

GRAIN PRICES LOWER IN CHICAGO MARKET

Trading on Board of Trade Purely Local as Result of Interruption in Transportation.

Chicago, Jan. 14.—Trading on the board of trade was purely local in character today because of the interruption of transportation and communication, incident to the recent storm. Prices were a shade lower.

January oats opened unchanged from Saturday's closing price, but later lost 1-2 to 70 5-8. March opened late at 78 5-8, down 1-4, and later lost the same fraction. May opened unchanged at 77 1-4, subsequently losing 5-8.

January corn opened late at 1.27 1-2, unchanged, and continued at that figure. May opened 1-8 off and later lost the same fraction to 1.25.

Provisions were a shade lower on a steady hog market.

WALL STREET

New York Jan. 14.—The New York Evening Sun financial review today said: Wall Street went the even tenor of its way through most of today's session of the stock market undisturbed by any appreciable extent by new developments or rumors which were more or less freely circulated.

Trading was thin and almost wholly professional, although there was a substratum of good investment buying in the market. The course of prices was variable but changes were narrow, until just before closing, when the entire list turned weak. Certain specialties and the tobacco group were well bought and smelters and Mexican Petroleum were in demand at intervals, gaining some two points or more. The steel stocks were easy throughout the forenoon, but they picked up somewhat at mid-day. Rails were neglected and inclined to be soft. Stocks were not offered in volume at any time and the short interest was rendered extremely cautious.

LANE COUNTY MAN DIES IN NEW JERSEY

A telegram has been received bringing the news of the death of Joel McCormack, of Marcola, who passed away Saturday following an operation for appendicitis, at Glen Ridge, N. J.

Mr. McCormack went east in October to visit relatives in New Jersey and was suddenly stricken and underwent an operation Friday but failed to recover from the disease. The remains will be brought back to Oregon and buried in the Masonic cemetery in Eugene.

Mr. McCormack had been a resident of Lane county about 38 years and leaves a widow and five children as follows: Margaret Windham, Eugene; George A. McCormack, Swift Current, Canada; Alice McCormack, Marcola, now attending the Oregon Agricultural college at Corvallis; Fred McCormack and Helen McCormack, also of Marcola.

There was a keen interest in both of the afternoon meetings especially that of Mrs. Rose, and she has been asked to give the talk again.

REVENUE COLLECTOR URGES QUICK ACTION

Those Who Have Not Filed Income Tax Are Urged to Do So at Once.

Revenue Collector Milton A. Miller urges all who are liable to pay income tax to make their return for the year 1917 at once. While no penalty for non-filing incurs until March 1, the citizen is doing his bit by making the return promptly and thus avoiding the rush at the last moment, as well as the possibility of putting off too long and becoming liable to a heavy penalty. Mr. Miller has sent the following to the Guard with a request for publication:

"I would urge those who have not filed their 1917 income tax return to do so at once. The call for income tax is just as essential to the success of our cause as a call to arms.

"If you are single and receive an income of \$1000 during 1917 you must make a return.

"If you are married or head of a family and receive an income of \$2000 during 1917 you must make a return.

"You cannot deduct living expenses in arriving at the amount of your income, and if you have any doubt as to your liability you should at once communicate

with the collector of internal revenue.

"Every dollar or fraction of a dollar paid as income tax advances the great cause for which it is paid.

"You will have until March 1st in which to file your return but you will relieve a great burden by filing early.

"It is no less a duty than a privilege to meet this call from Uncle Sam.

"For your convenience there will be an income tax officer at the county court house until January 25th to give free information and assist you in making out your return.

"If any of your friends or others whom you know either through ignorance of the law or otherwise, have failed to respond try to impress upon them the importance of this call so that they may not later be caught in the dragnet.

"After March 1st income tax inspectors will be sent every section of the country for the purpose of investigating income tax delinquents and those who fail to make reports of their incomes will then be compelled to do so and they will also be liable for heavy penalties for having failed to make their returns before March 1st, 1918."

RED CROSS CHAPTER IN GOOD CONDITION

Complete Report of Treasurer Shows Over \$3600 On Hand and Receivable.

The first report of the treasurer of the local Red Cross chapter, covering the period from the time of its founding on April 5, to December 31, has just been given out. The various items of receipts and expenditures, which show that \$15,025.29 has been handled, and that the chapter is in very good condition at present with \$1,841.00 on hand in cash and \$1,805.31 receivable, follow:

Receipts: Annual dues retained by chapter \$1,100; subscribing dues retained by chapter, \$15; magazine subscriptions retained by chapter, 75 cents; sales of insignia, \$125.75; general fund, miscellaneous income, \$1,650.57; military relief supplies fund, miscellaneous income, \$872.47; disaster relief fund, \$2.50; Red Cross war fund, chapter's 25 per cent, \$10,000; membership dues due Washington, \$1,145; magazine subscriptions due Washington, \$10.25; advance dues, \$3. Total, \$15,025.29.

Expenditures—Rent, heat and light, \$2.85; salaries and wages, \$89.15; postage, stationery and printing, \$120.00; telephone, telegraph and cable, \$40.74; cost of instruction classes, \$30; cost of insignia, \$83.21; general fund, miscellaneous expenses, \$569.30; military relief supplies, \$9,275.32; disaster relief, remitted to headquarters, \$2.50; membership dues remitted to Washington, \$1,145; magazine subscriptions remitted to Washington, \$10.25; accounts receivable from branches at end of period, \$1,700.33; accounts receivable, other, \$104.98; cash on hand at end of period \$1,841.00. Total, \$15,025.29.

College Mates of 20 Years Ago Visit at University

Dr. R. E. Moritz, head of the department of mathematics at the University of Washington, visited the University of Oregon on Thursday and Friday, leaving for the University of California and Stanford.

Dr. Moritz, who was a college mate of Professor E. E. DeCon, head of the department of mathematics at Oregon, at the University of Chicago, twenty years

ago, was the guest of the Science club at a luncheon given Friday noon at the Hotel Osburn.

Author of several standard works on mathematics, Dr. Moritz praised the library equipment of the mathematics department in the University of Oregon. He is also the inventor of a device for the drawing of curves which is in use by men of science.

Before leaving for the south, Dr. Moritz went to Goshen for a visit with his sister, Mrs. Boyd. He has taken a two-term leave of absence and is making a tour of inspection of the universities of the United States.
