RUSSIAN LABOR URGED TO FIGHT TEUTON FORCES

Gompers, President of American Federation, Sends Cablegram Pledging Good Will of Workers in United States.

Washington, March 13.—America's working men have sent a message to the people of Russia urging once more a strong resistance against Teuton domination.

President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor, today announced he had spoken by cable to Russia for labor.

The message urges the Russian soviet to say how America can help; that the great labor hosts of this country are willing to extend an assisting hand.

Gompers' cable reads: "To the all-Russian Soviet, Moscow: 'We address you in the name of world liberty. We assure you that the people of the United States are pained by every blow at Russian freedom, as they would be by a blow at their own. The American people desire to be of service to the Russian people in their struggle to safeguard freedom and realize its opportunities. We desire to be informed as to how we may help. We speak for a great organized movement of working people who are devoted to the cause of freedom and the ideals of democracy. We assure you also that the whole American nation ardently desires to be helpful to Russia and awaits with eagerness an indication from Russia as to how help may most effectively be extended. To all those who strive for freedom we say courage and justice must triumph if all free people stand united against autocracy; We await your suggestions.

FOOD COMMISSIONER GIVES "ONCE OVER"

C. A. Jewel in City to Look After Enforcement of Regulation of Administration.

The closeness, with which the state of Oregon is co-operating with the federal food administration in the matter of enforcing the food regulations is shown by the visit of C. A. Jewel, deputy dairy and food commissioner, to this city. Mr. Jewel, as he expresses it, is here to give the city the "once over," to see how the federal regulations are being observed. He stated Wednesday morning that he had not as yet made any investigations here, but to judge from the places where he dropped in to eat the hotels and restaurants are obeying the regulations strictly.

Mr. Jewel will make a detailed examination of the bakeries and groceries, mills, hotels and restaurants, correcting any misapprehensions as to the laws and instructing as to the regulations. This is but the first visit planned, and there will only be a checking up, but if any violations are found or are persisted in at the next visit there will be drastic action taken.

Mr. Jewel stated that A. C. Dixon, the county food administrator, had found but little trouble in getting the grocers and the people to comply with the regulations.

FOUR COMPANIES OF HOME GUARD FORMED

Organization Will Take Part in Parade for Saturday Afternoon Liberty Loan Meeting.

The local home guard or militia battalion was divided into four companies at drill Tuesday night. They were first divided into squads of eight and given squad drill in marching for about half an hour. Then they were lined up in a hollow square and each side was designated as a company, named A, B, C and D. No officers have as yet been named, but they will be selected before the next drill night. At that time, Colonel Leader stated, the men will be given an opportunity to transfer to some other company, but after that time there will be no opportunity to change.

After the drill Colonel Leader gave the men a talk on discipline, esprit de corps, morale and other kindred subjects. The lecture next Monday night will be on patrolling, outpost duty and the like.

The next drill will be Thursday night, and will commence at 7:30 o'clock. Drill will begin with military promptness.

The battalion will make its first appearance Saturday afternoon when it will take part in the parade which will precede the liberty loan rally. Men will report at 2 o'clock at the armory.

With the American Armies in France, March 12.—American raiders in the sector north of Toul again entered the German trenches last night at a different spot than they raided yesterday.

They found the German first lines evacuated as in the morning attack and took no prisoners.

The American artillery put down a perfect barrage simultaneously hammering the German batteries in the rear. Machine guns whipped the German trenches where the wire entanglements had been cut.

Under cover of the barrage and machine gun fire, the Yankee infantry enthusiastically went over the top. They found portions of the German trenches leveled and dugouts smashed. Some pieces of bodies, blown to bits by the American high explosive shells were discovered.

A few shots were exchanged with the Boches who were late in retreating. The raiders returned within 15 minutes after they had left their own trenches.

BRITISH IN RAID

London, March 13.—A strong enemy party raided a British post south of Arras last night, following heavy bombardment, Field Marshal Haig reported today. A few British soldiers are missing.

In the neighborhood of Lavacquerie an approaching party of the enemy was driven off by the British fire.

A British raid north of Lens was successful, several prisoners being brought back.

Southwest of Cambrai and opposite Loos, the enemy's artillery was active and at Passchendaele last night yesterday evening and in the Messines sector and at Passchendaele last night.

ARTILLERY IS ACTIVE

Paris, March 13.—Mutual artillery along the right bank of the Meuse and in the Raillon, Angerville and Lorraine regions was reported by the French war office last night.

