself. The knots, however, should be bowknots, in order to take as little of the postoffice officials' time as possible. After examination they will tie the package up securely using hard knots; but the using of hard knots in tying before taking to the office simply makes them additional work, as each parcel must be inspected.

This has always been the rule with international parcel post mail, but the inspection has heretofore been done in the New York office. Because of the vast number being sent, this work has been ordered divided among the thousands of sending offices.

Other essentials in regard to the mailing of Christmas packages are as follows:

First—Mails to reach the soldiers in France by Christmas morning must be posted not later than November 15.

Second—Every package must bear conspicuously the words, "Christmas Mail," the complete address of the person for whom it is intended, and, in the upper left-hand corner, the name and address of the sender.

LOCAL MARKETS ARE HOLDING PRICES WELL

Farmers Around Eugene Get-
ting Even More Than Can Be
Secured by Shipping.

The producers around Eugene are getting fully as much or more for their produce than could be realized by shipping is one of the reasons advanced by a local buyer as one reason for the light shipping sales. The local markets are dominated almost exclusively at present by the government's fixed prices—that is, the price the government will pay. As it is one of the biggest consumers, middle men will not buy above a price they can turn to the government at a profit. Thus, while not fixing a maximum price the government has in effect created one. Local demand, however, is holding prices here fully up to the most that can be realized by shipping.
