

MARINES WIN FROM CAMP LEWIS, 19-7

Pacific Coast Service Honors Won in Football Game Before 40,000 Persons.

HEAT OVERCOMES THREE

Pasadena, Cal., Jan. 2.—While the east shivered in zero weather on New Year's day, three persons were overcome by the heat during the football game between the Marines and Camp Lewis here. One of the three suffered a sunstroke.

More than 40,000 persons witnessed the game. Most of the women were attired in filmy summer gowns, while many men wore white duck.

Pasadena, Cal., Jan. 2.—Before 40,000 persons, the largest number ever invading Tournament Park to witness a football struggle, the Mare Island Marines decisively triumphed over the Camp Lewis eleven yesterday for the service championship of the Pacific coast by a score of 19 to 7.

Yesterday's victory gives the Marines an unbroken string of victories for the season and marks the eleven as one of the greatest football teams in the country. It is doubtful if any gridiron eleven in the country could have stopped Hugo Bezdek's warriors the way they pummeled themselves to victory over the Army.

The Marines were first to score when Ambrose booted the ball between the goal posts for a place kick from the 28-yard line in the second quarter. Shortly afterward the Camp Lewis men fought their way down the field and Romney carried the ball over for a touchdown. McKay placed the ball squarely between the goal posts for the seventh point.

The Marines were not to be denied,

and a few minutes later Quarterback Brown, of the Marines, returned McKay's punt 40 yards through a broken field, and later with a series of brilliant forward passes, Brown to Beckett, and Brown to Sanderson, the latter netting 45 yards, put the ball within a few yards of the goal line. Brown skirted around Camp Lewis' left end for a touchdown, but Ambrose failed to kick goal.

A place kick by Ambrose, together with a touchdown by Huntington, and a field goal by Ambrose, netted 10 points for the Marines in the last quarter.

Washington, Jan. 2.—Romulo S. Naon, the Argentine ambassador, and an ardent exponent of Pan-Americanism, acted as the strenuous go-between and adviser when Secretary Lansing published Count Luxburg's notorious diplomatic correspondence.

Since the Luxburg duplicity was exposed, the Argentine republic has been going through one of the greatest crises in its history. The strong pro-ally party there has been balked from entering the war, on account of President Frigoyen's rigid neutrality.

Ambassador Naon—his friends call him Dr. Naon—has suddenly been placed in a position of even greater importance than his president. He is his nation's principal adviser, since Washington is the world's war capital.

80 PER CENT PEOPLE OF WORLD ARE NOW AT WAR WITH BERLIN

Washington, Jan. 1.—Advent of a New Year finds nine-tenths of the world's population in arms.

Determined that civilization shall triumph over "Kultur," eighty per cent of the people of the world have declared war on Germany and her allies. Thirty of the 53 countries at war are arrayed against the central powers, nineteen having taken up arms and eleven having broken diplomatic relations. Russia, however, is on the verge of peace today.

Less than eight per cent of the total population—nineteen small states—have maintained their neutrality in the great struggle. The Germanic powers represent slightly more than 11 per cent of the world's population.

The total population of the allies who have declared war is 1,370,225,000 while the peoples of the central powers total 156,572,000.

The eleven small states that have sent the Teutonic ministers home have a population of 21,870,000, while the total of the dwindling number of neutrals is 147,511,000.

Arrayed against the Kaiser, in order of their declarations of war, are Serbia, Russia, France, Belgium, Great Britain, Montenegro, Japan, Italy, San Marino, Portugal, Rumania, United States, Cuba, Panama, Greece, Siam, Liberia, China and Brazil.

Those that have severed relations are: Bolivia, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua, Santo Domingo, Haiti, Chile, Costa Rica, Peru, Uruguay and Ecuador—all of South America; evidence of how the republics of the south are standing behind the big republic of the north.

Holland is a leading neutral, and among the others are Spain and the Scandinavian nations.

Argentina is on the verge of war as a result of the Luxburg exposures by the state department.

The other three South American neutrals are Colombia, Paraguay and Venezuela.

Russians Call Halt

and the Rumanians are at the breaking point today.

Minister Tsherbatscheff is refusing to send provisions to the Rumanian troops, causing much suffering.

The fourth Rumanian army yesterday occupied the Bessarabian town of Loeva and several other villages, arresting and shooting a number of Bolshevik leaders.

Foreign Minister Trotsky caused additional ill feeling among Rumanians when he sent a note to the Rumanian ambassador in Petrograd threatening harsh measures against Rumanian officers for alleged aid they granted to the Kaledines revolt.

The ambassador retorted that Russian troops are demoralized, that the army lacked organization, transport and provisions, and that soldiers were leaving the front without authority and plundering Rumanian villages.

Trotsky replied to this note that the answer was "unsatisfactory."

Rumanian forces opposed the armistice and have bitterly urged against a separate peace.

GERMANY NOT BOUND

Petrograd, Jan. 2.—Germany will not consider the Brest-Litovsk declarations as binding on her unless the allies accept the invitation to negotiate a general peace, according to M. Parlovich, a non-Bolshevik delegate, who returned from the conferences today.

"Germany's fundamental aim in the negotiations," he said, "is to establish an economic union from Hamburg to the Persian gulf."

"The Bulgarian and Turkish representatives are more obstinate in the conferences than the Germans, but I do not think they will hamper future negotiations."

"In return for the evacuation of Belgium and France, Germany will demand the freeing of Mesopotamia, Arabia and Palestine, as well as the return of Tripoli in case of further success against Italy."
