QUESTIONAIRES TO BE MAILED IN SERIES

Five per Cent Will Be Sent Out Every Two Days Beginning Saturday Next.

The Lane county exemption board will commence sending out the questionnaires Saturday, December 15, and will send out five per cent each two days until all are sent. The questionnaires will be sent out according to the order numbers of each man, not according to the serial number. There is a man has each serial number for each registration precinct, but

only one man has the same order number in the county. Registered men who have not secured their order number should call at the courthouse and look it up in the list filed in the vestibule. The board has issued the following statement regarding the questionnaires:

"So that those persons who know their order number may know upon what day their questionnaire will be mailed to them from the office of the Local Board of Lane County, to their last known address. This order number is the number that was given them after the drawing which took place in Washington and is not the serial or Red Ink number first given them. Each person registered has had ample time before this to know this order number, but those who have not can find out the same by consulting the list which is posted just inside the Court house door, first finding their name, their order number will be opposite the same, after their address."

Russia. These men, according to the correspondent, are introducing dissension everywhere. He continues:

"Although floods of indignation are being poured out daily upon the Bolsheviks, it is beyond question that they are gaining ground in Russia, simply because they use a strong hand, which is the only thing the Russians in general appreciate. Their methods might horrify the west but would be understood perfectly east of the Suez.

"For example, in the last three weeks there have been taken out of the rivers and canals of Petrograd 7,000 naked corpses of persons whose deaths were not caused by drowning. The injuries which caused death tell their own story. A suit of clothes nowadays in Russia is worth more than handfuls of paper money. The corpses of the women even had the hair cut off because it represented marketable value."

Referring to Siberia's declaration of independence, the correspondent says the Siberian troops are being reorganized under Chief General Plekoff, one of the best known officers. It is reported that the Siberians have declared in favor of a monarchy.

The correspondent asserts that although the stories of the activities of the Cossacks in the southwest vary, it is certain they are standing for law and order. He predicts that eventually the Russians will again present a front against the Germans, adding that nothing whatsoever within the range of human thought that happens in Russia need now occasion any surprise.

"Among the highly important facts," he continued, "is the recovery of the Russian church of its full independence and self government. It has again established the patriarchate and is preparing to take an important part in the present struggle."

The Jews of Russia, he predicts, will have an important influence. The capture of Jerusalem by the British, he says, will be a weighty factor in the situation. He also reports that former Emperor Nicholas and his family are enjoying much greater freedom of movement at Tobolsk and that there is talk of bringing them back to European Russia.

REPORTS KORNILOFF VICTORY.

London, Dec. 13.—A battle has occurred near Bogorod in southern Russia, between Bolshevik forces and troops under General Korniloff, but the outcome has not been established and Petrograd advices are conflicting. The Petrograd correspondent of the Daily Mail reports that General Korniloff was defeated and wounded and that his capture was to be expected. A despatch from the representative of the Post, however, denies the reported Bolshevik victory, saying General Korniloff has routed his opponents and will soon join General Kaledines at Novo Tcheransk.

The Post correspondent, who received his information from an unnamed source, sends a detailed description of the battle. He says General Korniloff had about 3000 men making up what is known as the "Wild Division" of Cavaliers of St. George, "battalions of death," and some artillery. When the Bolshevik troops were encountered, General Korniloff divided his army and sent one part forward by train. This was soon followed up by the Bolsheviks, who promptly trumpeted a great victory. General Korniloff, however, in the meantime maneuvered his main force near the Bolsheviks and attacked with artillery. Some of his opponents fled and others surrendered or joined the Red Guard section of the Korniloff army. The remaining Bolsheviks were surrounded and dealt with very drastically.

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WORK OF OREGON ARTISTS DISPLAYED

Colorful Exhibit Opened at the University; Lecture Will Be Given Monday Night.

Mix oil paintings ranging from tones of crimson in the centre to greens and yellow at either end, supplement them with water colors, pastels and charcoals, sprinkled with a few pieces of sculpture throw in a background of dull gray and you have an idea of the coloring of the exhibit of Oregon art which is being shown to the public at the University school of architecture.

The collection will be shown every afternoon from two until five o'clock until the beginning of the Christmas holidays. A lecture on the display will be given in the exhibit room next Monday evening at eight o'clock by Professor Roswell Dosch, instructor in the art department.

All the sculptured pieces shown have been done by Mr. Dosch, who has studied under Bourdelle, the greatest pupil of the late Auguste Rodin. Remarkable among these is a bust of his mother, Mrs. Dosch, a symbolic work, and characterized by Professor A. H. Schroff as the finest thing that Mr. Dosch has done. Busts of his father, Colonel H. E. Dosch, his small nephew, Fleuret Dosch and Dr. George Rebec, all show high creative genius and fairly breathe with realism.

Striking among the oil paintings is a portrait study by Shanna Cumming, of Portland. The exquisite coloring, the splendid poise of the head, the fine sense of proportion combined with the subtle personality of the thing fascinate the visitor. "The Boy in Red" by Miss C. J. Stephens, teacher in the Portland art museum, is another outstanding piece of work. Dashing in design and execution, the brilliant coloring and finished workmanship of the piece are remarkably effective.

Vibrant with color and life is "The Portland Public Market," by Miss Edna Breyman, of Portland. "The Spring Freshet" also by Miss Breyman, is an exquisite study in pale grays and greens. "The Old Barn," by Datus E. Mears, has a remarkably realistic out-of-doors atmosphere. Prominent among the oil works are some samples of still life by Miss Anna Bell Crocker, curator of the art museum in Portland, and Miss Fern Merriam.

Particularly fine among the water colors are the works of H. F. Wents, an art teacher of Portland, who displays an unusual sense of color and power of expression.
