Washington, March 1.—Near-beer makers are limited to 70 per cent of grain and other food materials used last year, the food administration ruled today. Hoover holds that temperance brews must be held to the strict regulations governing brewing of beer and ale. It was also explained that bakers may use rye flour as wheat substitute only until March 31. Originally its use as a wheat substitute was permitted only until March 3, but difficulty in obtaining the substitutes in some sections forced extension of the time limit.
