Mrs. Boynton, who has been delivering anti-tuberculosis charts to all schools which took part in the sale of seals last year, made a short talk on the work, and pledged the students to help again this year. Teachers are glad to get the chart, Mrs. Boynton said, as they are used as a basis in physiology and composition work.

CORN PRICES STRONG
IN CHICAGO MARKET

Close 3-8 to 1 1-4 Cents Net
Higher With December \$1.21

Chicago, Nov. 13.—Corn prices weakened today owing largely to the move-

ment of the New York market. Opening quotations which ranged from 1-8c off to half advance, were followed by a moderate general setback.

Falling off in receipts and notices of consignments from the country brought about a rally. The close was strong 3-8 to 1 1-4 net higher, with December 1.21 3-8 and May 1.16 7-8 to 1.17.

Ons were depressed by liberal commission house selling. The market was governed by the same general reasons as corn.

Strength in the hog market lifted provisions. Stockyard interests were the principal buyers.

WALL STREET

New York, Nov. 13.—Disquieting foreign reports and fresh selling of rails at new low records were the main features of today's dull and reactionary market. Sales approximated 475,000 shares.

Steel shares were the heaviest features of the intermediate session, losing 1 to 2 points from yesterday's final prices. Rails steadied but shippings and coppers showed further reactionary tendencies. The moderate rally of the last hour, led by metals and motors, was offset by a reaction in Marines. The closing was heavy. Liberty 4's sold at 99.94 to 99.80, the 3 1/2's varying between 99.36 and 99.20.