A German airplane was shot down north of Soissons. Its three occupants, including two officers were taken prisoner. Three other Gothas, each containing four men, and an enemy biplane, were shot down within the French lines.

General Mentioned in Case of the Lipperts.

Francis P. Garvan, who made his name as a prosecutor under District Attorney Jerome of New York county, is now in charge of the search for enemy alien property in the United States. Many millions of dollars are owned by citizens of states at war with the United States. Under the present law this must be invested in United States bonds. He was employed for the work by A. Mitchell Palmer, former representative in congress from Pennsylvania and now federal custodian of enemy alien property.

School Superintendent Is Charged With Disloyalty

Farmington, Wash., March 13.—Resolutions charging City School Superintendent Frank Radmaker with disloyalty and failure to support patriotic moves, and demanding his removal, were presented to the school board today by Farmington citizens, following a mass meeting at which the charges were discussed.

Radmaker, who is the son of German-born people, denied charges that he was a German spy, and disloyal. He stated that he organized his school for patriotic work and that his wife has been knitting sweaters for the Red Cross.

King New Heavyweight Champion on Coast

Seattle, Wash., March 13.—Mick Kinc showed why he was entitled to the Pacific coast heavyweight championship last night when he outboxed Chet McIntyre, former holder of the title, all the way in every one of the four rounds of their bout at the Crystal Pool hall here last night.

The veteran was forced to do a good deal of holding to keep from going down under the terrific onslaught of the Australian. This caused the crowd to voice its disapproval of his tactics, the first that it has ever been against McIntyre here.

The lumber," is to be the keynote of the timbermen's plea. They made the same plea before the senate commerce committee, investigating the shipping situation.

According to witnesses before that committee, there is no lack of timber, no lack of labor, no lack of money to develop new tracts, but there is no information available as to how far the shipping board is going with its wooden shipping program. Hence timbermen won't spend money to extend roads and railroad spurs, into new tracts.

Some definite action was expected today from both house and senate on the railroad bill conference report held up by senate opposition and because the house was busy on other matters.

Conferences will begin this week on the \$1,180,000,000 urgent deficiency bill passed late yesterday by the senate, with increases of \$73,000,000 over the house bill.

EXEMPTION IS DENIED

Dallas, Texas, March 13.—Horace Lester, negro, saying he gave his dependent mother "as much as \$7 some months" claimed exemption from army service. The board made him a soldier and will pay his mother \$30 a month. Horace said he is ready to go to war.

LONE HIGHWAYMAN KILLED IN PORTLAND

Bandit Who Attempts to Hold Up Street Car Is Shot by Motorman.

Portland, Or., March 13.—Police are today asking the Denver police department for particulars regarding Denver police badge No. 229, found on an unidentified man killed by Motorman P. C. Heath as the stranger attempted to hold up a street car last night. He is believed to have held up several street cars at isolated terminals within the past two weeks.

The Fulton line car, on which Heath was employed was just ready to start on its return trip when the holdup, slipping from the shadows of the waiting shed jumped aboard the car. The conductor, according to pre-arranged plans, backed into the car, and the motorman, when called to come into the main part of the car, fired two shots, one fatally wounding the robber.

Says Infatuation for Wife Reason for Killing Husband

Kalmar, Wash., March 13.—William Voight, junior, today awaits removal to the state penitentiary to begin a life sentence, following his plea of guilty to the charge of murdering Earl Pottruff last November. Frankly stating that he killed Pottruff owing to infatuation for his victim's wife, Voight recounted details of the killing as the two men were hunting, Voight using Pottruff's rifle to make the death appear to be accidental.

Sometime after the shooting and before Voight's arrest, he circulated a petition collecting funds so Mrs. Pottruff could hold her homestead. Since he confessed the murder of her husband, Voight has deeded all his property to Mrs. Pottruff.

Alien Enemy Is Angered by Pro-Germans in His Cell

Los Angeles, Cal., March 13.—"I hate Prussianism, militarism, bureaucratism more than an American native is capable of hating it," declared Karl von Froning, in jail as an alien enemy. "And I want to be moved from this cell because Germans in here are continually strafing America, which is intolerable to me." Von Froning was moved, though he is still held by the government.

Waiter Accidentally Killed; Trying to Commit Suicide

San Francisco, March 13.—Carl E. Alexander, waiter, was dead today as a result of an unsuccessful attempt to commit suicide. The rope with which he was trying to hang himself from the window of his hotel room, broke, and he was killed when he hit the pavement, three stories below.
