

WANT BULLETIN ON NATURE GERMAN RULE

Teachers Ask State Department of Education to Issue Pamphlet on the Subject.

The Lane County Teachers' institute Wednesday asked that the state department of education issue a bulletin upon the German government, recognizing that the present authorities available are not accurate. The resolution follows:

"Resolved, That, realizing the importance at this time of a better knowledge of the true nature of the German government and feeling that the material upon this subject found in our text books and other available books of reference is not only inadequate but misleading we respectfully request the state department of education that a bulletin covering the matter be submitted to all of the teachers of this state."

The members also pledged themselves by resolution, to do all in their power to aid in the war. They also passed resolutions thanking the people of Eugene for the use of the high school building and the many accommodations extended to them and to the speakers and musical organizations who have helped to make the institute a success.

Criticize School Plans.
The teachers went on record as favoring a reorganization of the rural school system, and in support of their recommendations submitted the following statements of facts concerning the school system of this state:

"That more than 80 per cent of all of the teachers of one-room rural schools are changed every year.

"That 40 per cent of all the teachers in one-room schools are beginners each year.

"That local taxes for school purposes in Oregon vary from nothing to 22 mills.

"That the school term is yet undemocratic because it is unequal, the term varying from eight to ten months.

"That the task of the teacher in the rural school is unequal because some schools are as small as one pupil while others have as many as 50 pupils. This is manifestly unfair to the taxpayers, the teachers and the children.

"That there is no system by which our teachers in rural schools are employed and paid. There is no differentiation in salary between the most poorly equipped and the most efficiently equipped teachers. There is no system of salary increase according to the number of grades to be taught; no plan to encourage the retention of teachers in rural schools by salary schedule.

Superintendent Handicapped.
"That the office of the county superintendent is handicapped by political affiliations and by statutory limitations of salary.

"That we have the same course of study for the one-teacher country school that we have for the eight-teacher town school.

"That our state normal school is so

handicapped because of limited funds that it is impossible for it to offer adequate training for rural teachers.

"That the state has thus far failed to make any special appropriation for an intelligent investigation of and experiment in the problem of the rural schools.

"We sincerely believe that all of these difficulties can be largely overcome by the following measures, to which we invite your careful consideration:

"A very much increased unit of taxation for school purposes, making school funds fluid so that they may be used where needed.

"That the unit of school administration should coincide with the unit of taxation.

"That the administration of schools should be placed in the hands of a small board of strong men and women who would work in conjunction with an expert school man selected purely for his professional and administrative ability, paid for according to that ability, and entirely divorced from all political parties.

Consolidate Schools.
"That many of the schools of the Willamette valley should be consolidated guaranteeing in country districts all of the modern facilities of good school work.

"That the state should vastly increase its attention to the matter of the training of rural teachers. To do this adequately a minimum of \$30,000 per annum is needed.

"That the combined interest and intelligence of every rural teacher, educator, farmer and public spirited citizen of the country should be used in the creation of a course of study especially suited to the life and needs of the country districts."

"These are mournful times for Europe. Our own countries also come under their shadow, but we are fortunate in having been able to keep out of the war."
The king expressed his thanks to the Danish people for their readiness to submit to privations in order to assist the other Scandinavian countries.
