"Registration—Funeral march of liberty."

"Thence—Digging your own grave."

Associated with Goldman and Berkman were Louis Kramer and Morris Becker, both of New York City, who testified they were members of the No-Conscription league. Kramer tried to induce Joseph J. Finnan, a policeman in civilian clothes, not to register.

Three Cases from Cleveland.

The case of three Cleveland (Ohio) socialists, Charles E. Ruthenberg, Alfred Wagenknecht and Charles Baker, who were convicted of inducing young men not to register, were also decided by today's decision. Their claim that the jury was chosen entirely by republicans and democrats and that the socialist party had no representation was overruled. Their arrest was the result of a socialist peace meeting in the public square at Cleveland, May 20, when Baker said he "would rather be shot here as a man than shot in the trenches of Europe as a dog."

Four Minnesota young men, who failed to register and are now in the Minnesota state penitentiary under a year's sentence, are also affected by today's decision. They are Joseph F. Arver, Alfred F. Grah, and Otto and Walter Wangerin.

The case of Albert Jones, negro, of Duffie county, Ga., was the last case advanced to come under today's ruling. He objected to the draft as "slavery."

GRAIN PRICES STEADY IN CHICAGO MARKET

Despite Blockade of Shipments by Heavy Snowfall, Quotations on Oats Are Lower.

Chicago, Jan. 7.—Despite the blockade of shipments by the heavy snowfall, oats prices were generally lower today because of commission house buying.

January oats opened unchanged at 79 5-8 and later lost 3-8. March opened 7-8 higher but later lost 3-4 to 70. May opened at 77 1-2 up 1-8, but subsequently lost 1-4.

Corn was irregular. January opened 1-5 up at 1.27 1-2, but later lost the same fraction. May opened at 1.25 3-8, up 1-8, and later gained 1-4.

Provisions were higher on a higher hog market.

Steel Corporation Fails to Force Trust Suit Decision

Washington, Jan. 7.—The attempt of the United States Steel corporation to force an immediate decision by the supreme court on the government dissolution suit against the trust failed today when the court continued the case until the October term. The steel corporation attorneys last week protested the government motion, asking the postponement of all cases until after the war.

The court granted the motion in opposition to the government's step in the case of the United Shoe Machinery company, one of the anti-trust suits, and it will be argued this week. All the other cases have been postponed.

GOLF MEETING POSTPONED.

The meeting of the golf club scheduled for tomorrow night (Tuesday) has been postponed for one week. There will be election of officers. In yesterday's play, Bert Prescott beat George McMorran, and L. L. Goodrich beat Darwin Bristow. This leaves Prescott to play Con Dillon and Ormond Bean to play Goodrich next Sunday.

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FEDERAL OWNERSHIP OF ROADS OPPOSED

Forces Rising to Block Plan Reveal Themselves in Congressional Circles Today.

Washington, Jan. 7.—Forces rising to block government ownership of the railroad revealed themselves in congress and railroad circles today.

While Director-General McAdoo was compiling statistics for congress on his financing plans under federal operation, Senator Watson, Indiana, and Gullinger, New Hampshire, introduced bills preventing indefinite government control after the war.

Before the senate interstate commerce committee, A. P. Thom, general counsel for the railroads, declared the railroads will not favor any plan of government operation or control which takes away from them control of their finances. He said the government might operate the railroads, letting the various concerns handle their own money, Great Britain having found this plan successful.

Thom stated that the railroads will insist on getting all their profits instead of simply a guaranteed income.

Leading railroad executives have said that McAdoo contemplates a financial program for operating the railroads that will prevent their ever returning to private control.

House and senate interstate commerce committees met today to discuss the railroad bill. The house committee temporarily postponed Director-General McAdoo's appearance until detailed plans can be made. The senate committee began its consideration by hearing Thom and Samuel Res, president of the Pennsylvania.

A number of republican senators in a caucus last Sunday voted to back Watson's amendment. They are all sworn foes of government ownership. These senators today claimed they will have the support of conservative democratic senators.

Modification of Siuslaw River Franchise Is Asked

Salem, Or., Jan. 7.—Application for a re-hearing and modification of the conditions of its franchise for handling logs in the Siuslaw river was filed with the public service commission today by the Siuslaw Boom company. The company particularly asks the striking out of the portion of the order requiring improvements on several tributary creeks.

