S. B. HUSTON VISITS LANE COUNTY VOTERS

Candidate for United States Senator Has Two Sons With Old "Third Oregon."

S. B. Huston, of Portland, candidate for the republican nomination for United States senator in the coming primaries, was in Eugene Tuesday calling on the business men and other voters of the city.

Senator Huston has two sons in the old Third Oregon, in France, and is staunch in his upholding of the United States government in the position it has taken in defense of world wide democracy. Among the leading tenets of the platform upon which he seeks election, are the following:

Support vigorous war policy. Favor universal military training. Favor high income and excess profits taxes to pay cost of war. Establish national basic 8-hour day in mines, mills and factories. Utilize Oregon's idle water powers. Broaden federal rural credits. Obtain federal aid for highway construction. Favor full use of the ballot by women. Support measures to hasten national prohibition.

New York Fails to Ratify Prohibition Amendment

Albany, N. Y., March 13.—Governor Whitman will veto the bill putting ratification of the federal prohibition amendment up to the people instead of the state legislature. This was learned on

good authority today. The referendum bill was passed by the state assembly late yesterday. The governor was strongly in favor of ratification of the amendment by the legislature. It is believed the assembly bill will be substituted for a senate bill calling for a referendum.

Hope that the assembly itself would ratify the amendment was shattered last night, when, following six hours' debate, the assembly passed the referendum measure.

Gets Mortgage Judgment—

Dr. Floyd M. GRAIN PRICES STEADY IN CHICAGO MARKET

Chicago, March 13.—Unfavorable weather conditions for grain movement brought a firmer tone and higher prices in oats futures on the grain exchange today.

March oats opened 1-2 lower at 91-1-8 but later gained 1-2. May oats opened at 98 1-2, down 1-8, but subsequently gained 1-2.

March corn was not quoted. May corn opened 1-8 lower at 1.27 1-8 and continued unchanged.

Provisions were slightly higher.

ARGENTINE IS READY FOR WAR ON TEUTONS

Sinking of Another Ship Will Result in New Ally for the Entente.

Los Angeles, Cal., March 13.—Argentina is on the brink of war with Germany, in the opinion of Julio H. Brancan, Chilean consul at Buenos Aires, who is here today.

"If Germany sinks another Argentine ship there is no doubt that the republic will declare war against the central powers. Ninety-nine per cent of the people are strongly pro-ally. President Irigoyen is cordially hated because of his vacillating and seeming pro-German attitude."

Consul Brancan concluded with the statement that American capital is desired in South America and that German commerce there is forever dead.
