

ADVOCATES RIVER ROUTE FOR HIGHWAY

Committee From Junction City Appears Before State Highway Commission Meeting.

A committee of Junction City residents appeared before the meeting of the state highway commission at their last meeting and advocated the river route for the Pacific highway between Junction City and Eugene. The west route, as it is called, had been recommended by the highway engineers. In support of the claims of the river route, C. N. Johnston, spokesman of the committee, made some statements, according to published accounts, with which Highway Commissioner E. J. Adams, of this city, does not agree.

When the attention of E. J. Adams, state highway commissioner, was called to the article, Mr. Adams stated that while it was in part correct, the article contained several misleading statements. Mr. Adams, while stating that if called upon to decide at once as to the choice between the river road and the west road between Eugene and Junction City highway he would choose the river road. He believed that the people of Lane county should be consulted and permitted to have a say in selecting the line.

He stated also that the article failed to give the main reasons advanced by the engineers of the highway commission for the use of the west route. This was that by taking this route eight miles of the hard surfaced road would be used by both the Pacific highway and the Eugene-Florence road, a saving of six miles of hard surface construction, as the west road was but two miles longer than the river road instead of four as stated. Mr. Adams also called attention to the fact that the river road was already a good macadam road and if the Pacific highway followed the west route it would give two highways accommodating local traffic instead of one which would be the case if the Pacific highway followed the river road.

EUGENE TEAM WILL PLAY COTTAGE GROVE

High School Plans to Have Special Train to That Place Next Friday.

The Eugene high school football team will play with the Cottage Grove team Friday afternoon on the Cottage Grove grounds. The game was scheduled for Friday afternoon instead of Saturday so that the high school players would have a chance to see the California-Oregon University game Saturday. It was also necessary in order to get officials as all football enthusiasts would be unable to be present on Saturday because of the other game.

The high school is planning to run a special train to Cottage Grove Friday afternoon, leaving Eugene about 1 o'clock and returning immediately after the game, reaching this city not later than 7 o'clock.

A rousing rally was held at the high school building Monday evening at which there were definite arrangements made for the securing of the train. The faculty reported Tuesday morning that tickets were being rapidly sold for the special train.

MOTORCYCLE THIEF ADMITS HIS GUILT

Pat Riner, Alias Henry Lane, Owns Up to Several Thefts of Machines.

Pat Riner, alias Henry Lane, who stole Elmer Johnson's motorcycle and was captured at Roseburg about a week ago, has been turned over to the California authorities and returned to Bakersfield. He is wanted there for a series of alleged motorcycle thefts.

His arrest followed when he took Johnson's motorcycle a few days after the Springfield bank robbery, and when especially strenuous efforts were made to catch him because of the belief that he was the bank bandit. He admitted the theft of the machine, which was found in his possession at Roseburg, and also the theft of a machine at Bakersfield.

Riner lays his downfall to the fact that he bought a motorcycle on the installment plan and sold it before he had it paid for. The man he owed suddenly returned to town and he took the first motorcycle he could find and fled, afterwards coming to Oregon.

Boy Scouts Enthusiastic Over Forming Orchestra

The Boy Scouts of the city have just completed the organization of a splendid nine-piece orchestra which will be under the direction of Miss Grace Henderson, of the Junior high school. 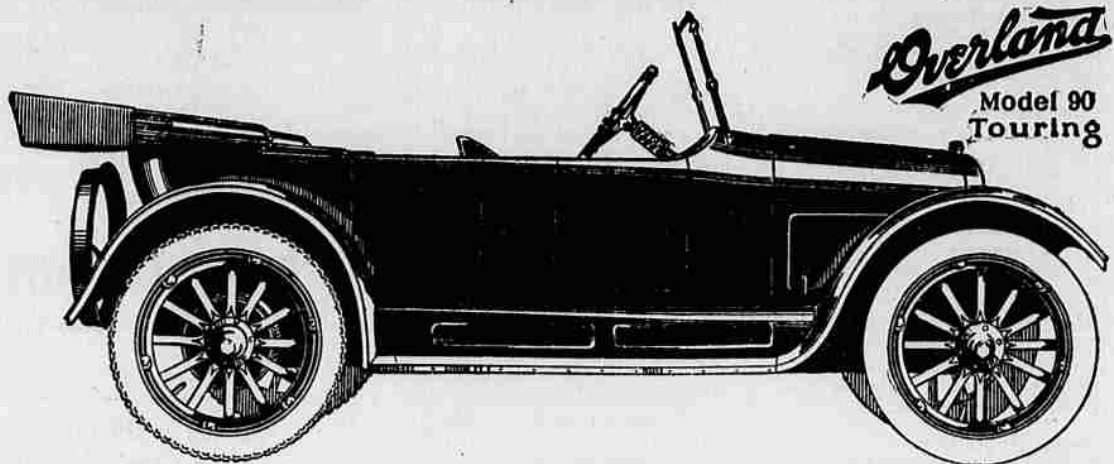
