

SOLICITING TEAMS WILL MEET AT NOON AND CONSIDER PLANS

S. D. Hooper, Captain of Team No 5, Tells Members of His Reasons for Being Active in the Campaign.

The soliciting teams in the Y. M. C. A. war fund drive and other workers will meet each day at noon to report progress and compare notes on methods of getting results.

The schools of both city and county are to take an active part in the campaign. Besides the University of Oregon which has already oversubscribed its \$2000 quota, the high schools and the lower grades are to have the opportunity to contribute their mite. The executive committee is co-operating with the school

authorities in getting the Y. M. C. A. and the purposes of the drive before every school child in the county, and, through them, into every home.

In a letter sent to the members of his team, S. D. Hooper, captain of team No. 5, drew a graphic picture of the conditions at the front which the Y. is seeking to remedy, and expressed his whole-hearted zeal in this work. He said, in part:

"I don't know how all of you have regarded the Y. M. C. A. as an organization, and I don't believe it makes any particular difference in the campaign. Personally I am free to admit that I have never been very strong for it. I had an idea that it was a sort of a self-satisfied, secretarian organization that barred Unitarians, Catholics and Hebrews.

"But right here and now I want to say that my hat is in the ring for this army Y. M. C. A. And I think that if I had to go over the top tomorrow for a cause, I'd like it to be the magnificent cause that this organization has taken upon itself in this war. If you heard that Canadian lad's simple, sincere recital of his experiences in the trenches on the west front, you will know what I mean. If you didn't hear him you missed a whole lot.

"Just a boy, he was, but clean to the bone, and every inch a man. He told us of 21 days in the first line trench without relief. Water thigh deep, rain pouring down and no shelter; chilling cold and no fire—no blankets. Continuously they were exposed to a galling fire from Fritz's snipers. Four hours out of 24 they could lie edgewise on the rifle stands and sleep. Then they got back into the water and gave their mates a chance. Shades of George Washington! Valley Forge was duck soup in comparison.

"But the Y. was there; right in the first line trenches. The government gave the boys transportation to the front, a rifle, ammunition, some 'bully beef' to be taken into the trenches and divided with mess mates. The Y. gave them everything else. The Y. took care of all walking cases of wounded. The Y. served 500 cups of hot coffee in that one little sector every day and did it from a tiny dugout. And this was only the beginning.

"When this lad turned to speak to his chum and saw only a headless corpse; rocking beside him, it was to a Y. secretary that he turned instinctively. Red Cross bandages, dry underclothing, socks for wounded feet, everything and anything in fact to strengthen that slender thread that fastened body and soul together, the Y. did. And if, in spite of all, that thread snapped, then it was the Y. that pillowed a fellow's head and eased his going.

"You and I have friends and relatives at the front; so has nearly everybody else. But before the war is over, the administration tells us, we shall have ten times the present number there. They'll be right up against just what we've been hearing about at first-hand, and what are you and I, who can't go over the top with them, going to do about it? We can just give, and induce others to give, to the Y. They haven't begun to give."

BAPTISTS HOLD CUP FOR NEXT QUARTER

Fairmount Presbyterian Society Loses Permanent Ownership by Absence of One Member.

The Young People's Union of this city held their fourth quarterly meeting in the United Brethren church Sunday evening with a large attendance. Much spirit was shown in this meeting on account of the keen competition for the cup as the Fairmount Presbyterian society, should it have won the cup for the fourth consecutive time, would have retained it as their own. They were not awarded the cup this time, however, and hereafter it will be held during the quarter by the winning society at each quarterly meeting.

The judges' decision was given by Chalmers Patterson who reported that the highest percentage for the "stunt" was won by the United Brethren society, but owing to the absence of one of its members it lost out in attendance percentage, thereby losing the cup. The Baptist Young People's society, having the second best "stunt" and every member present were awarded the cup. The Fairmount Presbyterian society for the first time had a member absent at the union meeting, but this was unavoidable as she was called out in the country to lead an Endeavor meeting. The "stunts" showed much work on the part of the societies in preparing them and were well received. The intention of the ministers in presenting the city union with this cup, to be presented to the winning societies at each quarterly meeting, was to promote better work in the individual societies and a better co-ordinate work among the several societies of the city, and it has been a great success as the interest in bettering the societies has been highly increased and a better fellowship among the societies is the result.

On account of the absence of the former president and secretary of the union from the city, a special election was held at which Raymond Osburn was chosen president and Miss Esther Hillpot, secretary, to finish the year.

Bruce Flegal was leader of the devotional meeting. Some very interesting talks were given as to the necessity of keeping in touch with the absent members who are serving in the army and navy, and some way in which we could all do our "bit" to help "win the war."

At the close of the meeting the cup was presented to the B. Y. P. U. by Rev. H. B. Dorks of the United Brethren church and accepted by Ira Manville of the B. Y. P. U.

curious crowd peered around the corners, hugged buildings and crouched in doorways to escape the bullets.

Armored Cars in Action.
An armored car manned by military cadets and stationed in the square around the Cathedral of St. Isaac cleared the streets there with a fusillade in reply to occasional firing from Bolshevik infantrymen hiding behind the marble column in front of the great cathedral. Some time later the fuel supply of the car became exhausted and the car was captured by Bolshevik sailors who killed two of the occupants by firing through the portholes. They then broke in the steel door and dragged the third occupant, who was wounded, to the streets. He was killed by the sailors while a crowd of spectators within the Hotel Astoria cried out in protest. The bodies lay in the street for half an hour until hospital nurses and French officers gained permission to remove them.

One moment machine-gun bullets were whizzing through the streets; the next the firing ceased and the people doffed their hats as a funeral cortege with four white horses drawing a white-canopied hearse and black garbed mourners following on foot, crossed the Morskain directly in the line of fire.

Bullets splattered against the facades of the buildings and one military cadet fell in a crumpled heap across the street from The Associated Press office. Another fell with a shot through the head as he was warning the onlookers to seek safer quarters.

The military cadets within the telephone exchange surrendered shortly after dusk when their ammunition became exhausted. The city then became quiet except for occasional spasmodic firing.

Bolshevik forces, reinforced by sailors from the warship Petropavlosk and other warships and from Helsingfors, patrolled the city today. The heaviest guard, backed by artillery, was stationed at the telephone exchange to prevent a surprise attempt at recapture.

Two other clashes between the military cadets and the Bolsheviks occurred

Wife of Former Congressman Is Held on Picketing Charge

Washington, Nov. 13.—Mrs. William Kent of Kentfield, Cal., wife of a member of the federal tariff board and former representative in congress, was one of a party of 31 members of the Woman's party held for trial in the police court today on the technical charge of obstructing traffic in front of the White House.

Today 81 were called in court as the result of renewed picketing and 27 of the 31 had been in court before for the same offense.

Trials of the thirty-one women were postponed until Friday when the cases were called in court today.

Candy Makers Warned by Food Administration

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 13.—Candy makers of the far west are warned in a telegram to sugar refiners from the national food administration that those who are cheating the government by buying more sugar than allotted, will later receive none at all. Some have been buying from jobbers in addition to their full allotment from refiners. The telegram warns of an investigation. Those found to have been buying more than allotted will be cut off from all sources of supply.
