EUGENE MERCHANTS' IDEAS GETS PUBLICITY

Live Rabbits and American Boys Essentials of Novel Scheme to Get Business.

Five hundred members of an "American Boys' club" form the basis for a unique advertising idea which has been carried out by the McMorran and Washburne store of this city, and to which three pages are devoted in the Merchants Trade Journal, a national magazine, for February.

The novel method which has increased the boys' clothing business of that store 1000 per cent in the last few years, was not at first a boy's club, the article says, but the slogan, "A Rabbit with every suit." For the store started the rabbit scheme four years ago at Easter time, and still continues it, along with the boys' club, which was formed later. A woodland scene, a fountain spouting real water, and a number of live rabbits are the drawing-cards in one of the main show windows just before Easter each year, and every "kid" who can tease his folks into buying him a new suit, overcoat or mackinaw, gets one of the bunnies.

The American Boy club was started two years ago and has proved a decided success, says the Trade Journal. The details of this scheme are this: Every boy who buys goods to the amount of \$7.50 gets a six months' subscription to the American Boy magazine, a present on his next birthday, and is one of the "bunch" to be taken on a two-day-and-night hike and picnic to the woods in the summer. The latter, the American Boy Jinks, was tried for the first time last summer.

Both schemes have proved so successful that the boys' clothing business has now become the most profitable in the store, according to the Merchants Trade Journal, which got the facts from Carl G. Washburne. The novel advertising plan is described in detail in the Journal for the benefit of other merchants.

Registration of Wealth Proposed in Congress

Washington, Feb. 13.—The first step toward actual registration of wealth in the country will be announced soon. Representative Howard, Georgia, has drawn a measure, authorizing the commissioner of internal revenue to name a day upon which all people in the country, subject to income tax, shall register the total of their monied possessions and other valuables coming under the income tax.

Funeral of T. W. Delaney to Be Held Here Friday

The funeral of T. W. Delaney, who died at San Francisco Monday, will be held at the Branstetter and McLaughlin chapel at 2:30 o'clock Friday afternoon, under the auspices of the Eugene B. P. O. E. lodge No. 357, of which he was a member. Interment will be made at the I. O. O. F. cemetery. Rev. A. M. Spangler will preach the funeral sermon.

Mr. Delaney was a resident of Eugene for about seven years, or during the period while the Willamette-Pacific railroad was being built here. He was formerly inspector of the Notch tunnel, and had been an employee of the Southern Pacific Railway company for 30 years. A short time ago he was transferred to San Francisco with a number of other employees, and died there of pneumonia last Monday. He was 62 years of age. So far as the Elks can ascertain, Mr. Delaney has no relatives in this vicinity.
