

EARLY PIONEER DIES AT DAUGHTER'S HOME

Robert Millican, Who Settled in Lane County 60 Years Ago, Passes On.

Robert Millican, for 60 years a resident of Oregon and Lane county, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Bruce Garrison at 147 Washington street, Eugene, Thursday evening, Feb. 28, 1918. Mr. Millican had been in poor health for some time, and recently underwent an operation for the removal of an abscess on his leg, from which he never fully recovered.

Mr. Millican crossed the plains in 1858 coming here from Oswego county, New York state. He settled on a farm near Walthersville, on the McKenzie river, where he has since resided. He and the wife who survives him celebrated their golden wedding on June 13, 1917, their children gathering at the home place to keep the day with them.

Deceased would have been 81 years old the 18th day of the coming June. Besides his wife, he leaves the following children: Miss Belle Millican, Oscar Millican, Lester Millican and Lawrence Millican, all of Walthersville; Mrs. H. E. Leverage, of San Luis Obispo, Cal.; Mrs. M. A. Brewbaker of Battleground, Wash.; Mrs. Bruce Garrison and Mrs. George N. McLean, both of Eugene.

The funeral will be held at the Gordon and Veatch chapel at 2 p. m. Saturday and the remains will be interred in the I. O. O. F. cemetery. Rev. W. M. Case will have charge of the services.

Portland Red Cross Swamped With Gifts of Canceled Stamps

Portland, Or., March 1.—One of the first affairs of the "stow the gab" campaign, which opened throughout Oregon today, will tackle, in the matter of directing people where to look for information concerning the Red Cross.

Because some "chump" stated, or was interpreted as stating that the Red Cross was gathering canceled postage stamps, the local headquarters of the humanitarian organization has been swamped with thousands and thousands of canceled letter carriers—shipped in by express, mail and freight, and carried in bundles.

The Red Cross was to extract the dye from the stamps, Dame Rumor had it.

All other forms of unfounded rumor, particularly those of hardships and punishment befalling American soldiers and of executions for failures to salute officers, are being attacked through the campaign in Oregon this month, and people are to be shown that such unfounded stories help the Germans when passed along as the truth.

I. W. W. Will Continue Its Agitation in Northwest

Portland, Or., March 1.—Despite the granting of the basic eight-hour day in the woods and mills by the government, the I. W. W. intends to continue its agitation, according to district officials of the organization. Today they stated that the "blanketless day" planned for May 1, is for better sanitary conditions, and will be carried out for that purpose.

On "blanketless day," the I. W. W. seeks to have every logger in the woods pour kerosene on his blankets and burn them, to force the lumber companies to furnish hotels and beds for men in the timber.

BUYERS MUST GUARD EXPLOSIVES WELL

Inspector Calls Attention to Need of More Care on Part of All Users.

That there is great danger not only to the country but to private property because of the carelessness of buyers of explosives is the statement of W. N. Campbell, of Medford, inspector of explosives for Oregon. Mr. Campbell, whose headquarters are at Medford, was in the city Thursday and Friday of this week looking after the handling of explosives in Lane county.

Mr. Campbell states that there will be no leniency shown purchasers of explosives who do not comply with the law. It is a war measure and must be obeyed as such.

In speaking of the carelessness in handling explosives, Mr. Campbell said: "The people generally are willing to comply with the law," said Mr. Campbell, "but they are careless and seem to think that when they obtain their license that is all there is to do. After procuring the license they must guard the explosives carefully in order that they might not be stolen by alien enemies or other persons bent on destruction of property and lives."

Only a few days ago a large quantity of explosives was stolen at Gold Hill.

"In any building or any box where explosives are stored it is necessary to have a lock that cannot easily be taken off. Instead of a padlock fastened on with staples it is necessary to bolt the lock and hasp on with bars on the inside. In stores where explosives are sold it is necessary that they be kept locked up; especially in this so in the case of giant powder caps. In many cases these caps are left on the shelves unprotected and when the merchant or clerk is in the back room they can easily be stolen."

Any information regarding the handling of explosives regarding the law will be promptly answered if sent to Mr. Campbell at Medford. Information as to violations of the law or careless handling should be promptly reported to Mr. Campbell.

despatches received here today. Some quarters are said to be already apprehensive of the possibility of enemy submarines and seaplanes operating from Vladivostok.

"The government is silent, but there is reason to believe that preparations are completed for enabling the nation to rise to the occasion whenever the necessity demands," said an agency despatch.

The government is believed to have carefully avoided anything inviting the powers' suspicions of its true purpose.

"Some members of the cabinet favored consulting the powers after taking action, in view of the gravity of the situation. But it may be safely surmised that the government is strongly impressed with the necessity of preventing a misunderstanding."

Released Austrian and German prisoners are reported to have armed and munitioned themselves from the allied supplies at Vladivostok.

BRITISH PRESS COMMENT
London, March 1.—Commenting on the Japanese proposal to land troops in Russia, the Star today said:

"If Japan lands an army in Russia it will be for the benefit of Russia and the world."

The Pall Mall Gazette said: "America is sensitive on questions of self-determination. She may feel uncertain as to how far Japan will observe them after a victory. We do not think there should be any obstacle or reservation. Such issues can be brought to a settlement at the peace conference."
