

GRAIN PRICES HIGHER IN CHICAGO MARKET

Some Traders Buy Because
They Believe Sinking of Tus-
cania Will Prolong War.

Chicago, Feb. 7.—Heavy buying on the grain market today sent out futures higher. Some traders bought because they believed sinking of the United States troop ship would prolong the war.

February oats opened late at 83 1-2; up 3-8c, and remained unchanged. March oats opened up 1-8c, at 82 1-2c, later gaining 3-4c. May oats opened unchanged at 79 5-8c, later gaining 3-8c.

February and March corn was not quoted. May corn opened up 1-8c at 125 1-4, later gaining 1-8c.

Provisions were slightly higher.

Go to Salem to Argue Case Before Oregon Supreme Court

Attorneys E. E. Smith and C. E. Klasinger, for the plaintiff and O. A. Hardy and J. W. Williams will argue the case of Archambault vs. Edmundson, et al. This case has been long drawn out, having been heard three times in the circuit court. It grew out of a failure of the Blighon heirs, of whom Donna Edmundson is one, to convey a certain parcel of land on the Willamette river to Archambault according to an alleged contract. The plaintiff got a verdict the first trial and the defendant was granted a new trial. In the second trial a motion for nonsuit was granted because of the failure of the plaintiff to get the evidence of an important witness. In the third trial the jury gave the plaintiff a verdict for the sum of \$1600, but because the answers of one of the queries was in conflict with the general verdict the court set aside the general verdict and ordered a verdict for the defendant upon the answer to the special query. Then of its own motion the court set aside the special verdict and ordered a new trial. The plaintiffs appealed from

Cormick's testimony before the senate
committee, Glass said:
"The idle title-tattle of irresponsible
counsellors has led to grave con-
sideration with the startling imputations
of the British prime minister to an in-
telligent American congressman who, un-

able to contain the confidential revela-
tions of the great man quickly 'backed
in the presence of the government's
verminaries."

"And now to have men whose
are sore from pulling against the top
end of the war wagon to stand up
public places and revile those who have
done nothing but go forward, is enough
to excite popular indignation. Men who
obstructed and voted against every ship-
ping measure proposed by the govern-
ment now have the audacity to run
against our lack of shipping facilities.
Men who wanted to put a stop to the in-
dustries of the country and who mor-
tally flayed the munitions manufacturers
of America as murderers, now after
alarm and indignation because the gov-
ernment is not instantly supplied with
guns and ammunition."
