

PIONEER RESIDENT WALKER YOUNG DIES AFTER LONG ILLNESS

Pioneer Passes Away on Farm on Which He Has Resided for Over 65 Years.

Charles Walker Young, for 65 years a resident of Lane county, died at his home three miles north of Eugene Friday evening, December 28, 1917, at the age of 87 years.

Mr. Young, with his bride, came across the plains in the prime of his young manhood in 1852 and took up the donation claim on which he died, having continuously resided there and kept the farm in a high state of cultivation with increasing productiveness. He had a prize winning herd of Shorthorns at the county fair this year, and had always been noted as one of the best farmers in the county.

Mr. Young was born in Lafayette county, Mo., May 12, 1830. On February 22, 1852, he was married to Mary B. Gillespie, and the following spring started with others across the plains to Oregon, reaching The Dalles in August of that

year and arriving here in October of the same year.

Mrs. Young passed on a few years ago. Mr. Young is survived by two sons and five daughters: Baxter Young, of Springfield; Cal Young, of Eugene; Mrs. Thomas Van Duyn, of Coburg; Mrs. James Shields, of Bellingham, Wash.; Mrs. William Wallace, of Spokane, Wash.; Mrs. Claud Copple of Hood River and Mrs. Frank McAllister, of Eugene.

Funeral services will be held at the family residence Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock, Dr. J. W. Ford being in charge of the services. Interment will be in the Gillespie cemetery.

Wife of Bavarian Official Is Held for Violating Swiss Law

Geneva, Dec. 29.—The Princess von Wrede, wife of a chamberlain in the entourage of the king of Bavaria, has been condemned by a court at Vevey to pay a fine of \$100 and costs for buying up and storing large quantities of foodstuffs in her villa at Territet, contrary to Swiss law. The princess, sometimes accompanied by the prince, is said to have scoured the country around Montreux in an automobile, purchasing food which has been confiscated by the authorities.

Film Shown at Eugene Theatre Portrays Dangers to Country From German Propaganda.

"Draft No. 258" shown at the Eugene theatre Friday afternoon and evening and scheduled for Saturday afternoon and evening is a strong film production which might be seen with profit by everyone in Eugene.

To the patriot it will bring added inspiration. To the "slacker" it may bring an aroused sense of his duties to his country, and to the pacifist it may bring the awakening to the fact that he is being used to forward the aims of the enemies of the country, and is by them known as a "fool pacifist" who can be made to do their dirty work and whom they despise and hate even while they use him.

The production portrays so vividly the methods of the propagandists in working through men who believe in "academic freedom," and oppose the war that all who excuse such an attitude should see it.

That the government approves of the film and the lesson that it teaches is evidenced by the fact that several troops of cavalry and an army cantonment form part of the action.

Californian Is Removed From State Council of Defense

Sacramento, Calif., Dec. 29.—John Francis Neylan has been "removed" as a member of the state council of defense "because of a personal political activity that has so frequently interfered with the important work of the council of defense," Governor Wm. D. Stephens said here today in a statement announcing the appointment of Marshall De Motte, chairman of the state board of control to succeed Neylan.

Asked if he had received the resignation of Mr. Neylan, made public last night in San Francisco, Governor Stephens answered:

"I have no resignation."

The governor gave out the following statement:

"I have appointed Mr. Marshall De Motte, chairman of the state board of control, member of the state council of defense, to succeed Mr. John Francis Neylan, removed because of a personal political activity that has so frequently interfered with the important work of the council of defense that I have several times been on the point of making a change."

Submarine Is Destroyed (Continued from page one)

righted herself and seemed to increase her speed. The Nicholson cleared, the Fanning headed for the U-boat, firing from the bow gun. After the third shot the crew of the submarine all came on deck and held up their hands. The submarine surrendered at 5:28 p. m.

"The Fanning approached the submarine to pick up the prisoners both destroyers keeping their batteries trained on the boat.

"A line was got to the submarine, but in a few minutes she sunk, the line was let go and the crew of the U-boat jumped into the water and swam to the Fanning.

"Although the crew all wore life preservers," the statement continues, "a number of them were exhausted when they reached the side of the destroyer. As the submarine sank, five or six men were caught by the radio aerial and carried below the surface before they disentangled themselves. Ten of the men were so weak that lines had to be passed under their arms to haul them aboard. One man was in such a condition that he could not even hold the line thrown him. Chief Pharmacist's Mate Elmer Harwell and Coxswain Francis G. Connor, (N. N. V.) jumped overboard after this man and secured a line under his arms. When he was hauled aboard, every effort was made to resuscitate him, but he died in a few minutes. The four officers of the submarine and 35 members of the crew were all taken prisoners.

"After being taken on board, the prisoners were given hot coffee and sandwiches. Though kept under strict guard they seemed contented and after a short time commenced to sing. To make them comfortable the crew of the destroyer gave them their warm coats and heavy clothing.

"The German officers said the first depth charge had wrecked the machinery of the submarine and caused her to sink to a considerable depth.

"The submarine bore no number nor

distinguishing mark. She was, however, identified by life belts and by statements of an officer and men of the crew. One of the life belts, the report said, had 'Kaiser' marked on one side, and 'Gott' on the other.

"The Fanning proceeded to port and transferred her prisoners under guard. As they were leaving in small boats, the Germans gave three cheers. The commanding officer of the Fanning read the burial service over the body of the dead German sailor, and the destroyer proceeded to sea and buried him with full military honors.

"In his report the commander of the Fanning praises the conduct of his officers and crew and gives particular credit to Lieut. Walter O. Henry, officer of the deck, and to Coxswain Loomis, who sighted the periscope. He also commends Pharmacist's Mate Harwell and Coxswain Connor, who jumped overboard to save the drowning German.

"The British commander-in-chief, under whom the destroyers were operating,

said this in his report to the British admiralty:

"The whole affair reflects credit on the discipline and training of the United States fleet," and added that the incident showed that the Fanning is a man of war in the best sense of the term, well disciplined and organized and ready for immediate action. He also praises her commander, Lieut. A. S. Carpenter, and commends Lieut. Henry, Coxswain Loomis, Pharmacist's Mate Harwell and Coxswain Connor. The British admiral also commended the prompt action of the Nicholson, which, he says, completed the success of its sister ship. The Nicholson was commanded by Lieut. G. H. Fort. The British admiralty sent a telegram to the commander-in-chief, directing him to express to the commanding officer, officers and men of the Fanning its high appreciation of their successful action against enemy submarines.

"Vice-Admiral Sims, commanding the American forces operating in European waters, commended the officers and men

of the Fanning and Nicholson. Coxswain Loomis was advanced to the next higher rating in recognition of his vigilance in sighting the periscope."
