WILL EXAMINE FOR MOTOR MAIL CARRIER

Postmaster E. L. Campbell Receives Word of Examination for Motor Route Men.

Postmaster E. L. Campbell has received orders to hold a civil service examination at the Eugene postoffice on Saturday of this week, January 26, for the selection of motor mail carriers. It is open to men who are actually domiciled in the territory supplied by the Eugene postoffice, and who meet other requirements of the department. These requirements can be learned and application blanks secured by calling at the Eugene postoffice. The salary ranges from \$1500 to \$1800 per year. Carriers must provide their own equipment and should file a statement of the equipment they expect to furnish with their application for examination.

New York, Jan. 23.—Girls of the Y. W. C. A. will not act as dancing partners for Uncle Sam's soldiers who are being assembled at Camp Lewis, Wash., for overseas service.

"That the Y. W. C. A. is to employ 3,000 girls to dance with soldiers at Camp Lewis, Tacoma, Wash., was emphatically denied by Mrs. James S. Cushman, president of the war work council of the Y. W. C. A."

GRAIN PRICES HIGHER IN CHICAGO MARKET

Prospects for Warmer Weather and Improvement in Shipping Conditions Factors.

Chicago, Jan. 23.—Prospects of warmer weather with consequent improvement in grain shipments today sent oats up 5-8c to 3-4c over yesterday's close. January oats opened up 1-8c at 79 1-4 and later gained 1-2c. March opened at 78 1-8c up 1-8c and subsequently gained 5-8c. May opened unchanged and later gained 5-8c to 70 5-8c.

Corn prices were a shade higher in sympathy with oats. January opened late at \$1.27 3-4, up 1-8c and continued at that price. March opened unchanged and later was 3-8c higher at \$1.25. May opened down 1-4c but later went to \$1.24 1-8 up 5-8c.

Provisions were steady on a higher hog market.

WALL STREET
New York, Jan. 23.—The New York Evening Sun financial review today said: Today's stock market was one in which the course of prices fluctuated narrowly, first on one side and then on the other of the Tuesday closing level. Trading was on a materially smaller scale than in any previous session this week.

It is not at all illogical that the public should hold aloof from the market at this stage. Peace is in the air. Opening prices were for the most part firm, with considerable strength here and there in certain groups like the Sugars, Tobaccos and Rubbers. There were active moments in the first hour, but they were fitful and devoid of significance.

The heavy tone prevailed in the late session, but the decline was gradual and orderly in light volume of trading.

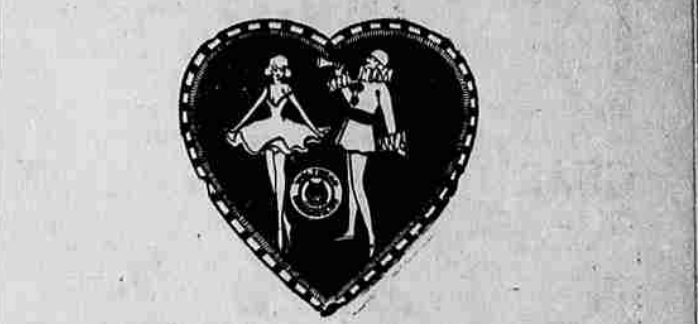
