

# RELATIVES ASKED TO MAKE AFFIDAVITS FOR SOLDIER BOYS

Local Board Would Like to Have Affidavits Where Men Have Already Entered Service of United States.

The local exemption board states that where a man has enlisted since the registration it is very desirable that relatives or close friends make affidavits to that effect.

Unless the questionnaires are returned promptly, all failing to return them are listed as deserters and their names will be published as such. In many cases the men are already in France or distant camps and it will be weeks before questionnaires sent such men can be returned. It is manifestly unjust that they be branded as deserters, and to avoid this relatives are requested to make out an affidavit telling the facts and giving the address of the registrant and his branch of service.

A form has been made out by the local board for this purpose and anyone needing can have a copy made and swear to it before a postmaster or notary public and return it to the local board and thus aid the board and remove any possible temporary stigma from the enlisted man. The affidavit follows:

## Pioneer Woman Dies at Home of Her Daughter

Creswell, Or., Jan. 1.—Mrs. Phoebe E. Hughes died here Sunday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Iula Shaub, at the age of 75 years, 5 months and 26 days. She leaves surviving her children as follows: C. L. Parsons, of Eugene; W. E. Parsons, of Redmond; Mrs. Mae Scott, of Creswell; R. H. Parsons, of Redmond; William Parsons, of Creswell; Mrs. Ann Riggs, of Cottage Grove, and Mrs. Iula Shaub, of Creswell.

Mrs. Hughes was one of the pioneers of this county and the west. She was born in Van Buren county, Iowa, on July 4, 1842, and when nine years of age crossed the plains with her father and mother in 1849 with an ox team, settling at Fremont, Cal. In 1851 they moved to Yreka, Cal., and had experiences fighting Indians, the women being kept in the fort while the men protected them with their guns.

Her funeral was held at the Methodist church at Creswell Monday noon at 1 o'clock, the Reverend Mr. Green, pastor of the church, officiating. Interment was in the Odd Fellows cemetery at Eugene beside her father and mother.
