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SPORTS FLOURISH
AT TRAINING CAMP

Fourteen Tracks Are Required to Accommodate 4000 Men at Camp Lewis.

New York, Jan. 13.—It required 14 tracks to handle the 4000 men taking part in the Liberty loan track and field meet at Camp Sheridan, Montgomery, Ala., October 4, and athletics in that camp are carried on in just such a manner in other branches.

For instance, Alabama being in the sunny belt, there was baseball all fall. A division championship series was played and 110 teams finished the season. The title was won by the 110th ammunition train. Felt banners were awarded to all regimental championship winners. Baseball has its troubles here too, according to the division athletic director, for he mentioned to the United Press the fact that several outlaw teams were in the field, aside from the regularly sanctioned league.

Boxing shows are held as a regular part of the camp's athletic work. Joe Mandot, several years ago a famous lightweight, has been assigned to this camp as boxing instructor. A coliseum and a Y. M. C. A. building are used for boxing bouts. The first big boxing show was held the night of Thanksgiving day, with several of the camp's best boxers taking part. Mandot also was on the program for a bout.

Each regiment has a team of cross-country runners. The team selected from the division's athletes finished third in the road race held at Birmingham, December 15.

Football, of course, took up a great deal of time during the fall. Auburn, Alabama university, Chillscothe, Camp McClellan, and other teams of reputation paid the camp a visit. The Norwood of Cincinnati, and the Cleveland American league club are among high-class baseball teams that have been in action at the camp.

Private contributions, the Clark Grid fifth Bat and Ball fund, and the commission on training camp athletics, have been good to the camp, and it is well supplied with equipment for athletics.

The camp numbers among its celebrities Lieutenant C. C. Childs, a former Yale athlete, who was a member of the last Olympic team.

Windmills Are Valuable
for Irrigation Pumping

Washington, D. C., Jan. 19.—There is a wide field for extending the use of windmills for pumping water for irrigation in the semi-arid regions of the United States, according to the specialists of the office of public roads and rural engineering of the United States department of agriculture. These specialists have recently prepared farmers' bulletin 890, which discusses water supply, the sinking of wells, pumps, types of windmills, and the erection and care of windmills. Copies of the bulletin may be had free so long as the supply lasts, by application to the United States department of agriculture, Washington, D. C.

by Shortage in Fuel Oil

Portland, Or., Jan. 19.—It looks like fuelless days for some Portland firms.
