

## DUKE ALBRECHT IS FACING "YANKS" NOW

Man Who Battered Down Maubeuge Is Given Job of Holding Metz.

New York, Feb. 7.—Duke Albrecht of Wurttemberg is in command of the German forces facing the American troops who have taken over a sector of the French front near St. Mihiel.

Albrecht is one of the two German generals of royal blood who have made reputations during the war. The other is the Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria. Albrecht was inspector-general of the sixth German inspection district, when the war broke out. He commanded the 19th army corps at Stuttgart and was one of the leaders of the German drive through Belgium. He commanded the German army that subdued the great French fortress at Maubeuge on the Belgian border. It was the fall of Maubeuge under the unprecedented pounding of the new type of German siege guns that led to the abandonment of fortress warfare in the present struggle and the substitution of trench fighting.

After the battle of the Marne, in which Albrecht is not known to have participated, he was reported to have been given command of the German armies in Belgium. This post he did not hold for long. One year later he received from the kaiser the coveted Order Pour le Merite, on the anniversary of the fall of Maubeuge.

Albrecht's selection to command the German line opposite the American trenches means that he is to guard the road to Metz, the great fortress in Lorraine. Under American hammering, Metz may prove to be Germany's Maubeuge and Albrecht may suffer the same fate he inflicted upon the French and British which gained him his reputation as the destroyer of modern fortifications.

Albrecht is 63 years old and is a widower. His wife and his mother were both Austrian princesses. Albrecht does not belong to the ruling line of the Wurttemberg dukes, but is the son of the head of the Wurttemberg ducal Catholic.

## TURKS ARE BEATEN BY ARABIAN FORCE

Shiek, of Mecca, Operating Southeast of Dead Sea, Is Reported Victorious.

Washington, Feb. 8.—Arab forces under the command of the Shiek of Mecca have completely defeated the Turkish army operating southeast of the Dead Sea, official dispatches received today state.

In a sanguinary battle which began January 30, the Arab tribesmen practically annihilated the entire Turkish force, capturing 300 prisoners, including the Turkish commander-in-chief, and his staff, the report states.

The Turkish loss in killed alone exceeded 400. Eighteen machine guns, two mountain guns and a large amount of booty fell into the hands of the Arabs.

from the navy department officials abroad. Confirmation had been received in diplomatic quarters here, however, by 5 o'clock that afternoon.

2035 SURVIVORS LANDED.

Washington, Feb. 8.—Survivors of the Tuscania to the number of 2035 have been landed at Irish and Scottish points, a navy department cablegram announced today. This included officers, men, crew and passengers. This report, however, is apparently incomplete.

The navy department statement follows:

"The navy department today received a cablegram announcing 76 officers and

1274 enlisted men of the army, who sailed on the transport Tuscania, have been landed at Buncrana, Ireland; that 18 officers and seamen of the crew have been landed at Larne and that approximately 570 officers and enlisted men of the army have been landed at Inlay, Scotland.

"In addition, approximately 60 soldiers and members of the crew are in the military hospital at Londonderry; 10 soldiers are in Lough Foyle hospital at Londonderry, and nine soldiers and two of the crew are in the county infirmary at Londonderry."

"Our reports concerning the sinking of the Tuscania are very sketchy," said Secretary Daniels today, "and I have no confirmation of the British statement that the submarine also was sunk. I hope it is true. I shall be delighted if it is."

BRITISH PAPERS COMMENT  
London, Feb. 8.—"Remember the Tuscania!" will be an irresistible call to the colors and battle cry of victory for the Americans in the war, London newspapers declared today.

All editorial comment sympathized with America over the Tuscania dead and demanded most strenuous measures for speeding up the fight against the U-boats. Increased shipbuilding was urged. Newspapers proclaimed the confidence of the allies that the submarine problem can be conquered.

"The U-boat which sank the Tuscania did a bad day's work for Germany," said the Express. "America's mind was in the war before. Now her soul is enlisted against the kaiser. Remember the Tuscania!" will be an irresistible call to the colors and battle cry."

The Telegraph declared it was not believed that the enemy's undersea offensive against the essential line of communications between the United States and the front would meet with a cumulative success, "but we must be prepared, perhaps, for a long period of ups and downs and conflicts. This has become a war of

transport—particularly sea transport." "Statesmen who are inclined to be optimistic over the submarine campaign should keep their lips closed," warned the Chronicle. "A bad week follows every such statement."
