

GRAIN PRICES LOWER IN CHICAGO MARKET

Announcement That President Would Address Congress Is Factor.

Chicago, Jan. 8.—Announcement that President Wilson would address congress on foreign relations shortly before noon today sent out prices down 5-8 to 2-4 cents from an early bulge. Corn also showed a recession.

January corn opened 3-8 higher at 80-2, but later lost 1-2. March opened at 79-1-2, up 3-8, but subsequently lost 2-3-4. May opened 1-8 lower and later lost 5-8 to 7-8.

January corn opened late, at \$1.27 1-2 unchanged and continued at that figure. May opened unchanged at \$1.25 5-8, but later lost 3-8.

Provisions were steady, while hog prices were a shade lower.

to appear before the joint body of the national legislature.

From the outset there had been evidence of strength. This intelligence gave impetus to the buying and the highest point of the forenoon session was reached between that time and noon. The street had jumped to the conclusion that the president's purpose was to supplement the recent statement of peace aims by Lloyd George and this was just what it turned out to be. The earlier rise had, therefore, pretty well discounted the whole incident and the logical sequel was that prices gave way, albeit in very orderly fashion.

RESTORATION OF LAND TO STATE IS ORDERED

Supreme Court Gives Opinions in Six of Seven Hyde Land Fraud Cases.

Salem, Or., Jan. 8.—Restoration of 9,130 acres of land to the state was ordered today by the supreme court in the opinions in six of seven of the Hyde land fraud cases. Approximately 24,000 acres were found to have been obtained through fraud practiced upon the state, but the court held that title to this acreage had passed to the United States and could not be reverted in the state.

The cases decided were those appealed from Crook, Jackson, Lane, Hood River and Clackamas counties. The acreage restored to the state in each county follows:

Lane, 100 acres; Crook, 3800.31 acres; Jackson 2300 acres; Lynn 600 acres; Clackamas 1300 acres; Hood River 700 acres.

The court held that fraud was perpetrated through Hyde getting a large number of applicants to purchase state school lands within forest reserves and assign the lands to designated persons. These lands would then be used as a base for making illegal selections of government land outside of forest reserves. The action has been pending for several years in various circuit courts before being appealed.

BAVARIAN KING IS FOR WAR TO FINISH

Leopold Asserts That German Armies Must Force Enemy to Accept Conditions

Amsterdam, Jan. 8.—"We must fight until the enemy accepts our conditions," declared King Leopold of Bavaria, in a speech delivered on the occasion of a celebration of his birthday, despatches received here today asserted.

"May we beat our latest enemy, the Americans," the king asserted, as he called for new efforts in the war.

"The terms of our enemy are exorbitant," he continued. "We will not give up an inch of German ground and must try and safeguard our frontiers."