Two American Airmen Are Killed in Accidents

Washington, Jan. 7.—Two American flyers were killed in airplane accidents in France, the war department announced today. They were:

First Lieutenant William F. Ely, Rochester, N. Y.

Sergeant G. E. Houdek, killed Jan. 4. His sister, Mrs. Marie Cech, lives in Chicago.

No details were given. Two other deaths from natural causes were reported by General Pershing today.

M. S. Wallace, formerly deputy sheriff of Lane county, was the successful bidder for the task of auditing the books of Lane county. The price is \$345. Don Hamlin bid \$390. A man named Wilson, of Corvallis, was also a bidder, but was above Wallace.

MEETINGS OPEN WELL

The Rose-Crim revival meetings opened at the Christian church Sunday with large attendance at every service. A chorus choir of about 50 voices is being organized, which together with the Sunday school orchestra, pipe organ and piano fills the church with inspiring music at each session.

VILLA BANDITS DEFEATED.

Port Hancock, Texas, Jan. 7.—Villa bandits, numbering 150, were defeated last night in an engagement with 300 Carranzista cavalry from the Juarez garrison, on the Mexican side of the border, near here. The bandits fled southward.

A second band of bandits is reported just over the border near the junction of the Texas and New Mexico lines.

SOLDIERS EXTEND THANKS.

Soldiers from Camp Lewis, who passed through Eugene one morning recently asked the employees at the depot to extend their hearty thanks to the Red Cross workers of Eugene for the Christmas packages sent to soldiers at Camp Lewis.

ENLIST IN SHIPBUILDING.

Hans Bertelsen and Harry Winther left this afternoon for Aberdeen, Wash., where they will enlist in the shipbuilding industry until the end of the war. Chris Jensen accompanied the boys to Portland.

STUDENT ELECTRICIANS LEAVE.

HENEY ASSAILED BY PACKER'S SPOKESMAN

J. Ogden Armour Criticizes Attorney for Federal Trade Commission for Interviews.

Chicago, Jan. 7.—J. Ogden Armour, packer, in an interview here, assailed Francis J. Heney, attorney for the federal trade commission, for giving out interviews.

"Almost daily during the last two weeks there have appeared in the press interviews with Mr. Heney in which he has undertaken to tell what he and the government intended to do with the packers," said Armour.

"The public was told Saturday that the government will assume control of the business of the packers through receiverships. On other occasions Mr. Heney has informed the public that the packers would be prosecuted civilly or criminally and on one occasion has intimated that certain of them would be sent to jail."

"I had assumed until I read Mr. Heney's interview that the civil or criminal prosecution of taking charge of the packers' business through receiverships was a matter that was lodged by law in the department of justice."

"Under an act of congress the government has in effect already assumed practical control of the packing business."

"No greater injury can be done the packers than to affect their credit by fomenting public discontent."

Newly Organized "Preps" Start Off With Contest

Last Saturday, 21 boys between the ages of 8 and 12, organized a preparatory class at the city Y. M. C. A., with A. R. Bagley as leader. They were divided into sides, the Red and the Blues, and are now started off on a big contest for the mutual benefit of the boys and the organization, which will run until July.

Points are to be given for thrift, personal conduct, service, work in gymnasium classes, swimming, bible classes, membership, paid-up subscriptions and other items, while bad conduct, etc., will occasion demerits. The boys have classes at 9 Saturday morning and 4 Tuesday afternoon. Mr. Bagley says he hopes the parents will back the boys up in their efforts. He expects to organize the sub-juniors in a similar manner soon.

DIVIDEND EXEMPT FROM TAX

Washington, Jan. 7.—Stock dividends were held to be exempt from income tax in a decision of the United States supreme court today. The ruling reverses the decision of the New York court in the case of Towne versus Elmer, collector.

As attorney for Towne, former Justice Hughes won his first case before the high court since leaving it.

There will be no admission, solicitation, nor asking of pledges. The monetary features of the war will be entirely ignored.

Japan Is Prepared to Protect Allied Subjects in Vladivostok

Tokio, Jan. 7.—Japan is prepared for any emergency at Vladivostok to protect the subjects of the allied nations and to fulfill her obligations to the entente, it was semi-officially stated today. She will make no move against the Bolsheviks, however, it was added.
