EUGENE FACTORY IS VALUABLE INDUSTRY

Veltum and Clow Manufacturing Company Enlarges Capacity and Is Kept Very Busy.

One of the Eugene industries which is growing into a plant of value to the community is the Veltum and Clow Manufacturing company which is making the Veltum valve-grinding machine, which is having phenomenal success.

The company has recently added several new machines to its plant, including a new drill press, and is kept busily engaged in filling orders for the machines. Four dozen were shipped to the Warlock-Worth Sales company at Sioux City, Iowa, Wednesday.

In addition to the new machinery installed two work benches of unique design invented by Mr. Veltum have been installed. The new benches are semi-circular in design, the mechanic standing in the center of the semi-circle, and can reach every point of an eight-foot bench without moving out of his tracks.

The semi-circular benches also have the advantage of permitting two benches, aggregating 16 feet of bench room to be placed under a single skylight.

The company has also built an office and otherwise improved the working facilities of the building. The company is now employing six mechanics constantly in the production of the machines and is barely able to keep even with its orders.

Mr. Veltum also has several other valuable inventions which the company expects to put upon the market when the present industry is firmly established and the workmen are trained in the special work, so that Mr. Veltum can give his own attention to the new devices.

Fuel Rule Unshaken

Senate and house circles and demands were made for revocation of the order. Despite this, however, there was no indication that the order would be revoked by the president.

Distribution of coal to all establishments except public utilities and a few indispensable institutions was stopped this morning.

All factories east of the Mississippi river, even those working on war contracts and excepting those manufacturing perishable food, must suspend operations entirely tomorrow and continue in idleness until next Tuesday night under the fuel administration order.

The next ten Mondays will be virtual holidays when all industry and amusement places must close. The order is compulsory and carries a fine of \$5,000 or one year's imprisonment for violation. It will be enforced by state fuel administrators.

Hopeless scarcity of fuel, combined with congestion of shipments, caused by the recent storm tieups in the midwest forced the fuel administration to take this sudden and far-reaching step.

Summarized, the provisions of the fuel administration's order are as follows: Domestic consumers, railroads, hospitals, charitable institutions, public utilities, ships, government buildings, manufacturers of perishable foods may operate continuously.

During five days from January 18 to 22, no manufacturing industry east of the Mississippi may operate even if it has coal on hand. Factories engaged in war work not excepted.

States of East Included. All states east of the Mississippi river, including Minnesota and Louisiana are included. These regulations with additional prohibitions on theatres and amusement places, to apply each Monday until March 25.

Penalties of \$5,000 or one year's imprisonment are provided under the Lever act, giving authority for this step.

Even in the face of pressing need of war supplies, it was thought wise to suspend all production and so, tomorrow, the work of making bullets and guns and uniforms for American fighting forces will halt while the country takes a hitch in its belt and straightens out its coal trouble. Without such a radical step, it was pointed out, more damaging delays might have occurred unexpectedly at later critical moments.

All details of the gigantic stroke are not made public. It is believed that some modification may be necessary or further elaboration of the orders. Hundreds of conditions will arise unexpectedly. Dr. Garfield will rely on state fuel administrators to handle these on their merits as to effect the greatest saving of fuel with the least disturbance or loss of industry.

But it was made clear today that America faces a desperate situation which only desperate steps can remedy. Every industry must bear its share of the burden, the administration declared, and even industries west of the Mississippi river will naturally be affected somewhat by the cessation of production in eastern plants. However, they will profit by the saving of coal.

Fuel Oil Users Affected.

Dr. Garfield's prohibition extends to fuel oil users and establishments using gasoline power as well as coal and coke. Water power, however, may be used at all times. Offices and stores will be allowed to keep sufficient fires to prevent freezing and attendant disturbances. Fire risks but no temperatures higher than thirty-two degrees. Stores which can operate without the use of coal for heating purposes may remain open. Grocery stores are not affected by the order since they handle perishable foods.

Newspapers on Monday, January 21 and for nine Mondays following will be limited to the number of editions customary on holidays, or to one edition if they do not ordinarily publish on holidays. Theatres and all places of amusement must close on the ten Monday holidays but not during the whole five-day period.

Monday, January 21, will be observed as one of the 10 Monday holidays, though it will also be one of the five days

during which all industry is suspended. Dr. Garfield forbids both delivery and use of coal in establishments affected.

