NAVY WILL ENLIST FOR WAR TIME ONLY

Postmaster Receives Orders to That Effect; Free Transportation Is Given.

The following orders have been received at the Eugene postoffice relative to enlisting in the navy: All enlistments in the navy from date shall be made for duration of the war only except re-enlistments of former service. Men enlisting for electrician general, is closed from this date. The minimum age for fireman, third class, is now made at 18 years. Any man desiring to join the navy will be furnished free transportation by making application to the postmaster E. L. Campbell, in case he is eligible to the service or if within the present draft age, to receive a recommendation from their local board before joining.

LOYAL LOGGERS ARE SIGNING UP RAPIDLY

Over 4000 Members Are Already Obtained in Section Reached Through Eugene.

When Captain W. A. Arnold, of the United States army, engaged in organizing the Loyal Loggers Legion in the territory reached from Eugene, arrived at the Southern Pacific depot Thursday to go to Richardson, there were 4183 men signed up. When he took the train there were 4184. While he was talking to a representative of The Guard a lumberman wearing the red, white and blue badge with the "L. L. L." across the top came up with a brother logger and asked Captain Arnold if he could sign the other man up also, which was done.

Captain Arnold says that the response has been unanimous to the plea for the speeding up of logging to build ships and airplanes.

Captain Arnold went to Richardson Thursday afternoon to visit the camps of the Fischer-Boutin Lumber company at that place. He expects to return in a day or two.

PRECIPITATION FOR MONTH IS HEAVIER

Thermometer Thursday Morning Stood at 20 Degrees Above; River Average 6.7.

The precipitation for January was 3.71 inches in 1918, as against 3.02 inches in 1917, an increase of over 20 per cent. The average height of the river for the month was 6.7 feet above low water, and the temperature the 31st day of January, which was the coldest of the month, was 20 degrees above zero, according to figures furnished by Lee Goetschius, federal observer of the Willamette river.