Even coal on hand may not be used. Speeding up after the five-day rest will be guarded against by the fuel administration. Orders for coal shipments after the five-day period will be determined by the priority order established today. Domestic consumers must be kept warm and other absolutely necessary consumers must be supplied," Dr. Garfield stated. "All industry must be equally restricted in its use of coal in order that the available supply for the remainder of the winter may be properly distributed and made sufficient for the essential needs during the winter."

Munitions Plants Affected. No attempt was made to allow munitions and war work to continue. Dr. Garfield stated that it would be impossible to separate essential from non-essential industries for this purpose. Shipping congestion is so great that cessation of war work will not hamper the delivery of supplies, he stated, for vast stores of finished goods are piled on wharves awaiting shipment and stopping of manufacture for this period will enable transportation congestion to be cleared.

Exception is made in such plants as from their nature must be continuously operated seven days each week to avoid serious injury to the plant or its contents. Blast furnaces and similar establishments would be excepted under this provision. Newspapers are excepted by the following provision: Printers or publishers of daily papers may burn fuel as usual excepting on every Monday from January 21 to March 25, inclusive, on which days they may burn fuel to such an extent as is necessary to issue such editions as such papers customarily issue on important national legal holidays and where such papers do not issue any editions on a holiday they are permitted to issue one edition on the said Mondays.

"Printing establishments may burn fuel on January 18, 19, 20 and 22 to such extent as is necessary to issue current numbers of magazines and other publications periodically issued. The lid is clamped down tight on each Monday until March 25 by prohibitions which provide that only such fuel sufficient to prevent freezing may be burned on the Monday holiday.

Business or professional offices, except offices used by the United States, state, county or municipal governments, transportation companies or which are occupied by banks and trust companies or by physicians or dentists, must close. Wholesale or retail stores or any other stores or business houses or buildings whatever must close except those maintained for the purpose of selling good only, for which purposes stores may maintain necessary heat until noon, and for the purpose of selling drugs and medical supplies only may maintain necessary heat throughout the day and evening.

Dance Halls Must Close. Theatres, moving picture houses, bowling alleys, billiard rooms, private or public dance halls or any other place of amusement must close.

No fuel shall be burned in buildings where liquor is sold on these Monday holidays.

Street cars, including surface, elevated, subway and suburban cars and trains cannot use fuel on these days in excess of amounts used on the Sundays previous.

Buildings used in the production or distribution of fuel are not affected in any way. Special provisions to prevent injury to health, suffering, destruction of property by freezing or fire and other special application for relief may be made by state fuel administrators, where they deem such suspension of the fuel administration's orders imperative.

Order of Preference Given.

Order of preference in allotment of coal, both during the suspension period and on all occasions until further orders, is substantially as follows:

- 1—Railroads.
- 2—Domestic consumers, hospitals, charitable institutions, army and navy cantonments.
- 3—Public utilities, telephones, telegraphs.
- 4—Ships and vessels for bunker purposes.
- 5—Strictly governmental purposes of the federal, municipal, county or state governments for necessary public use, not including orders from factories work-

ing on contracts for the United States. 6—Manufacture of perishable food, or of food for necessary immediate consumption.

No fuel shall be delivered, according to the order, to any person or firm for uses not specified in this list during the period.

"This order is designed to distribute with absolute impartiality the burden of patriotic denial. All classes are to be treated alike," Dr. Garfield explained. Every person in the entire United States and especially in the eastern portion must make his sacrifice in this regard, it was pointed out.

Every effort will be made, Dr. Garfield said, to carry out the order without undue interference with the ordinary course of business, but the fuel administration counts on complete patriotic co-operation of every individual, firm and corporation affected by its order.

The Lever bill under which the fuel administration acted, authorizes the president to establish rules for regulation of production, sale, shipment, distribution, apportionment, or storage of coal and coke among dealers and consumers. By its control of priority, the fuel administration can withhold coal entirely from industries refusing to obey its orders.

FIVE SOLDIERS HELD FOR PLOT IN ALASKA

San Francisco, Jan. 17.—Findings of the courtmartial in the cases of five men from the Fourteenth infantry, stationed in Alaska, reached Major-General Murray for review today. While the result of the courtmartial proceedings was not revealed at army headquarters it is reported that the men plotted to destroy Fort Seward, Alaska, with dynamite and kill the loyal members of their regiments as part of an anarchistic plot.
